

TO DEMONSTRATE HYGIENIC MATTERS

This Number to Be One of Features of Chautauqua Program.

"Accidents and Emergencies; What to Do Until the Doctor Comes," is one of the attractive numbers of the Chautauqua program this year. This stunt, performed in a realistic manner, is given by the Sadler's company of Chicago. Their part of a two days' program is a demonstration of hygienic matters, occupying seven different parts of the program on July 14 and 15.

Local talent, in the person of Mrs. Sylvia W. McGuire, has been secured as a reader and impersonator. Mrs. McGuire has made an enviable reputation in her impersonation of negro characters, presenting one entertainment entitled "Echoes From Dixie Land," dealing with ante-bellum days and intensely interesting and true to fact.

CHORUS GIRL HIT BY TRAIN; MAY DIE

Marjorie Mahr Loses Race With Cars Across Trestle; Left Leg Severed.

Miss Marjorie Mahr, chorus girl with a local comedy company, lost a race with a train across a trestle while on an outing near Fulton yesterday and her life will probably pay a forfeit. At the Good Samaritan hospital, where she lies with her left leg severed above the knee and her right foot mangled, she was very low this morning and her recovery is believed improbable.

Trying to escape the heat of the city, Miss Mahr, Misses Dottie Daniels and Anna Cassell, members of the same company, and Harry Byerstedt, leader of the orchestra, took a car to Fulton after the matinee performance yesterday afternoon and from the suburb started to walk along the Southern Pacific tracks. Byerstedt and Miss Daniels were considerably in advance of the other two in crossing the trestle and had time to escape when they heard the train. The two girls in the rear were unaware of their danger until the train was almost upon them. Calling to her companion to follow, Miss Cassell darted into one of the small boxes

at the side of the trestle provided for such emergencies.

Her friend was too confused and bewildered to follow her example and started to run across the trestle, hoping to reach the other end in time. She had almost reached the point of safety when she stumbled and fell. The engine of the train had applied the brakes when he saw the danger of the party, but the train was still proceeding swiftly when the girl was struck. Her leg was severed by the wheels and her right foot, which was lying partly on the rails, was crushed. Just before the train struck her, Miss Mahr struck her head between two of the ties, saving herself from instant death.

The train was stopped and the girl was brought to the city, a physician on the train giving her what attention he could. She was rushed to the Good Samaritan hospital, where she received consciousness for a few minutes and begged the physicians to save her right leg if they could. She also said that she was the wife of Lewis Hurling, a vaudeville performer now playing in San Francisco.

Miss Mahr is 19 years old and has been playing in Portland for six weeks. She was at various times a member of the "45 Minutes From Broadway," "Wizard of Oz" and "Knight for a Day" companies. She is 19 years old. Efforts are being made by the manager of her company to reach her husband by telegraph.

LUMBER FIRE AT SPOKANE; \$100,000

Spark in Shavings at Springston Yards—Eight Adjacent Houses Burned.

Spokane, Wash., July 11.—Careless dropping of a match or cigarette stub into a shavings bin resulted in the loss of \$100,000 last evening when the Springston Lumber yards and eight nearby houses burned. Owing to the water shortage and consequent low pressure a whole section of the city was for a time threatened by the flames. There was so little water to fight the fire that long lines of hose were burned.

Householders in the path of the flames moved their belongings to vacant lots, assisted by hundreds of spectators.
