

SENSATIONALISM IN NEWSPAPERS WOMEN'S FAULT

Anyway, That is Why Japanese Editor Says: They are Sensational by Nature and Press Humors Them.

(Publishers' Press Lined Wire.)
New York, N. Y., July 9.—That women are responsible for the sensationalism in American newspapers is the belief and declaration of M. G. Data, editor of the Kokumin Shinbun of Tokyo, Japan. The Japanese editor arrived here on a trip around the world, in which he studied the newspapers in every big city. Data is collecting data for a history of journalism, but he does not deny that he is using his information for more practical purposes.

Sees Alarming Conditions.
The paper in Tokyo, of which Editor Data is the head, is a morning journal, but the editor is contemplating issuing an evening edition also. This had something to do with the editor's trip, for as soon as it was decided to give the Kokumin Shinbun an evening edition the editor started out to see how evening papers were made. He came across Siberia to St. Petersburg, where the bomb proof cellars and the artillery of the editors alarmed him. Continuing to Berlin he was again discouraged by the alarming quantity of beer which the German editors consumed. Mr. Data thought that an editor must necessarily drink large quantities of beer, judging from his experience in Berlin. In Paris he failed to keep several engagements because the editors were drinking. These added a new note of discouragement.

All Women's Fault.
In London, the heavy solid looking papers caused the Japanese to believe that no one read them. His most pleasant experience so far has been in New York. Giving his impression of the American press and reading public, he says: "Your papers appeal more to women than to men. Women are sensational in their nature, and you make your papers more sensational than those of any other nation. Women in America, I notice, are coming into a more prominent place in journalism, and all the big papers have many women reporters." Mr. Data is going to Washington to confer with the Japanese ambassador, and is then going to San Francisco, from which point he sails.

MADRIZ GUNBOAT BLOWN UP BY MINE

Commander and Many of Crew Killed; Believed Explosion Was Accidental.

Bluefields, July 9.—The Madriz gunboat San Jacinto was blown up by a mine yesterday in Pearl Lagoon harbor and her commander and a score of her crew killed, according to a dispatch received here today.

The San Jacinto, after contact with the mine, drifted out to sea, carrying with her the dead and wounded. It is believed the explosion was accidental.

Washington, July 9.—That President Madriz of Nicaragua is endeavoring to involve a European power in the revolution in the little republic was brought to the attention of the state department today. An island off the Nicaraguan coast has been offered by Madriz as a coaling station to the power to which overtures have been made.

The name of the country to which the offer was made has not been given out by the state department. It is declared that Madriz asked representatives of the nation to interfere and oppose the American policy in Nicaragua. Madriz has endeavored to create sentiment against the United States for having refused to allow his soldiers to bombard Bluefields during the recent fighting there.

Estrada, provisional president and leader of the revolution, has endeavored to secure American intervention. It is believed one object of Madriz in offering a station to the European power involved was to forestall any interference by the United States.

