

SHOW TO WIPE OUT COLLEGE DEBT

Benefit Performance to Be Held
in Armory for Christian
Brothers' Institution.

Striving for something out of the ordinary, the Alumni association of the Christian Brothers' college of Portland is at work upon arrangements for the benefit performance which is to be given in the Armory July 17, the proceeds from which will go toward paying off the debt which now rests against the Catholic institution.

As a feature, Matthew Cummings of Boston, Mass., will give a lecture on "The Importance of Christian Education" and "The Aspects of Hibernianism." Mr. Cummings is national president of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, and is noted as one of the most forceful speakers in that organization.

Rev. Peter C. York of St. Anthony's church, Oakland, Cal., will be another speaker to deliver a lecture at the benefit. He will talk on "The Pope, an Independent Ruler." Frank Richter, the "blind pianist," will play several selections. Sig. George De Luksi of Liberator's band, will sing. Other musicians will contribute their services. Judge Kavanagh will preside.

Arrangements have been made to run special trains to Portland for the performance. One will come from cities on the Oregon Electric and will allow residents of those places to return home late on the night of the performance.

A meeting of the alumni association will be held at the Christian Brothers' college Wednesday evening, for the purpose of perfecting arrangements for the benefit performance.

Tickets have been placed at Foeller & O'Neil's cigar stand, Chamber of Commerce, the Oak Pharmacy, East Tenth and Oak streets; Watts-Matthew company, 275 Russell street; J. W. Brost's Catholic book store, 590 Union avenue; Janit's book store, 491 Washington street, or can be had from J. Cahalin, president of the Alumni association, or from any of the members.

The Armory seats more than 5000 persons, and the Alumni association expects to have it crowded. Many of the delegates to the national convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians will have arrived in Portland July 17, and are expected to attend in a body.

Matthew Cummings' address will make of the benefit performance an event of more than local importance. He is known as a leader who several times has taken exceptions to the most radical of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt's statements. Mr. Cummings made an address recently in Lexington, Mass., which attracted wide attention over all the country. In part he said:

"We Americans as a race have been noted among all nations for our love of liberty. We have always defended the under dog, and by our Monroe doctrine have stood before the world as a power which would not allow others to bring oppression to our continent. The blood of our fathers was given to free the black man in the southland, and in later years to bring liberty to Cuba. We have always believed, even as Lincoln did, that no nation is great enough to govern another nation. Thus today our nation stands before the world as the home for the oppressed for all nations, and the defender and friend of weaker nations."

LEADERS ABANDON ASSEMBLY SLATE; THEY FEAR VOTERS

who had boasted it and nurtured it into flower that the blossom was withering. "There is no enthusiasm," said D. A. Paine. "If we do not go clear through with it it will fall flat."

"We miss the old familiar faces," said another delegate, and another replied, "Yes, but there are yet enough to build out a framework on."

Before the convention, too, it was seen that something had to be done to bolster things up, and Sam H. Friendly stepped down and out of the chairman's place and Dr. W. A. Kuykendall was elected permanent chairman of the convention. Mr. Friendly, in addressing the delegates, kept calling them a convention and then correcting himself and calling it an assembly. This happened until the delegates applauded and when Dr. Kuykendall took charge he said that the time had come when Republicans should take a stand for the binding up of the party, and he hoped that the ticket to be nominated during the afternoon would be elected from top to bottom. The delegates had the right to nominate the county ticket, Dr. Kuykendall said, and as Republicans they ought to stand up and nominate it.

Starts Fireworks.
Following this address the report of the credentials committee showed that out of a total of 388 delegates "240 were present or represented." Then Dr. D. A. Paine started the fireworks by presenting the report of the committee on order of business. In this report was a list of delegates to the state convention, which had been selected by the delegates from the different precincts, and also the recommendation that a county ticket be nominated from top to bottom.

C. W. Ryland opened the question by a motion to strike out that part of the report calling for the nomination of a ticket. Dr. Paine objected. He said that he believed it was the business of the convention to name candidates for office and that he knew of no reason why it should not be done. Other counties had followed the system and had put out county tickets.

