Auto Seized—Circuit Judge Gantenbein yesterday afternoon gave judgment for the defense in the case of Mrs. M. Neighbors searched the vicinity immediately, but no trace of the party responsible could be found. The police also searched an unsuccessful search. Mrs. Bang does not believe the shot came from an enemy and is inclined to think a careless shooter was to blame.

Wanted in Canada—Charles C. Smith, wanted in Calgary, Canada, where he is alleged to have sold a horse entrusted to him by the G. F. & J. Gault company and skipped with the proceeds, was arrested this morning at Third and Oak streets. He was arrested by the sheriff's force on a description sent by the chief of police of Calgary last April to Sheriff Stevens. He is said to have sold the horse for \$140.

He says that if elected he will be pledged "to all the people the faithful discharge of a public trust," indicating he does not expect to owe allegiance to an assembly or body less than the people at large.

Gives Advice in Movement to Prevent Forest Fires; List of "Don'ts."

"Would you set fire to any man's house?" queries the Oregon state board of forestry on cloth posters, that are being sent all over the state.

"If you saw his house burning would you pass by without doing anything?" "Do you realize timber is quite as valuable to the owner and much more so to the community and to you? He can build a new house, but not a new forest."

"Oregon loses 500,000,000 feet of timber yearly through fire. Each thousand feet burned is a loss of \$1 to the owner. But the community loses \$5 in wages. Timber means pay checks to support all industries; but burned timber pays no wages. Timber pays taxes in your county. If it burns other property has to pay the difference. Care with small fires is the best means of preventing large ones. Therefore—

"Don't toss away burning matches or tobacco."

"Don't make a campfire in leaves, rotten, or against logs where you can't be sure it is out."

"Don't burn your slashings in dry season without permit from a fire warden."

"Don't operate an engine using fuel other than oil without equipping it with a good spark arrester."

"Put out any fire you find, if possible; if you can't put it out, notify a fire warden or other public officer. Remember that little fires become big ones if left alone. If you don't know the fire

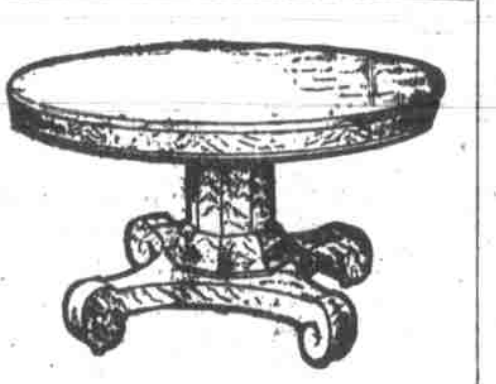
