PROTEST AGAINST SHOWING BIG FIGHT PICTURES IS MADE

(Continued From Page One.) of the pictures in St. Louis would be a grave mistake, according to the authorities, and would result in arousing bitter race feeling that might result in bloodshed.

"Motion pictures should not be permitted to be shown unless they are of an educational value," said Mayor Kriesman today. "Such pictures as those of the Jeffries-Johnson fight would stimulate interest in pugilism, which is degrading. I am against the exhibition of the fight pictures and I shall vote against allowing them."

San Francisco, July 6.—Churchmen here have begun a movement to bar the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures from San Francisco. Attorney J. E. White of the Church federation declared today that he believed a municipal ordinance was in force forbidding the display or reproduction of pictures depicting acts that constitute violations of law.

Vancouver, B. C., July 6.—There will be no opposition to the Reno fight pictures here, there being so few negroes in town that people do not know what black and white racial feeling is. The only negro institution here is the porters' club, which sheltered Johnson on his return from Australia, every hotel refusing to accommodate the black champion, as he was accompanied by a white woman he claimed was his wife.

Seattle, July 6.—The Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures will not be prohibited in Seattle. There is little danger of their causing any racial trouble, the police say, the Fourth having passed without a single clash between negroes and whites. The present city administration is of liberal tendency and will not interfere with the pictures.

Lincoln, Neb., July 6.—Chief of Police Malone will probably bar the exhibition of moving pictures of the Jeffries-Johnson fight. A strong movement is under way here to induce the chief to exercise his authority under the municipal law and prevent a display of the fight films.

San Diego, Cal., July 6.—No steps have been taken here to prevent the exhibition of the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures. Superintendent of Police John L. Sehon said today that he knew no reason why they should not be shown as others have been.

Bellingham, Wash., July 6.—The Jeffries-Johnson moving pictures will be welcomed in this city. No racial troubles have resulted here from the battle at Reno. There are few negroes in this section.

Victoria, B. C., July 6.—There will be no opposition to the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures here, there being very few negroes in Victoria.

Indianapolis, Ind., July 6.—"Personally I think the exhibition of fight pictures should be prevented," said Governor Marshall of Indiana today. "I believe the Jeffries-Johnson pictures will cause riot and murder, but I doubt my authority as an executive to prevent their exhibition."

Chief of Police Hyland demands evidence that the pictures will be an evil influence before he will issue an order against them.

Kansas City, Mo., July 6.—Moving pictures of the Jeffries-Johnson fight will probably be barred in Kansas City. Mayor Brown and other city officials conferred today and it is believed they will take action to prohibit the exhibition of the pictures here.

Denver, July 6.—A movement is on foot in Colorado to ask the governor and the mayors of all Colorado cities to bar the moving pictures of the Jeffries-Johnson fight. Governor John A. Sutherland issued a statement today saying he would not attempt to bar the pictures. He declared that such action would be outside his province. The supervisors of Denver will meet Tuesday to decide whether or not they will bar the pictures here.

Des Moines, Ia., July 6.—Motion pictures of the Jeffries-Johnson fight will not be displayed in Iowa. A state law prohibits the exhibition of fight pictures in the state and the law will be enforced. Attorney General Byers today served notice that if the district attorneys in the various counties did not enforce the law he would take action himself to see that the films were not exhibited. The Council in Des Moines met the attorney general to discuss the

to enforce the law when the various district attorneys fail to do so.

Cincinnati, O., July 6.—Declaring that it would be inconsistent to bar prizefights and yet permit the exhibition of fight pictures, Mayor Schwab today issued an order prohibiting the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures in Cincinnati. Prizefights are illegal in Ohio.

Spokane, July 6.—Members of the Ministerial association are preparing to fight an exhibition of the Jeffries-Johnson pictures in this city. Arrangements are being made for a church mass meeting of all denominations to protest against the moving pictures. Mayor Frost said he did not believe any official action would be taken prohibiting the exhibition of the fight pictures, because no notice of intention to exhibit has been received.

Omaha, Neb., July 6.—Acting Mayor Brucker today said that he would not prevent the exhibition of the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures unless all moving picture shows were prohibited.

