Gregg Pitches Good Ball and Seals Never Have Chance to Win.

There was just enough of the humorous in the sand-scared south silder to let the Seals flicker in the ninth inning, and then die peacefully out after making three runs. The final score was 5 to 4, and in making three of our little bunch we chased Handsome Harry Sutor, late a Chicago White Sox, to the bench after 1-3 innings had been played. By the way, it was our first glimpse of the port silder since that memorable Sunday afternoon of August 2, 1908, when Sutor trimmed Jack Gregg, 6 to 5, in a 20-inning game. Eastley succeeded Sutor, and twirled a fair article of ball.

Manager Mac switched his batting order about to meet the left handed proposition imposed by Captain Mohler. Ort played right instead of the off-side Martinke. It was a good move.
