

OREGON TRUNK TO BUILD SPUR INTO BIG TIMBER BELT

Weyerhaeusers to Establish a Mill on Deschutes—85 Mile Contract Let on Natron-Vale Branch.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Crescent, Ore., June 28.—Railroad activity, which was temporarily suspended recently by the order holding up construction on the south 70 miles of the Oregon Trunk Line, gives promise of renewal in the awarding of 85 miles of construction work by the Southern Pacific to the Weyerhaeuser & Peterson, contractors. It is understood the work is to be done on the Natron-Vale branch of the new road now building toward Crescent from Eugene. A camp at Hazel Dell just across the range has been connected with the Hoey ranch, 12 miles west, where a force of Southern Pacific men is employed building a wagon road so that freight and supplies may be taken to the camps. Although no official announcement has been made, it is asserted on good authority that a construction camp will be established this side of the summit, within 20 miles of Crescent, within 30 days.

May Go to Crescent.
The preliminary survey of the Natron-Vale line runs about a mile south of Crescent, but negotiations are now on foot for the purchase of right of way through the town and the railroad has secured from the interior department permission to change its survey through the forest reserve, with the intention, it is stated, of bringing the line into Crescent. A depot will likely be put in here. General Manager O'Brien of the O. R. & N. visited here last week and made a tour of the valley to the south of here, looking over the work on the Klamath and Klamath Falls, building in the direction of Crescent.

The Oregon Trunk Line has purchased right of way for a spur to the Weyerhaeuser properties in the timber belt along the Deschutes river, which passes through the towns of Deschutes, and the lumber company plans a large mill at this point as soon as the railroad reach here.

SAYS JARBIDGE, NEV., IS BIG GOLD BRICK

R." song, she carries a chorus of wild animals, and her "Bill" Taft song last night was a scream of laughter.

MILWAUKIE ANXIOUS TO SEE NEW DEPOT

Residents of Milwaukie are anxiously waiting for the decision of the Southern Pacific Railroad company as to the location of the depot in Milwaukie, which is soon to be constructed, for the Beaverton-Willsburg cut-off. The town residents are certain that the building of the depot will affect greatly the value of property wherever it is located, and hence there is considerable competition among the people in different parts of the town to have the depot built in their particular vicinity.

The railway company has at present three tracts within the Milwaukie city limits in which it might construct the depot. In the place where the majority of the residents want the depot, the site would be most expensive to the company. This is a quarter block at Jefferson and Monroe streets. The location of the depot here would mean the opening of a new street.

Mayor Streib has broken ground for grading the streets in his new addition. Actual work has started on the grading of Cherry avenue and Park avenue. Cement walks and cement curbs will be placed along all the streets.

Indications are that paved streets in Milwaukie will be a reality in the near future. Bids have been called for the paving of Main street. Bids were called for paving of Washington street some time ago, but they were all so excessive that new bids have been called for. The proposed work on Main street will extend from the north town limits five blocks, to Washington street.

Milwaukie will have no Fourth of July celebration this year. The band will go to Stevenson, Wash., and a number of the residents are planning to go along.

COURTHOUSE CONTRACTS AGGREGATE \$178,427

Contracts for marble and finishing work on the east wing of the new courthouse, for which bids were received 10 days ago, have been awarded by the county court. The aggregate of the four contracts awarded is \$178,427. The contract went to the lowest bidder in each case except one. Joseph McCusker, who will submit to J. C. Bayer, received the contract for heating and ventilating, though his bid was \$125 more than the offer of the Pacific Fire Extinguisher company.

The Schanen Blair company will furnish the tiling, wainscoting and scagliola, for \$35,000. The Otis Elevator company will install two elevators, of the hydraulic lift type, for \$13,232. The lathing, plastering and partition work will cost \$43,900 and will be done by John O'Hare. Joseph McCusker was awarded the contract for heating and ventilating for \$25,285. Each contract calls for completion of the work by February 15, 1911, with a penalty of \$50 per day thereafter for work unfinished.
