

BAKER CITY WILL SEE THE SKYMAN

Aeroplane Flights Will Entertain Visitors on Fourth of July.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Baker City, Or., July 1.—Five thousand visitors in Baker City for the fourth of July celebration is the estimate of the various towns. Special trains will be run from Copperfield and Huntington on Snake river, from North Powder to the west and from Prairie City for the people of Harney and Grant counties.

The great attraction which is causing thousands to flock here will be the aeroplane flights by J. W. De Pries of South-Or., who has just arrived with his big bi-plane and is now having it set up at the fair grounds, where the flights will take place. Mr. De Pries has made 161 successful flights with his machine and has not met with any accidents. The machine is of the Curtiss pattern, but is larger and stronger and safer. It is equipped with a 50 horsepower 8 cylinder gasoline engine, which revolves the propeller at 1200 to 2000 revolutions a minute.

July 2 and 3 will be the big days for the horsemen, for then a two day "race meet" will be held and some of the best horses in this section will be on the track.

The other features of the celebration will be better than usual. The big feature of the parade which will contain the usual floats, plugmugs and other attractions, will be scores of gaily decorated automobiles. Prizes of \$40, \$30 and \$15 have been offered for the best cars and a large number of owners have signified their intention of entering the contest.

The Baker concert band will furnish music for the various events throughout the four days. The literary program will be given in the public park on the morning of the Fourth and C. T. Gowen of this city will deliver the oration. The Mormon choir of this city will furnish the music.

FATAL SHOOTING IS JUST AVERTED

Deputy Fish Warden Would Have Been Target But Gun Missed.

The failure of a revolver in the hands of an angry woman, to explode probably saved the life of Deputy Fish Warden M. F. Donahue yesterday when he invaded the home of Mrs. Albert Long, Kern and Walnut streets, Hazelwild, to continue a discussion with his divorced wife over the possession of the furniture. Mrs. Long is said to have snatched the weapon, but the cartridges did not respond and she now faces a charge of threatening with a dangerous weapon, while Mrs. Donahue and Mrs. Myrtle Kyser, a friend, are accused of larceny in taking furniture which Donahue claims as his property.

Donahue and his wife were divorced about a month ago and each says that they were awarded the furniture by the court. The woman removed the property to Hazelwild, and Donahue went yesterday to retrieve it. A quarrel followed and Mrs. Donahue and Mrs. Kyser retreated to the Long residence. Donahue followed and after more words had passed Mrs. Long appeared with the revolver which Donahue says she aimed at him and tried to explode.

Donahue returned to the city and swore out the warrants for the arrest of the three women in justice court. Deputy Constable Kierman served the warrants and says Mrs. Long admitted she tried to shoot Donahue.

"I would shoot any man who comes into my house and abuses a woman," is the statement which Kierman says Mrs. Long made.

HARRY CLINE DEFEATS C. DEMAREST AT CLUB

Harry Cline won the exhibition 200-point 18.2 billiard match at the Multnomah club last night from Calvin Demarest in 17 innings, Demarest totaling 177 points in 16 innings. Cline had an average of 11.79, while Demarest's was 11.1. Demarest's run of 88 was high for the evening. Slow cushions and bedclothes interfered with the playing of the experts.

PHYSICIAN SUE FOR DAMAGES BY WOMAN

The last jury trial to be held in the circuit court until September, was called before Judge Gentgen this morning to decide whether Dr. W. B. Hamilton, an east side physician, shall be required to pay Mrs. Elizabeth Merriam \$5643 damages because of an alleged false diagnosis and treatment.

Mrs. Merriam alleges Dr. Hamilton predicted the coming of the stork, but was badly mistaken. She was under treatment until November 5, last year, when she was changed to another physician. She was made ill, she says, and compelled to take a trip to restore her health. She asks \$5000 general damages and \$563 expended for medicines and care necessary to her recovery.
