Sell Boys as Witnesses.—James Louis and Roy Crittenden, bellboys at the New Grand Central hotel, who are important witnesses for the state in the case against Jesse P. Webb and Mrs. Carrie Kish, indicted for the murder of W. A. Johnson in the sensational trunk murder, were called before Presiding Judge Brown in the circuit court yesterday and admonished they must be here when wanted as witnesses at the trial. Being out of a job, they were about to leave town and Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald feared he would lose their promise to appear when wanted and to keep the court informed of their whereabouts they were not placed under bond.

Contract Awarded.—The contract for paving Lombard street, between West-anna and Wacash avenues, on the Peninsula, has been awarded to the Haslam Paving company. The bid was for \$117,845. This is the largest street contract that has ever been let on the Peninsula and Lombard street is part of the boulevard system. The same contracting company has submitted a bid of \$83,289 for the paving of Mississippi avenue, between Goldsmith and Prescott streets. The completion of the Peninsula boulevard system is expected to take three years.

Trouble Follows Joy Ride.—Borrowing an auto for a joy ride, Frank Knight now finds himself in serious trouble, and his case has been referred to the grand jury after it had been heard in the municipal court. Knight took the machine from the garage of Mrs. Della Jones, the owner, a few days ago and took a party of friends to a roadhouse. On the way back the machine broke down and Knight left it in the road, where it was found next day and returned to Mrs. Jones. A larceny charge was brought against Knight.
