

REAL FEMININE WILL BE ON HAND TO SEE BIG FIGHT

Prominent Portland Women As
Guests of Promoter's Wife
—Will Be 10 Others—Mrs.
Jeffries Won't Attend.

Reno, Nev., June 30.—While many women, it is said, will attend the Jeff-Johnson fight, for which they have already purchased tickets through friends, there will be a number of young women in the arena who will be protected from public gaze and be permitted to see the heavyweight championship contest with comfort and without molestation.

Mrs. Rex Rickard will occupy a private enclosure, screened from observation. Among her guests will be Mrs. Rex Beach, wife of the author; Mrs. Harry Eppinger of San Francisco; Mrs. J. J. Corbett, Mrs. James Kelly of Los Angeles; Mrs. Jack Kopper, wife of Jeff-Jones; Los Angeles partner, Mrs. Jack Jeffries; Mrs. Otto Floto, wife of the Denver theatrical manager; and Mrs. William C. Barker of Portland, Or. It will be the first time these women have witnessed a boxing match.

Corbett Outdone by Mrs. Rita.
"My wife was a bit timid about going," said Corbett, "but she finally consented to accept Rickard's invitation. In all my training my wife has never seen me at work, always refusing to visit my training quarters. Mrs. Bob Fitzsimmons was of a different nature. You remember she was at the ringside when I fought Bob here."

"It might have been better for Bob if she had remained away from the fight," someone suggested.
"Better," quickly retorted Corbett, "better for me, you should say, when everybody remembers how Bob was lying dazed on the ring floor, clutching my legs, when his wife, nearly frenzied with excitement, suddenly rose in her seat and shouted to Bob to get up and avoid the count. And he obeyed his wife and I went down."

Mrs. Jeff Energetically Declines.
Efforts to persuade Mrs. Jeffries to see her husband do battle with the colored giant have met with stern protest and prompt refusal, which, however, does not mean that she entertains anything but confidence in her husband's ability to make a success of the fight. For the accommodation of the hundred or more other women who have engaged tickets for the fight, Promoter Rickard will have boxes constructed on a line with the uppermost back seat, where they will not be subjected to public vulgarities that may develop during the combat.

Portland's exclusive society is to have one of its fairest representatives at the Jeff-Johnson contest in no less a personage than Mrs. Barker, wife of William C. Barker, a millionaire lumberman of Oregon. News of Mrs. Barker's plan to see the fight was conveyed to the promoter, Rex Rickard, in a message stating that Mr. and Mrs. Barker were on their way to Reno.

Mrs. Barker was provided with a seat in Mrs. Rickard's private box, swelling the number of her guests to 11.
Captain J. E. Emerson, the bromseltzer king, whose daughter, Mrs. Smith-Holmes-McKinn, is suing for divorce here, has returned from the east, ostensibly to attend his daughter in her matrimonial troubles. But his arrival was followed by the hurried reservation of ringside seats at the fight. His guests will be his daughter, legal representatives, Attorney James Boyd, and Ray Baker, the well known young clubman of Oakland, who has been spending much time for several months in Nevada mending political fences for his brother, who is to be a candidate for attorney general of the state.

Harry Green, one of Seattle's leading sporting and theatrical men, and his wife, arrived here yesterday. Green, of course, has come to attend the fight and also to bid for the state right of the moving pictures in Washington. He says Seattle will send a big delegation to the fight.

BANDON VOTES TO BOND FOR \$60,000

GOVERNOR DICKERSON WILL BOOST FOR PRIZE FIGHTS



Colored Fighter Spars Before the Camera.

Reno, Nev., June 30.—There is every possibility that Governor Dickerson himself will furnish the preliminary to the Jeff-Johnson battle on Monday afternoon. They have been talking about a brass band, but if the present plans are carried out, Dickerson will make a speech that will make all the fans forget all about bandmasters and their skill.

Promises Surprise.
It was cited on the best of authority last evening that the chief executive of the sagebrush state will jump into the ring when the vast crowd is seated and there make a speech which promises to make the whole civilized world sit up and take notice of him. They say that he will declare himself for the game of fictionists and sports in general. The governor didn't give this out, nor did Rickard make it public, but the information came from a very reasonable source.

Guests of Rickard.
Practically every prominent state official in Nevada will be there to cheer for either Jeff or Johnson. Rickard has invited them all to be his guests. This is one event which they will not want to miss.