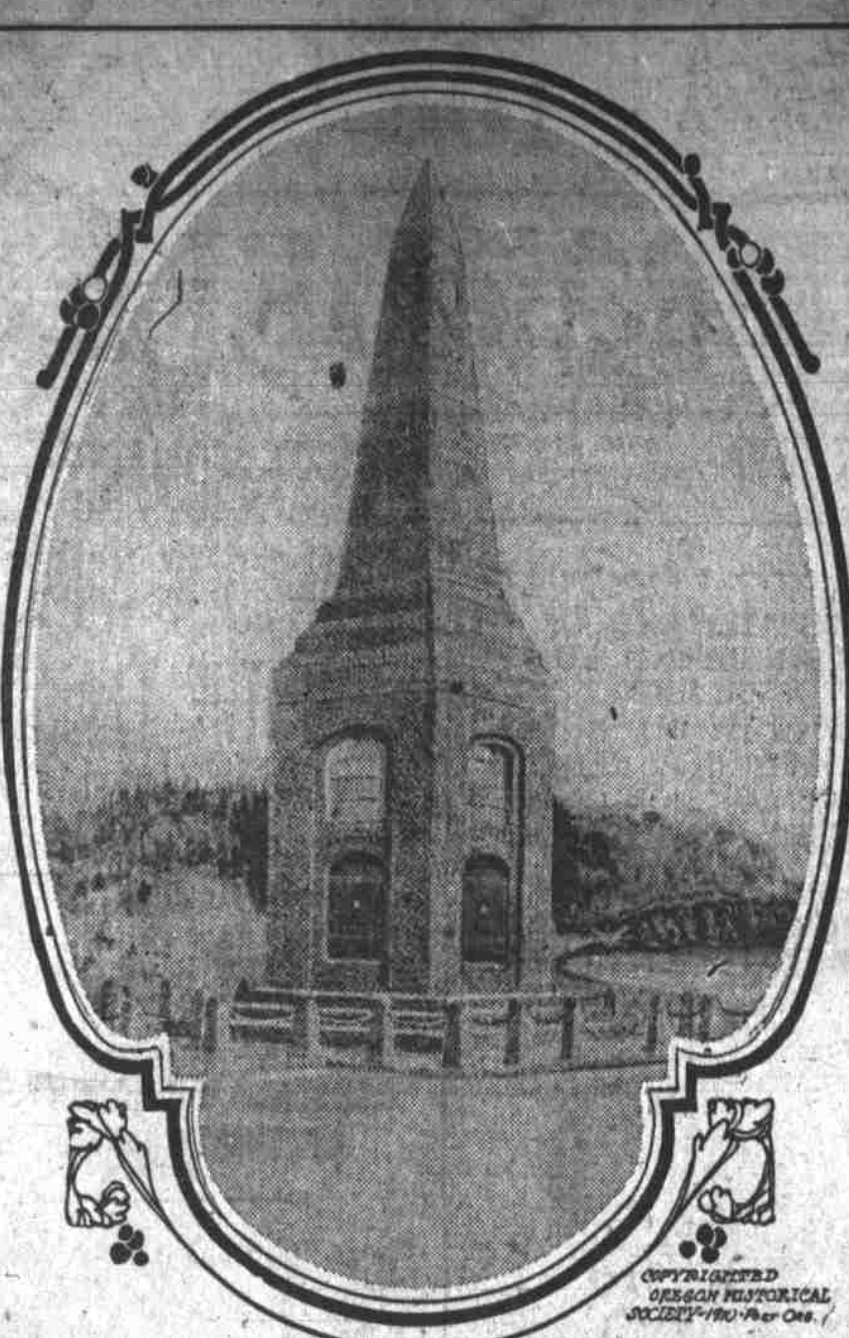


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600 TONS OF COBBLESTONES TO BE USED IN MONUMENT



Memorial to be erected on site of Salt Cairn at Seaside.

This monument, 63 feet high, to be built of 600 tons of cobbles, is to be erected on the site of the salt cairn at Seaside, used by Lewis and Clark in 1806. The foundation was begun Tuesday, when the officers of the Oregon Historical society held brief dedicatory services.

Funds for the work are being gathered by the historical society and the work will be pushed as rapidly as possible. The design was made by George Fassett of Seaside, who will have charge of construction. Land was dedicated by Mrs. Charlotte M. Cartwright, pioneer of 1845.

LOGGERS HIKING BACK TO WOODS

Camps Along Columbia Resume Operations Because of Shortage of Logs.

Logging camps in the Columbia river district will resume operations Monday, and the exodus of employees is now on. Hundreds of them left yesterday and others are getting away from the city today, after having been here to celebrate the Fourth.

Some logging concerns intended re-opening closed another week, but the discovery of a shortage of logs prompted them not to delay getting under way. Tomorrow the big giants of the primeval forest will again begin to fall, but it will be Thursday of Friday before any of these logs will reach the water for transportation to the mills.

A canvass of the situation shows that the quantity of logs on hand at this time is less than half that at the corresponding time last year, but loggers say that this will not affect prices, as there is no desire on their part to work a hardship on the mill men who are selling the manufactured lumber at what is considered a very reasonable value.

The average selling price of fir logs at this time is understood to be \$10.25 on the Columbia river, which means between \$2 and \$3 per thousand. Spruce is quoted at about \$11.

