

"BEST TRIP EVER" OPINION OF PARTY ON BAYOCEAN RUN

Members of Portland Auto Club
Royally Entertained on En-
joyable Outing of Four Days;
Sleep in Tents.

The best automobile outing in the history of the Portland Automobile club is the sentiment of 100 motorists who straggled into Portland late yesterday afternoon and last night from the four days' outing to Bayocean Park, made possible through the invitation of the T. B. Potter company.

Twenty-one machines, decorated with pennants, announcing the destination of the party, and loaded with some of Portland's most prominent citizens and their families, left Portland early last Saturday morning and arrived at Bayocean Park late that night. On the way they were royally entertained at McMinnville and Tillamook City, and given a few surprises that were greatly enjoyed. Over Sunday and Monday the party was given the liberty of the new Bayocean resort, and to most of the visitors, the experience visit was an eye opener.

Whole Party "Arrested"

The trip to Tillamook Saturday was eventful. At McMinnville the entire party was placed under arrest by the McMinnville Commercial club and the Civic Improvement association on a charge of fast driving. Sheriff Henderson, with several deputies, including the mayor of the city, made the arrests and performed with great credit to themselves. W. J. Clemens, who was leading the party, was the first to fall into the trap set by the McMinnville officials. He protested vigorously before he detected a peculiar smile on the sheriff's face and saw through the ruse.

Left Portland an hour and a half after the rest, had more trouble than any one with the obstreperous sheriff. On the outskirts of the town the machine was halted and the occupants declared under arrest for exceeding the speed limit through the town of Dayton, the sheriff declaring that the information had been telephoned ahead. It was announced the fine would be \$25 for each occupant of the car. Mr. Crowe became angry, but Mr. Wemmes, being a diplomat, offered his hand to the sheriff and tried to smooth matters.

Cherries McMinnville.

The whole party was conducted to a dining room and served to an elaborate luncheon, and while this was going on baskets full of big cherries and walnuts were placed in each car. The automobiles gave three cheers for McMinnville before starting on.

At Tillamook City the reception to the Portlanders was no less cordial. They were taken to the Commercial club, entertained there and given a sumptuous dinner. Webster Holmes, the president of the club, gave an admirable address of welcome to the crowd, and in behalf of the club and Tillamook, offered the right hand of fellowship to the visitors. The reception by Holmes was one of the features of the trip.

Taken in launches to Bayocean late Saturday evening, the members of the party were put to bed there in the tent city in beds which were pronounced by all to be about the best they had ever slept in. Sunday was spent in looking over the site for the new resort which extends for several miles along the peninsula. It was evident to all that the possibilities of the place are for the greatest coast resort in the northwest.

\$100,000 in Machinery.

One hundred thousand dollars worth of machinery are on the grounds and 85 skilled engineers and mechanics are working on the street grading, the new hotel, the natatorium, and the numerous other features. The place is already supplied with electricity and fine water and a sewer system. The streets are all being cut through and plans are being made to pave them later. The plan is for a hotel larger than the Portland. The foundations for this are being laid now.

Various features of entertainment were furnished the crowd on Monday. These included a costly display of fireworks in the evening, a ball game and an exhibition by the Tillamook head life saving crew. The total cost of entertaining the Portland crowd on the whole trip was about \$3000.

Returning, most of the party came over to Tillamook yesterday morning and left for Portland at about 11 o'clock. W. J. Clemens, the vice president of the Portland Automobile club, tried the speed of his new Buick coming back, and was the first in, covering the distance in five hours and 45 minutes, actual running time. He took the bumps slowly and speeded on the smooth stretches, trying to see just how fast the trip could be made safely.

William Bewley, who drove the press car, refreshed several members of the party with an elegant dinner at his home in Sheridan on the way back.

OREGON MEN PURCHASE OLD MEXICO TRACT

George F. King, a local timber operator connected with James D. Lacey & Co., has just returned from a trip to Old Mexico and reports the purchase by himself and other Portland interests of a 60,000 acre tract of fine irrigable agricultural land.

The syndicate purchasing the land is composed of George F. King, William J. Vauter, H. U. Lundberg, C. I. Hutchinson of Medford, and Charles H. King of Portland. The syndicate will fence the entire hacienda and then lease it to cattle men for a few years, after which an irrigation system will be put in and the land developed. The land is at an elevation of 1500 to 1700 feet, and the temperature ranges from 70 to 90 degrees the year round.

Mr. King says the land is very fertile and will produce abundantly of sugar cane, rice, cotton, tobacco, corn and all kinds of small fruits, berries and melons.

The same syndicate bonded a 50,000 acre tract of white pine which runs about 15,000 feet to the acre.

OREGON TO HEAR COPENHAGEN MAN

Will Address State Dairy Association in Portland; Father of Industry.

Dairymen of the Willamette valley will be given an opportunity of hearing one of the greatest experts in dairying in the world lecture when Professor Bernhard Boegsgaard, of the Royal Danish Agricultural college at Copenhagen, arrives here July 15.

Although Professor Boegsgaard was not in the eminent authority's itinerary, through efforts of Philip Bates, publisher of the Pacific Northwest, he has been induced to come here and address and visit with the people for three days—July 15, 16 and 17.

The professor and his wife will reach Portland Sunday, July 17, but immediately upon their arrival Mr. Bates will whisk them down the Willamette valley in an auto where they will visit the cities of Oregon City, Corvallis, Albany, Salem, Forest Grove and McMinnville. They will be entertained by the commercial clubs of these cities and will visit many dairies on the trip.

Returning Tuesday evening, arrangements will be made for the visit to this city of members of the State Dairy association and on Wednesday afternoon at the Commercial club rooms the professor will address them. Wednesday evening at the same place the state and local medical associations will be invited to attend a lecture.

Professor Boegsgaard's visit to this country is made for the purpose of studying American methods and conditions as well as to lecture. In view of the fact that authorities in this country concede that no city in the world surpasses Copenhagen in the matter of quality and cheapness of milk, the dairymen and others interested in the Willamette valley are fortunate in having the opportunity to hear the lecturer.

The professor is recognized as the father of the dairying industry in Copenhagen, and his influence has made itself felt, not only in his own country, but over a large part of Europe. Mr. Bates believes that it is essential that the professor be royally treated while here so that he may carry a good impression of Oregon and Portland back to his home country, and for that reason the commercial clubs of the various cities throughout the valley will visit with each other in their entertainment; also for that reason a good attendance is desired at the lectures.

FIGHT FILMS CAN BE SHOWN IN PORTLAND

No attempt will be made in Portland to follow the course of some other cities and prevent an exhibition of the moving pictures of the Johnson-Jeffries fight, according to Chief of Police Cox.
