

MUST APPLY AT SEATTLE FOR JOBS

Headquarters for 11th Civil
Service District Recently
Organized in Seattle.

The civil service commission announces that on July 1, 1910, the Eleventh civil service district was reorganized with headquarters at Seattle, Wash. Hereafter applications for all positions in the field service in the state of Oregon should be made to the secretary of the Eleventh civil service district, Post-office building, Seattle, Wash.

Examinations for the first class post-offices at Portland and Salem will be held on the first Wednesday or Saturday in November of each year. Blank forms of application may be obtained only between July 1 and October 1, and must be properly executed and filed with the district secretary at Seattle between July 1 and the close of business on October 1. Applications for November examinations presented at other times will not be accepted.

Examinations for the following named second class postoffices will be held annually when eligibles are needed, due announcement of which will be made, and application blanks will not be given out until examinations are announced: Albany, Astoria, Ashland, Baker City, Corvallis, Eugene, Grants Pass, Hood River, La Grande, Medford, McMinnville, Oregon City, Pendleton, Roseburg, The Dalles.

First grade or clerical examinations for the custom house, internal revenue, and mint and assay services, and all clerical positions requiring similar qualifications in all field branches of the service, will be held annually on the first Saturday in February at the following named places in the state of Oregon: Albany, Astoria, Baker City, Eugene, Grants Pass, La Grande, Pendleton, Portland, The Dalles.

Examinations will be held annually on the first Saturday in February at places at which the first grade examination will be held, as previously indicated, for third grade or subclerical positions. This examination is given for the positions of assistant, foreman and night inspector in the various assay service, and for messenger, watchman, classified laborer, skilled laborer, and all positions requiring similar qualifications in all branches of the service.

Examinations for the noneducational positions of blacksmith, blacksmith and horsefitter, carpenter, marine steam engineer, marine fireman, master, mate, plumber, stationary steam engineer and stationary fireman will be held quarterly for the quartermaster's department at large. Applications to receive consideration for any quarter must be filed in complete form with the district secretary at Seattle not later than the fifteenth of March, June, September or December. Examinations for other positions in this service are held only when eligibles are needed, and no applications are accepted until an examination has been announced.

Examinations for positions in the custodian service will be held only when eligibles are needed, and the announcement of examinations will be made in the public press. The custodian service covers positions the duties of which relate to the care and management of public buildings outside of Washington, D. C.

Examinations will be held by the board of labor employment for the position of unskilled laborer in Portland, Or., only in October. Applications will not be accepted unless filed with the board at Seattle prior to the hour of closing business on October 1.

DEMOCRATS WANT TO CONTROL STATE

New Mexico to Be Scene of
Great Political Battle—
Factions Lined Up.

Rowell, N. M., July 7.—At an enthusiastic meeting of local Democrats here today a movement was inaugurated which has for its object the capture of the new state of New Mexico. The general opinion expressed by the leaders was that the best way to gain political control of New Mexico after statehood was to begin at the very beginning by carrying the fight into the coming constitutional convention. This is taken to mean that the Democrats will probably decide to oppose the movement for a non-partisan constitutional convention.

No Republican can be found in New Mexico who will admit that the Democrats have even a remote chance to gain control of the state. Nevertheless the Democrats are already preparing to make a hard fight for it. Their apparently slim prospects of success have given them the advantage of unity at least. The sanguine hopes of the Republicans have led to a wild scramble for office within the ranks of that party, while the Democrats, on the other hand, could probably decide upon their candidates at once.

On the Republican side there appears to be no end to the aspirants for the senatorships. A few of them are considered only in the light of receptive candidates, but the most of them have already come out into the open and are working to win. Among those who are prominently mentioned in connection with the two senatorial togs are former Governor George Curry, former Attorney General A. B. Fall, W. H. Andrews, who has served the past two terms as delegate to congress; T. B. Catron, a former delegate to congress; Sol Luna, the present Republican national committeeman from New Mexico; Charles A. Speiss, a prominent business man of Las Vegas; M. A. Otero, former governor, and W. J. Mills, the present governor of the territory.

If the Democrats should by some possibility secure control of the first state legislature it is anticipated they would have little difficulty in picking two men of their party for the United States senate. Felix Martinez, a wealthy resident of Las Vegas, would probably be chosen for one of the senatorships, while the choice of the other would rest between A. A. Jones and H. R. Ferguson.

Jewett Family Reunion.

Rowley, Mass., July 7.—A reunion of the Jewett family, the first held since 1855, took place today at the old homestead here. Many members of the family were in attendance, including several from distant places. Rowley was settled by the Jewetts in 1839, and still contains many historic associations connected with the family.

CARUSO'S AFFINITY WANTS MORE MONEY

Rome, July 7.—Some sensational testimony is expected to be introduced in the separation suit of Mrs. Giachetti, the woman who for years was supposed to be the wife of Signor Enrico Caruso, the famous tenor, but who in reality was and still is the wife of Signor Gino Botti, when the suit comes up for trial at Florence tomorrow.

Mrs. Giachetti has been separated from her husband for 10 years. She was singing in the opera house at Florence when Caruso met her, and the two became infatuated. They contracted a union, from which two children resulted, and which lasted for many years. Then their relations became strained

and eventually they separated, Caruso making her an allowance of \$1200 a year for the support of the children. This amount apparently was not deemed sufficient by the woman, for she is said to have traveled to New York early last winter, where Caruso was filling an engagement at the Metropolitan Opera House, and after several stormy scenes at the hotel the famous tenor is reported to have paid her a considerable sum on condition that she return immediately to Europe, which she did.

But recently Mrs. Giachetti has felt the need of more money and accordingly went to a leading society of Milan for a loan of \$5000. It is said. The society was willing to lend the sum, but demanded that the Caruso settlement of \$1200 a year be given as security. While Mrs. Giachetti remains the wife of Signor Botti she cannot get the loan without his consent, and

so she instituted the present action to make her separation legal. Should the husband decide to contest the suit it is expected that much of the story at present merely supposition will be brought out at the hearing.