At a meeting of the Columbia River Loggers' association yesterday afternoon plans were prepared for the entertainment of the visiting loggers who will be in this city July 21, 22 and 23 to attend the Pacific Coast Loggers' congress, which is to be held in Forestry building at the old fair grounds. The visitors will be well entertained, in that they will be provided with luncheon every day during the business sessions, with an automobile ride through the city on the evening of Friday, July 22; a dinner at the Commercial club, following the auto trip, and the next day will be devoted to a trip to the camp of the Chapman Logging company at Seaside. This camp is the nearest to the city. The trip will be made in special cars that will be attached to the A. & C. R. R. and switched on to the logging company's rails at Seaside, and then hauled into the depths of the forest where operations are on. This trip, it is expected, will be a most interesting feature of the congress, which is the second annual event.

ANOTHER CANDIDATE AGAINST ASSEMBLY

H. M. Bird, who resigned as a deputy on Sheriff Stevens' staff about 10 days ago, yesterday filed his declaration as a candidate for the Republican nomination for sheriff and announced he will not seek the endorsement of the assembly. He says he is not fighting the assembly idea, but will go direct to the people at the September primaries.

In his declaration Bird says he will, if elected, "give the office my entire time and see that the public has the best of service. I will enforce the laws impartially and will do everything to make Multnomah county a greater and a better county."

MISSOURIANS HERE WILL "SHOW" FOLK

Prepare to Give Him Royal Time When He Arrives to Deliver Address.

Ex-Governor Folk of Missouri, whose lecture on "The Era of Consequence," has won its way into the hearts of the American people, will be the speaker at the Clatsop Beach Chautauqua, July 20. Mr. Folk will go from Portland in a special train provided by the Missouri society, which has taken the lead in honoring the first citizen of Missouri while on his western tour.

The Missouri society, with a membership of nearly 400, will make a splendid showing in a special train which will be chartered for the trip to Columbia Beach. The Chautauqua will open July 14 and continue until July 25. Arrangements are being made to entertain large crowds. Alex Sweek will have charge of providing transportation on Missouri day.

Notices are being sent to members of the Missouri association, of which W. M. Davis is president, and Oglesby Young, secretary, urging them to attend the demonstration in honor of ex-Governor Folk. This enthusiastic organization will attend the Chautauqua in force in company with Mr. Folk.

The special train will leave Portland at 9:20 a. m., July 20. Many of those comprising the party will make arrangements to stay a week at the beach, taking in the balance of the Chautauqua program. Judge Alex Sweek, chairman of the Oregon state Democratic committee, and other prominent Democrats, will comprise a party in the special train. Democrats throughout the state will attend.

A remarkable program has been arranged. Among those appearing will be H. V. Adams, a new man to the Pacific coast. His themes will be "The Power of Music" and "The House of Changing Dimensions." Mr. Adams appears July 18 and 19, at 8 p. m. Dr. Wentworth F. Stewart will deliver his famous patriotic lecture, "Under the Stars and Stripes," at 2 p. m., July 16. W. J. BRYAN MAY LOSE HIS PLANK

Nebraska Democrats Do Not Want His Local Option Part of Platform.

Lincoln, Neb., July 9.—That William J. Bryan will head a forlorn hope when, as delegate from Lancaster county to the Democratic state convention, he endeavors to force a local option plank into the state platform is the consensus of opinion of leaders here.

The Democrats hope to carry this state at the coming election and send a Democrat to the United States senate. The option plank, they fear, would split the party and endanger their chances of success. A dozen county conventions have been held and not one of them has favored the option idea.

Lancaster county, Bryan's home, will probably adopt a plank out of courtesy to him, but it is believed this is as far as he can succeed in his fight.

Bryan has announced that he will lead the option forces at the state convention and he will speak for the system from the floor of the convention.

FOLK'S TALK NOT WELL RECEIVED IN CAMP OF HARMON

Believed Former Governor of Missouri Relies on Bryan to Aid Him in Securing Presidential Nomination.

St. Louis, July 9.—From the trend of events in the Democratic fold, it is evident that former Governor Folk of Missouri is relying on William J. Bryan of Nebraska to assist him in gaining the Democratic presidential nomination. Silence and gum shoe work was never worked to better advantage than it is being used now by the adherents of the former governor who want him to lead the Democratic party in 1912.

