

CONSERVATIONISTS YIELD SO FAR AS TO PUT TAFT ON

Antis Insist on Representation
on Program of Congress—
Pinchot Men Draw Line at
President and His Nominees.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Taft will be invited to address the National Conservation congress at St. Paul and another speaker whom the president may name will be invited to take part. This decision was reached today at the conference between Gifford Pinchot and a number of his associates and the members of the Twin Cities conservation committee, where it was found that the national association was threatened with disruption if the leaders refused to change the program they had planned. Secretary Thomas R. Shipp of the national association announced the decision after the conference adjourned. Beyond saying that the program would be changed and that Taft would be asked to speak, Shipp refused to comment.

Pinchot refused to discuss the conference. When the conference began today friends of Pinchot said that unless the Twin Cities committee allowed the Pinchotites to have their way the congress would be taken to Kansas City or Denver. The sudden change of front on the part of the officers of the association caused great surprise here.

Beyond Multnomah county the official figures for the November registration are not immediately available, but reference to the official figures for the June registration in that year again shows the Oregonian to have falsified the facts to prove its contention. A cursory glance at the table is all that is needed. In Benton county the Oregonian said there were 2088 registered Republicans and 1172 Democrats. The official record of the June registration shows 1102 Republicans and 630 Democrats, with a total registration of 1933. 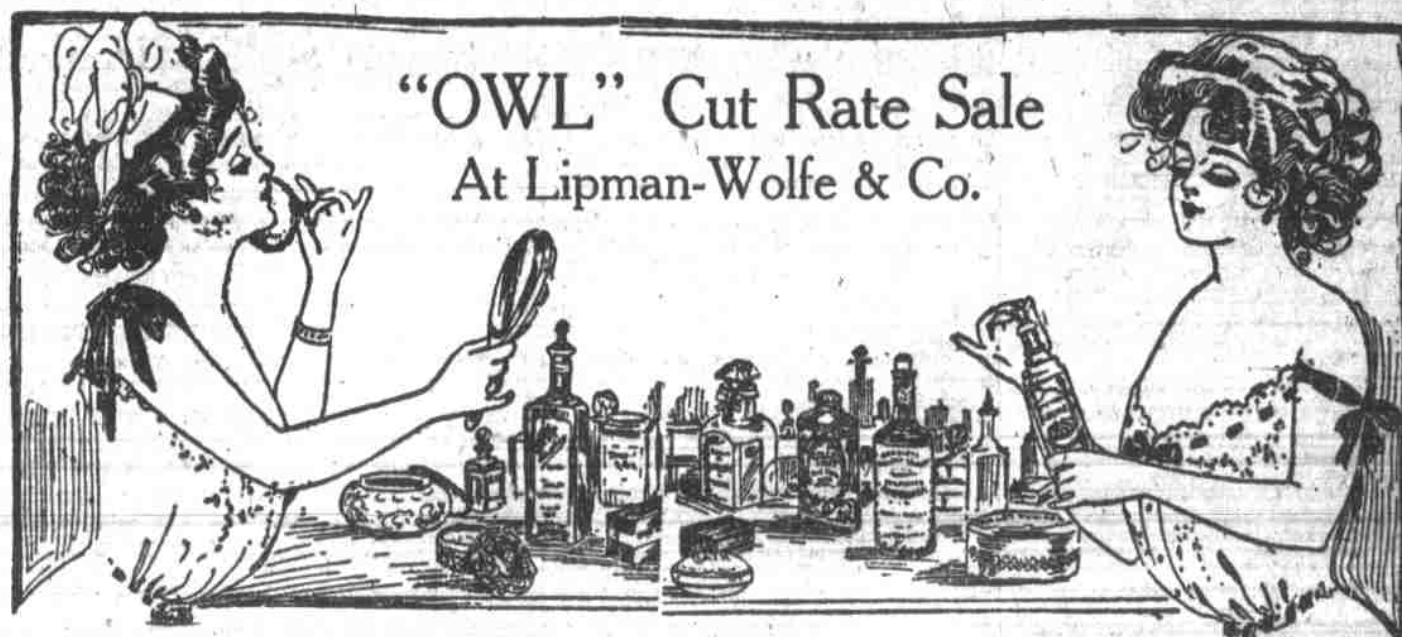
