

OFFICIAL BALLOT TITLES PROVIDED FOR 32 MEASURES

State's Attorney General Crawford Identifies Measures to Be Voted on in Election Next Fall.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., July 18.—Official ballot titles by which each of the 32 initiative and referendum measures will be identified by the voters November 8, have been provided by Attorney General Crawford, according to the law. Objections to them may be filed anytime within ten days by any person who dislikes any of the titles prescribed for the measures by Mr. Crawford. Following is the order and measure as they will appear on the ballot:

Proposed by Initiative Petition.
Women's taxpaying, suffrage amendment, granting to all taxpayers, regardless of sex, the right of suffrage.

Referred to the People by Legislative Assembly.
An act authorizing the purchase of a site for and the construction and maintenance of a branch insane asylum to be located, in the discretion of the board of trustees of the Oregon state insane asylum, at or within five miles of either of the following cities, to-wit: Baker City, Pendleton, or Union, in eastern Oregon, to be called "The Eastern Oregon State Hospital."

Referred to the People by Legislative Assembly.
For amendment of sections 6 and 7, Article IV, of the constitution of this state, to provide a separate district for the election of each state senator and each state representative.

Referred to the People by Legislative Assembly.
For an amendment of section 33, article I, of the constitution of Oregon, by omitting the words, "and all taxation shall be equal and uniform," and inserting in lieu thereof the words, "taxes shall be levied and collected for public purposes only, and the power of taxation shall never be surrendered, suspended or contracted away."

Referred to the People by Legislative Assembly.
For amendment of article IX of the constitution, authorizing the creation of railroad districts, and the purchase and construction of railroads, or other highways, by the state, counties, municipalities, and railroad districts, creation of liens upon property or levying taxes for the payment of the same, and nullifying the exemption from taxation of property used for municipal, educational, literary, scientific, religious or charitable purposes. (Note: Another amendment of section 1 of said article IX is pending, and is not in harmony herewith.)

Referred to the People by Legislative Assembly.
For an amendment of section 1 of article IX of the constitution of the state of Oregon, directing a uniform rule of taxation, "except on property specifically taxed," authority on property and collection of taxes for state purposes and for county and other classes of property, upon different classes of property, and appropriating state taxes among the several counties as county obligations. (Note: Another amendment is pending which also amends this section, and is not in harmony herewith.)

An act providing for the payment of \$1000 annually to the judge of the eighth judicial district by Baker county, in addition to the annual salary of \$3000 received by him from the state.

A bill for an act to create the county of Neenah out of a portion of the northern part of Douglas county and the southern part of Lane county, providing for its organization, fixing the salaries of its officers thereof, and for adjusting finances between the three counties.

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stitution of Oregon, increasing initiative, referendum, and recall powers of the people, restricting use of emergency clause and veto power on state and municipal legislation; requiring proportional election of members of legislative assembly from the state at large, annual sessions, and increasing members' salaries and terms of office, providing for election of speaker of house and president of senate, outside of members; restricting corporate franchises to 20 years; providing a penalty for unexcused absence from any roll call, and changing form of oath of office to provide against so-called legislative log-rolling.

Proposed by Initiative Petition.
For amendment to the constitution of the state of Oregon, providing for verdict by three-fourths of jury in civil cases; authorizing grand juries to be summoned separate from the trial jury, permitting change of judicial system by statute, prohibiting retrial where any evidence to support verdict; providing for affirmation of judgment on appeal notwithstanding error committed by lower court, directing supreme court to enter such judgment as should have been entered in the lower court; fixing terms of supreme court, providing judges of all courts be elected for six years, and increasing jurisdiction of supreme court.
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Up to the present time Summer Post has given the matter more consideration than any of the other posts. TO SHOW EAST WHAT OREGON SOIL WILL DO
People who live in the far east and never see much of anything grow but their expenses, will be given an opportunity by the Great Northern to see what a combination of Oregon soil and Oregon climate can produce.

F. W. Graham, western industrial and immigration agent of the Great Northern, passed all of last week in Portland, and will stay here for several days getting together an exhibit for the Oregon demonstration car, which the Hill road will send through the east.

The car will be stocked with all sorts of products of Oregon "processed" or preserved by an expert. Agricultural and horticultural displays will predominate, but there will be an abundance of exhibits of minerals and manufactured stuffs. When the car is well stocked, it will be sent to all parts of the east, accompanied by an experienced lecturer. Thousands of pieces of literature advertising Oregon will be distributed. When the car reaches the different cities of the east its presence will be advertised in the different daily newspapers and the public to go through it free.

MAY INDUCE T. R. TO VISIT PORTLAND
Private citizen Theodor Roosevelt, late of Africa, may be induced to visit Portland for a day or so some time between September 10 and October 8, of this year.

In Los Angeles, Cal., from September 2 to October 2 will be held the sessions of the American Mining congress, and the convention bureau of the California city has invited the former president to speak before the delegates.

Advising the Portland Commercial club of his plans, as it did commercial organizations over all the coast, the Los Angeles convention bureau has asked that a concerted movement be made to get Roosevelt to come to the coast. The Portland Commercial club will bring all possible pressure to bear on the former president and will cooperate with the boards of trade of Los Angeles, San Francisco, Spokane, Seattle, Tacoma and other cities.

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