Medford, Or., July 6.—The leading moving picture theatre of Medford has already made arrangements for the display of the fight films of the Jeffries-Johnson affair at Reno. There are less than a dozen negroes in southern Oregon and no effort will be made to prevent the exhibition of the fight pictures.

Boston, July 6.—Mayor Fitzgerald today barred the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures from Boston, declaring their exhibition would be degrading and deciding against the pictures Mayor Fitzgerald severely arraigned prizefighting and prizefighters.

Sacramento, Cal., July 6.—Mayor Beale does not anticipate any trouble if the moving pictures of the Jeffries-Johnson fight are shown here. "There is absolutely no danger in Sacramento of a race riot and the pictures will do no harm," he declared. "They will not be prohibited."

Pittsburg, July 6.—Unless race feeling is engendered to an extent that rioting takes place, the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures will be exhibited in Pittsburg. Director of Public Safety Mearns and Superintendent of Police McQuade decided today to permit the exhibition.

Milwaukee, July 6.—Chief of Police Jensen will take no action against the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures unless he is convinced they are subversive of the morals of the city. If they prove objectionable, he said today he would bar them.

Austin, Texas, July 6.—Governor Campbell declared today that he would recommend a special session of the state legislature for the purpose of enacting a law to prohibit the exhibition of pictures of any prizefight. It is expected that the mayors of the larger cities of Texas will take steps toward barring the exhibition of motion pictures of the Jeffries-Johnson fight, following the announcement of the governor's attitude.

Washington, July 6.—Believing that more riots would follow the exhibition of the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures in Washington, the commissioners of the District of Columbia today ordered them barred. Chief of Police Sylvester requested the commissioners to rule against the pictures and stated that should the films be shown race riots would be renewed.

Atlanta, Ga., July 6.—"I will certainly

fight pictures to be shown in Atlanta," said Mayor Maddox today. "The pictures would inflame the anti-negro sentiment and the result would be disastrous." The report of the result of the big fight caused clashes between whites and blacks in Atlanta and it is the opinion of the mayor that to permit the pictures to be shown would renew the trouble and perhaps arouse more feeling than the outcome of the fight.

Philadelphia, July 6.—Mayor Reburn today refused to prevent the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures in Philadelphia. He said he did not think the pictures would renew the feeling between the whites and blacks which resulted in riots here Monday night. "I don't anticipate a riot if the pictures are shown here," said Mayor Reburn. "I'll simply spit on my hands and hold back."

Detroit, Mich., July 6.—Referring to the fight between Jeffries and Johnson at Reno as a battle between a black stevedore and a white hollermaker, Governor Warner today said: "I hope the pictures of this degrading spectacle will not be exhibited in Detroit. I will surely use my influence to bar them throughout the state."

Detroit, July 6.—Mayor Brettmeier today held a conference with Police Commissioner Croul to determine whether or not the Jeffries-Johnson pictures should be allowed in this city.

New Orleans, La., July 6.—Mayor Behrman late today changed his mind about permitting the exhibition of the Jeffries-Johnson fight pictures, and ordered the pictures barred in New Orleans. The mayor's first decision was to allow the pictures to be shown, but to prohibit negroes and whites from congregating in the same place to see them.

COLORED MAN SMASHES TWO AUTOMOBILES IN CELEBRATING BIG FIGHT

In celebrating the Reno fight result yesterday, Reuben Miller, a negro, employed as washer at the garage of the Northwest Buick company, damaged one automobile and smashed two others. He was held to the grand jury after a hearing this morning on a larceny charge in the municipal court.

Miller borrowed one machine in the morning and took a number of his women friends on a "joy-ride." Reckless driving soon broke this machine and Miller deserted it on the east side. He went back to the garage and borrowed another auto. He smashed this machine and that of K. M. Holbrook in a collision with the latter's auto. Shortly afterward the police found him and he was held in \$2000 bail.

"I only borrowed those machines to celebrate a little," said Miller, but the court held that the "borrowing" constituted a larceny.

Long Beach Man a Suicide. Long Beach, Cal., July 6.—Former Police Judge J. G. Parish committed suicide early today. He shot himself between the eyes with a revolver. No cause for his deed is known. Parish was 55 years of age. He had lived in Long Beach 13 years and was reputed to be wealthy. He was formerly a practicing attorney at Lincoln, Neb., and Cedar Rapids, Iowa.
