Vancouver, Wash. July 12.—Because he was afraid of using his money for doctor bills and thereby rendering his wife and two children destitute, W. A. Tucker of Camas, Wash., sent a bullet through his head at 10 o'clock yesterday and died instantly. Coroner W. J. Knapp and Sheriff Sappington of Vancouver went to the scene of the tragedy last night and, on learning the particulars.
