Felix Diaz En Route to Reno. (United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, July 1.—General Felix Diaz, former chief of police of Mexico City and chief of the Mexican secret service, will start tonight for Reno to witness the Jeffries-Johnson fight. Diaz arrived from Mexico Wednesday. He refused to state that the big battle was the sole cause of his journey, but smilingly remarked:

"The fight, I believe, will be worth coming many hundreds of miles to see. With two friends I start for Reno tonight. I will spend one day in San Francisco en route."

Four attempts have been made recently to wreck streetcars and suburban trains, and arrests and confessions have followed in each case.

Mead of Rutland was nominated for governor on the second ballot. Mead's plurality was only three votes. The convention demanded a nonpartisan tariff commission.

Boston, July 1.—Increased passenger rates ranging from a minimum rate of one-fourth of a cent to one-half of a cent per mile were put into effect today on all of the divisions of the Boston & Maine railroad. The increase applies to the entire system with the exception of the cities and towns coming within the suburban 15 mile limit.

Coroner Dunning the body was removed to the morgue.

That Bolen had long planned his crime was indicated by a letter found in his room which was dated May 12. It reads as follows:

"Dear Friends and Public: Will write a few lines and say goodbye to the world. I am not drunk or crazy, but I have had my home broken up and am tired of living. I have always worked hard and tried to live a good life, but I have had something to cause trouble more or less for the past three years."

Blames Wife. "My wife never tried to help me in my trouble, only to make more for me. She never cared whether I had anything to eat when I came home from work or not, and never tried to save a cent for me. I have gone with my feet out into the snow last winter and didn't have enough clothing on my back to keep me warm when I was out on the road. That is hard for a man to think of, but it is true. You will all know in a short time. She is chasing the streets all the time. This is all I have to say in regard to the matter. I have a brother working for the P. R. L. & P. company and I have a father and mother living at Leroy, Kan. Mr. Ben Bolen is my father. I want my body cremated and sent to him. I don't care what is done with my wife. I tried to do right with her, but she wouldn't listen to me, so I don't care what becomes of her, and I will say goodbye to the world."

"SAMUEL J. TILDEN BOLEN," "625 Mississippi Avenue," Writes to Mother.

A similar letter was written by Bolen Wednesday. This letter was found in his pocket by Deputy Coroner Dunning. Another letter was dated at length upon his marital troubles. In his room was found the last letter written to him by his wife, dated March 30. No mention was made of their difficulties and she closed with the rather formal term of "By Your Obedient Son."

Mr. and Mrs. Shupe, with whom Bolen lived, said that he had done no work recently and constantly brooded over his troubles. Last week Bolen told them that his wife and "the man in the case" had left town and that he intended to "brace up."

Mrs. Bolen obtained her divorce decree four weeks ago. In her petition she charged that her husband for six years at periods of two or three times a week had pointed a revolver at her and threatened to shoot.

Said Husband Made Threats. Once he threatened to carry her to the woodshed and cut off her head and on another occasion he put a razor under her pillow and threatened to cut her throat while she slept, she said. Bolen was of an intensely jealous nature, she charged, and at one time had knocked her from a chair because she could not remember where she placed her purse and he believed she had given it to a man. Bolen did not contest the case.

The couple were married in Iola, Kan., in 1904, and came to Portland two years ago. They separated several times here and Mrs. Bolen worked in a number of department stores. Since the divorce she has been living with friends at 109 Eighteenth street. She is 24 years old and Bolen was 30. The latter's body was claimed last night by his brother, Arthur Bolen.