Dickerson is still being bothered by reformers from all over the country who insist on fairly deluging him with letters, telegrams and postal cards, beseeching him to stop the fight, but they may as well address these missives to the king of the Cannibal Islands. "I have said on several occasions that the laws of the state of Nevada permit of boxing contests such as this," said Dickerson.

Favors Prizefight.
"Unless some unforeseen accident occurs Jeffries and Johnson will battle for the heavyweight championship of the world, in the Reno arena Monday afternoon. Outside influences have absolutely no effect upon me. The laws of Nevada are not being violated, and in my estimation neither the fighters nor the promoters are endeavoring to violate them."

Jeff Sparring in Secret Sessions Belief of Many.

With Sparring Partners He Disappears for an Hour at Time and Trainers Then Appear Optimistic.

Reno, June 30.—A persistent rumor is heard about Reno that Jeff Armstrong and occasionally Corbett go it strong on the sparring in secret sessions, and that the trainers of the big man are basing their optimistic views on this howling made in these sessions. Although Jeff's camp followers deny the story, the rumor refused to down. It is difficult to guess where the secret sparring could take place at Moana Springs, but it is a fact that sometimes when the crowd is thickest the big fellow and some of his sparring partners disappear for an hour at a time. It is given out during these intervals that Jeff is asleep, but those who profess to be "in the know" smile and walk away.

Jeffries in Jeff's Shoes.

Jeffries will wear springs in the heels of his fighting shoes when he enters the ring Monday. After trying the invention, which was recommended by Dewitt Van Court, Jeff expressed great satisfaction with the effect and decided to use the shoes Monday. The purpose of the springs is to make foot work easier. Jeffries says he is much lighter on his feet in the new shoes.

COVE POWER COMPANY FORMED AT PRINEVILLE

Prineville, Or., June 30.—A company of Prineville, strongest capitalists have filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk here for the Cove Power company. The purposes as set forth in the articles of incorporation are the generation of electric and water power; to buy, sell and lease real estate and personal property; to own and operate grist mills and buy and sell grain and all kinds of feed stuffs.

The main office of the corporation will be located at Prineville. The capital stock is fixed at \$50,000 and is divided into 500 shares of equal value. The majority of the stock will be owned by Prineville capitalists. The officers of the corporation are W. A. Booth, president; Warren Brown, secretary-treasurer; and D. F. Stewart and G. M. Cornett are on the board of directors with the president and secretary.

PICTURES OF FIGHT WILL BE FINISHED ON SPECIAL TRAIN

Photographers Will Develop the
Films and Drop Them Off at
Important Cities for Use in
Picture Shows at Once.

Reno, Nev., June 30.—Manufacturing moving pictures on a train speeding eastward as fast as the heavy mountain grades will permit is the stunt that will be pulled off by the owners of the motion picture rights of the Jeff-Johnson fight.

If the arrangements do not miscarry, the picture machines and their operators will be hustled in an automobile from the ringside to a special train, which will have right of way east. The train will carry three shifts of photographers to develop the films and a lot of special equipment. They will print new films from the ones developed as fast as possible.

Films will be dropped off the train as it speeds through the middle west and enough will be retained to supply the demand in Chicago, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Kansas City, Cleveland and other eastern cities. The Pacific coast is not to be overlooked. Big consignments of films will be dropped off as soon as the train begins its rush eastward and will be picked up by the fast trains for the coast and hurried to San Francisco, where they will be sent to the large cities of the coast.

The demand for the pictures is said to be extraordinary and the picture men expect it to be the largest ever known for a single film.

Johnson Moves for Picture Man.
Champion Jack Johnson broke his reserve and emerged from the seclusion of his quarters into the limelight of publicity today to perform sundry and certain stunts before the lens of the motion picture camera.

Jack chased an imaginary Jeffries around the ring, landed famous uppercuts and conducted feinting expeditions for the edification of countless thousands, yet to view the films and the remuneration of the captains of industry who place the reels on exhibition.

Jack skipped the rope, imitated a Nevada jack rabbit doing a bit of road work, shadow boxed and sparred with

his partners. Throughout it all the champion's golden smile threatened the films with a case of "dazzles," and the promoters of the motion picture corporation will be fortunate if the reels do not turn out to be "light struck."

Jack's gladness was in evidence throughout the stunt, and he was particularly cheerful while landing imaginary knockouts on Jimmie de Jeff.

Precautions to save Johnson from possible harm at the hands of cranks were redoubled at his training camp today. A gunman is constantly patrolling the grounds and two guards are stationed at the door leading to the negro's apartments. Only persons who are known

are permitted to enter. This protection will be afforded Johnson until the hour of the fight.
