

REPUBLICANS HOLD MANY JOBS; WOULD TAKE A FEW MORE

Out of 566 State and County Offices They Fill 323, but Insist Oregon in Grip of the Democrats.

Assembly "leaders" of Multnomah county, and of Oregon, are telling the people of the county and state that Oregon is in the grasp of the Democrats because of the primary law and the results of its procedure. They are saying that ever since the primary law went into effect the offices of the state have been slipping out of the hands of the Republicans and that because of the law, and its results, the small minority of the Democratic party is able to control the offices of the state and county governments.

The fact is, as compiled from the official roster of state and county offices issued by the secretary of state, that out of 566 state and county offices, 323 are filled by Republicans and 144 by Democrats and Independents.

Taking the county offices alone, out of a total of 411, there are 360 Republican officeholders, 108 Democrats, two Independents and one Socialist.

Out of the 90 members of the legislature 74 are Republicans and 16 are Democrats. Taking the county officers and the members of the legislature as being in the county official class, out of a total of 501, there are 374 Republicans and 127 Democrats and Independents.

EASY WEDDING LAWS IN JERSEY CHANGED

Jersey City, N. J., June 30.—One of the most drastic marriage laws adopted by any state will come into effect in New Jersey tomorrow, with the result that the hasty midnight weddings of chorus girls, divorcees, glided youths and intoxicated millionaires, who have been in the habit of crossing over from New York, to have the knot tied, will become a thing of the past.

The new law requires that the marriage license be obtained in the place where the bride and groom reside, unless the bride is a non-resident of New Jersey. In the latter case the license must be obtained in the home town of the bridegroom-elect. If both are non-residents, the license must be obtained in the place where the ceremony is to be performed. The law provides that before a marriage

license shall be issued, the person taking it shall require one of the contracting parties to subscribe to an oath or affirmation attesting the truth of the facts respecting the legality of the proposed marriage, and that license shall be issued only if it be made to appear that no legal impediment exists. The applicant must swear that neither party is an imbecile, epileptic or of unsound mind. The person applying for the license must also be accompanied by an identifying witness who will be required to swear that the applicants are legally qualified to marry.

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REAL REFORM FOR CONGO IS COMING

Plans of Many Organizations of World to Go Into Effect for Freedom of People.

Brussels, June 30.—Congo reform, for which the governments, churches, missionary societies and other organizations throughout a large part of the civilized world have been working for years, will become an accomplished fact tomorrow, when the plans formulated by the Belgian ministry of the colonies and approved by King Albert will become effective. Simultaneously a large area of the Congo region will be opened to free commerce.

The reforms include the suppression of polygamy; the substitution of native for white officials; a reduction in the taxes which will be collected in money and not paid in labor; and the restriction of obligatory labor on the part of adults to the works dedicated to the improvement of their own conditions.

The most vital feature of the reform program is the provision for the suppression of forced labor, a situation which has rendered possible the terrible

conditions which in the past have roused the horror of the civilized world.

Under the Leopold regime the collection of taxes through labor instead of money, enabled that monarch to work his immense rubber trade free of expense. A quota of so much rubber, in lieu of taxes, was demanded from each village, an amount which would require the labor of every adult in the village virtually all of his or her time. Failure to produce the allotted portion at the required time was followed by the immediate punishment at the hands of the black soldiers of the Congo government, consisting too frequently of tortures, mutilation or death.

Benefit French Working Girls. Paris, June 30.—The decree of the ministry of labor prohibiting night work on the part of seamstresses, milliners and other working girls, which became effective today, marks a great forward step in the movement for the amelioration of the condition of the women workers of France. For many years the sweating system, has been greatly abused in France, and especially in Paris, where the employees in many fashionable dressmaking and millinery establishments have often been compelled to work until midnight during the busy season.

Librarians in Conference. Mackinac Island, Mich., June 30.—The members of the American Library association, including prominent librarians from many parts of the United States and Canada, have gathered here for their annual convention, the sessions of which will continue until July 6. The Bibliographical Society of America is holding its annual meeting in conjunction with the library association.
