BILLION FEET OF LUMBER SOLD IN NATIONAL FOREST

To Encourage Railway Company to Develop Humboldt Bay Country—Outlet for Section Now Isolated.

MONORAIL TRIAL TRIP IS FAILURE

Car, Running 50 Miles an Hour, With 47 Passengers, Falls—Many Injured.

San Francisco, July 16.—The district office of the United States forest service announced today that the secretary of agriculture had agreed to offer for sale 1,000,000,000 feet of government timber in the Trinity national forest in Trinity county. This offer is made in response to an application from the proposed Humboldt & Eastern Railroad company, which is considering the construction of a railroad from Humboldt bay to the mouth of the Trinity river, near Redding or Red Bluff. The timber is desired in order to assure the railroad of a large amount of tonnage upon completion.

Representatives of Multnomah county's big corporations had a "slate" in yesterday afternoon's assembly. The slate was "framed up" at several different meetings, one being held in the office of A. L. Mills, president of the First National bank; another in the office of Franklin T. Griffith, attorney for the Portland Railway, Light & Power Co., and the third in the Imperial hotel. This latter meeting was convened after midnight Friday night, and continued until 3 o'clock in the morning, when the slate was fixed up to the satisfaction of the corporation men who attended the meetings.

Everything was done most secretly. Cohen "slipped" the tickets to the ward bosses of most of the 10 wards in the convention, or to the men who could be trusted, and these men were supposed to see to it that the remainder of their delegates voted right. The tickets were neatly typewritten and were distributed early so that the men to whom

New York, July 16.—The first regular passenger trip undertaken by a monorail train in this country ended in a disastrous accident in which a score of persons were so seriously injured that they had to be taken to hospitals. The monorail system runs between Barlow-on-the-Sound and City Island, and it was intended, if successful, to extend it later into New York city. The accident this afternoon was occasioned by the collapse of the superstructure near Glovers rock, between Barlow and City Island. The car, which had been running 50 miles an hour, stopped short with a terrific shock and fell on its side. The 47 passengers were hurled in all directions. The seats on the upper side of the car were wrenched loose and fell on the mangled passengers, cutting and bruising them severely.

Oregon City, July 16.—Although the Clackamas county assembly held here yesterday was only narrowly controlled by the assembly forces, the anti-assembly Republicans were firmly and neatly thrown under the assembly steam roller and given a sample of old-time machine methods before the delegates finally adjourned.

The net result of the assembly was the choice of 55 delegates to the state assembly in Portland, a revelation of the weakness of the assembly movement, a demonstration of the steam roller methods which the assembly leaders showed they were ready to use, and numerous holes in the assembly armor, where the constant bombardment of the direct primary and Statement No. 1 Republicans took effect.

So many of the precincts sent solid anti-assembly delegations that the committee named to select delegates to the state assembly could not avoid naming some anti-assembly men as delegates to Portland. Six and probably seven of the state delegates are strongly opposed to the assembly idea.