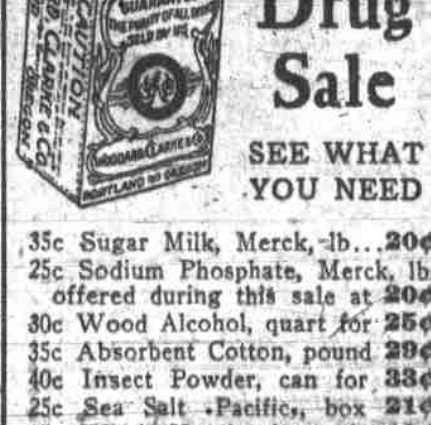

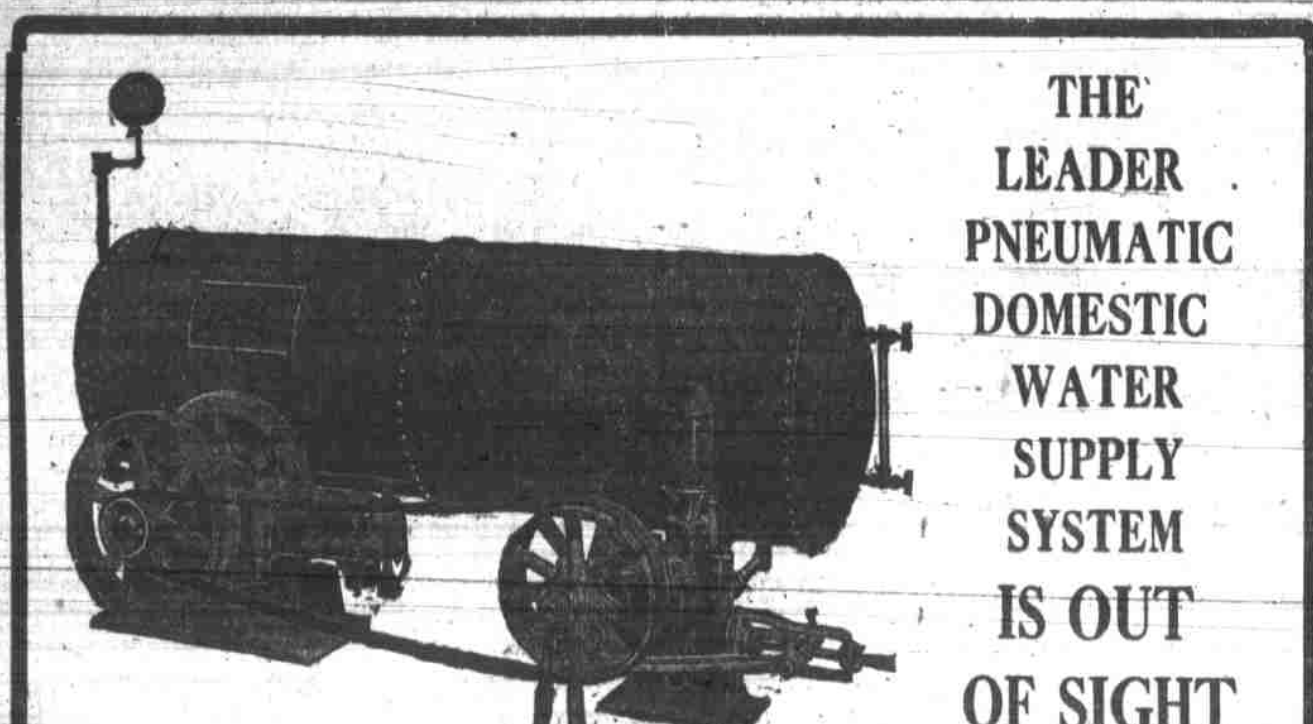

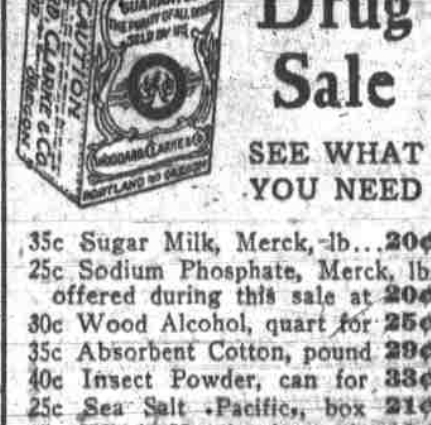