Opposes Nominations.
"Unless you proceed to name the ticket today it will never be done," said the speaker.
"If you are Republicans, I see no reason why we should not put ourselves on record. This is the test. If we do not make the nominations now and here, the assembly will fall in this county." Mr. Swafford opposed the statements of Dr. Paine.

"There are many reasons why the convention should not nominate a county ticket," he said, "I favor a state assembly, but I do not want to do anything that will bring discord in the ranks of the Republican party of Lane county. I do not want to do anything that will show discrimination."
"There is no reason why we should single out any man or men for our nomination. To do so would cause discord. It is not the intent of the primary law that conventions should be held. We are teaching the young men of the party to violate or evade the plain letter of the law. It is the intent of the law to have no conventions."

"Live Up to Law."
"The primary law was and is a protest against conventions and the abuse of the convention system. In the old days a few men dictated the nominations of the party in state and county elections. Because of this the primary law came."

"Now that the primary law is here, let us live up to it. If we do not it will cause strife and discord in November. Strike out the county nominations and bring harmony to the party of the county."

J. M. Williams tried to stem the tide. He arose and said that he had challenged Swafford to prove that assemblies were against the law. He said that no state law could prevent the right of assembly, which was granted by the constitution of the state. He asked Swafford if he meant to threaten that the ticket would be knifed if it were nominated.

Colonel Mercer asked the convention to tell him the difference between tweedledum and tweedledee. He asked why it was all right to name delegates to a state convention and yet was a violation of the law for the convention to name delegates to the state convention.

Should Act Cautiously.
John M. Pipes said that the convention should proceed cautiously. He said he believed in an assembly, but that it was an experiment. He said that if a ticket were nominated it would be in all probability go down to defeat. That would kill the assembly. He wanted to educate the people up to the assembly.

S. D. Allen emphasized the expediency of not making nominations.
"The Republican party is in a serious doubt of the expediency of the assembly," he said. "In one precinct of this county three men named the 11 delegates from the precinct. The party members staid away from the meeting because they doubted the plan. To name a ticket would be to thrust a thorn into the side of the party in Lane county in the November election."

Would Make Trouble.
"If we, sent here by a faction of the party," he said, "make up a ticket it will lead to trouble. Already there are candidates who do not want the assembly nomination because they believe that they would be stronger without it. Let us go slow."

H. W. Hall said he wanted to voice a protest against the nomination of a ticket.
"In my precinct," he said, "five men named the six delegates to this convention and they all opposed the nomination of a county ticket. So we had better go slow."

S. M. Yoran made a fiery speech in which he went after Senator Bourne, reading the letter sent out to the voters of the state.

Many other addresses were made and the tide was turning so strongly against the program that Dr. Paine, Yoran and other of the old leaders got together for a compromise. Yoran finally introduced an amendment providing that the assembly adjourn to meet on the first Saturday in September at 10 o'clock in the morning for the nomination of a county ticket. This was agreed, and after the staff administration had been endorsed the convention adjourned.

This action put the question on the nomination of L. E. Bean for state senator by the convention and forces the convention to make a choice of the county under the primary law. It is the general opinion among the politicians of Lane county that the convention will never be called together to nominate a ticket, or if it does come together that it will adjourn again without carrying out its program.
The real result of the convention was the defeat of the old leaders in their

great specimens of the human race are put in action, and the one thing that they now must avoid is the thing that causes an exhaustion of nervous energy or vitality.

Less Mind, the Better.
There are many ways of speaking that valuable product. For instance, directing unnecessary food or poorly masticated food. All physical exertions of any kind call for an exhaustion of nervous energy and perhaps the greatest exhaustion of all and the most serious one is through the condition of the mind. If conditions were such that these could become as nearly inert as possible and remain in that peaceful condition from now until the hour of the contest, it would be a great advantage to them.

Anxiety is one of the most destructive and exhausting things. Carrying on a conversation, no matter how frivolous, listening to other people, following their conversation, no matter how interesting, playing a game of any kind in which the mind must be alert is all bad. The mind must take the foremost part in every physical movement that is made by these two men when they face one another.