Some Are Worried.
It is believed that the candidacy of Folk is causing some apprehension to the friends of Governor Judson Harmon of Ohio, Governor Marshall of Indiana and Mayor Gaynor of New York City. In the case of the two governors there is no doubt that the nomination would be gladly accepted. With Mayor Gaynor it is different. Many believe that the executive of New York City does not aspire to higher office than he now holds and would flatly reject any proposition to elevate him even to the vice presidency. Mayor Gaynor has persistently refused to discuss politics. He says he is not in politics and that it takes all his time to administer the affairs of his city properly.

The Folk boomers are active in the east, in the south and west. Lon Sanders, of the Democratic league of Missouri, has been making a tour through the New England states interviewing Democratic leaders.

Appeal to Radicals.
It is safe to predict that the Folk campaign for the presidential nomination will be made in the manner of an appeal to the radical element of the party. Many of the old radicals still cling to Colonel Bryan and if Colonel Bryan will turn over to Joseph Folk due and proper thanks will be returned. As a Missouri man, Folk thinks he has a strong hold on the southern and middle western Democrats and his emissaries are busy elsewhere.

WATERS IN SEINE THREATEN RAILROAD

JOHNSON IS GLAD TO ACCOMMODATE MISTAH JEFFRIES

And Not Only That, but He Says He'll Lick Him Harder Than Ever—Jeff Would Do More Fighting.

Chicago, July 9.—Replying to James J. Jeffries' announcement that he intended to issue a challenge for a return match for the heavy weight championship of the world, Jack Johnson tonight told the United Press that he was ready to fight the "California grizzly" any place and any time, "providing the proper inducements were offered" and predicted Jeffries would fight harder next time.

Johnson intimated that he would set the mark high and that he would not fight again unless a good sized purse was offered, but evidently believed that there would be no difficulty on that score. While he expressed some doubt as to Jeffries' sincerity in desiring another match, Johnson said he believed one would prove a good drawing card despite the "poor showing made on July 4 by Mr. Jeffries."

Jeff Would Fight Better.
"I have not really broken training," declared Johnson, "although I have been eating heartily and taking an occasional glass of beer. I can get back into fighting trim at a moment's notice and nothing would please me more than to do it. If I do fight Jeffries again I will whip him worse than I did the last time, but I predict that he will do more fighting than he did in Reno. I don't believe he fought as well as he might have. I think he was scared. But if he had fought his hardest, he would have been no match for me."

Jack said he would discuss terms regarding a side bet and purse when Jeffries issued his formal challenge. Johnson shipped his racing car to New York this evening and will start there himself tomorrow afternoon at 3:45 o'clock.

NOTHING DOING; PRESIDENT TO TRY TO "COME BACK"

Nation's Business on Table While Taft Tries to Shake Off 20 Pounds—He's Up to 300 Now.

Beverly, Mass., July 9.—Every important statesman who calls to see President Taft is first searched at the executive offices and all suspicious business looking papers are taken away from him. According to strict orders left by Secretary Norton here, Taft is to have a vacation. There are to be no conferences, no dictating of state papers, no reception of delegations and no special attention to corporations. The program at Beverly now consists of golf, automobile and social calls. President Taft will exercise the same care here this summer that he did last and make the same efforts to reduce his weight. Late last summer, after several strenuous weeks, he took off four pounds. He hopes to take off at least 20 pounds this summer.

There will be long walks for Mr. Taft, a strict diet and perhaps some wrestling and boxing. Although the president tips the beam at the 300 mark, he is quick on his feet and very muscular.

Thinks He'll "Come Back."

President Taft is much pleased at the program which has been laid down for the reducing of his weight. He is particularly glad that Dr. Barker is in charge of it. The Ohio physician had planned a trip into the west where he had contemplated spending the summer, but Mr. Taft was so persistent that he come to Beverly, that the medical man cancelled his western plans and came here. The weight reducing process has not yet started. Nothing is allowed now to interfere with the president's vacation. He goes with John Hays Hammond and Secretary Meyer and takes long automobile rides with Mrs. Taft and is apparently without care. He will enter training with the hope of "coming back" a little later.

ALLEGED ANARCHIST ORDERED RELEASED

Washington, July 9.—The Russian Valadief, a Russian arrested as an anarchist at Honolulu following his action in furnishing information to Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, for use against the Hawaiian immigration authorities, was today ordered released from custody. The order was issued by the direction of the acting secretary of commerce and labor.

Valadief had charged the Hawaiian immigration officials with admitting undesirable aliens to the islands and that they were responsible for peonage.