See, Think, Act at Once.
Of course, that old first law of nature, self-preservation, will be present at all times and will play some part so far as escaping punishment is concerned, but when it comes to dealing out punishment they must see, think and act simultaneously. The one who sees, then thinks, then acts, is lost.

No Fear of Mournment.
Both of these men have not only been trained physically but they have trained and developed their knowledge of attack and defense; how to turn defense into attack and how two men like these going into a pugilistic contest have ab-

solutely no fear or no consideration for physical punishment which they receive so long as it is not sufficiently severe to make them unconscious or unable to continue in their efforts. It is only the dread of becoming unconscious or injured to such an extent that their opponent may receive the decision.

Men of this class are just as sensitive to pain as anyone else, but their training and experience enables them to become absolutely indifferent to suffering. They have no fear. Each man feels that he is the other man's superior, and while he is suffering from fatigue he feels that the other man is suffering just as much, therefore, continues.

Mind Greatest of All.
In fact the mind is so important a factor in a contest of this kind that even with these two men who have had a world of experience to profit by, both noted for their great endurance, yet it is a fact that even after their strong wills and determination have been exhausted in driving the body to its best, if there was a refreshed mind to take the place of theirs, the body could go on almost indefinitely, or at any rate it could go on and do three times as much as it was made to by their minds.

That is one of the safety valves that nature has provided us with. Our own minds are not great enough to drive our bodies to an extreme of fatigue that would injure them provided that body is in normal condition.

Both of these men have trained themselves. They have been their own advertisers, exercised their own will in everything that has been done and therefore they must be perfectly satisfied with whatever the outcome may be and have no fault to find or no excuses to make about their condition. If any credit is due they can claim it.

Jim Peculiar Character.
Jeffries is a man who might be called a peculiar character. He has his peculiarities and while he is a very shrewd, thoughtful person, willing to listen to anyone whom he thinks can offer him any good advice, perfectly willing to carry on a conversation with any person whom he thinks is in a position to enlighten him on any subject, he has absolutely no use for idle, gabby

shallow-brained persons who come around merely out of curiosity with a tremendous load of cheap advice and accumulated gossip, with a view of unloading it upon Jeffries merely because he is a famous character. He does not like the idea of trying to satisfy people's curiosity.

Jeff Is Man for Job.
Ten years ago when Jeffries had reached the pinnacle of fame in his profession, he was young and fond of excitement, proud of his success and would suit the average young persons much better and create a much more favorable impression than in his present state of mind. He seems to have but one object in view now and that is to succeed in his undertaking.

Jeffries fully appreciates the great responsibility that he has before him. If I am any judge of character, he is the right man in the right place, mentally and physically, on this occasion. If he should be defeated it would be because there has been developed in the pugilistic profession the greatest boxer and fighter that has ever come before the public in the history of the prize-ring.

at his best for a vital contest. He is undeniably lax, the outcome of the last year and a half he has put in to undo the ravages of half a dozen years that he lived an easy life. He does not force himself in the least. Fishing is more important than condition. Everyone who should know better, cravenly agrees with him that everything he does is for the best.

Coordination a Lost Faculty.
It would be a joke, if it were not so serious. He will surely find it out one day that he has not trained right, even though he be good enough to win this fight. He has lost that one necessary thing which a man should have to be at his best, the combination and

union between the eye, the brain and the muscular power. This means that every movement can be made so simply and easily that it is no effort at all. In the two times I have really seen him box here, he stopped about every hard blow his partners aimed at him, with his thigh or his body. He was like a fellow riding backward in an express train. He never seemed to know what he was coming to till he got by. They could hit him anywhere they liked. He had no guard, and when he tried to come in and hit, it was always with a fiery, quick motion that left him open for a smash any old place.

Johnson is such a good marksman with his left that I fear he will make Jeffries look foolish when the bottom-maker tries to rush, and remember, it is on his rushing tactics that the white man's best hopes of victory rest. Johnson is the best defensive fighter I have ever seen. He is quick and cool in the open. When Jeffries rushes he will meet him with the straight left again and again. They say that he cannot hit hard enough to stop Jeffries' rushes. Let us hope this is true, for all feel sure that the negro will land often on his old opponent.

If he wins this fight, it will be because, in his prime, he was twice as good a man as the negro.
