

ST. PAUL MAN IS RAISED TO FIRST PLACE BY A. O. H.

O'Donnell attempted to proceed he was hissed down by the Regan faction. Each time he was hissed down the Cummings supporters with loud cries urged him again to take up the contention.

Candidates Are Nominated.
Father O'Brien of Minnesota proposed the name of James J. Regan for national president of the Hibernians when nominations were opened. The nominations were received with cheers that were less enthusiastic than the applause that greeted the Right Rev. Arthur J. Feehan of Massachusetts when he put in nomination Matthew J. Cummings of Massachusetts. The Pennsylvania delegation then announced a division. Michigan was pledged to Regan. Cummings was pledged the vote of the New Hampshire delegation. Maryland and New York also went solidly for Cummings.

Indiana, Washington, Canada, Georgia, Montana, Texas, Missouri, Alabama, Delaware and Ontario were rapidly pledged to Cummings. It was announced that the Illinois delegation was divided between Regan and Cummings. Wisconsin was pledged partly to Cummings. Iowa was pledged to Regan.

An impressive scene was enacted before the opening of the convention which was presided over by National Treasurer Quinn. The warring candidates, Regan and Cummings, met with hands clasped on the platform before the great Irish assemblage and pledged to all Hibernians that, regardless of whether might be elected, all past differences would be buried; that they would work for the best interests of Hibernianism, for the unity of Irish-American organizations, and for the freedom of Ireland.

Unfinished Business Remains.
The routine work of the National Hibernian convention will not be closed until late tonight. Amendments to the constitution are to be voted upon. A great amount of business remains to be disposed of. Tomorrow they will all take the famous trip up the Columbia river on the Bailey Gatzert which has been chartered for the occasion.

The delegates today said many good words concerning their entertainment here. One of the most distinctive expressions came from Patrick Keane, president of the province of Quebec, whose face is shown in the group of state presidents.

"I have attended all the national conventions during the past 15 years," said Mr. Keane. "I can say without qualification that we never were given such entertainment at any city as we have received in Portland. The climate is perfect, the people are big hearted and hospitable. Every arrangement was made for our comfort and convenience. Every feature of the program has been carried out on the minute. That man, E. H. Deery, who has had charge, who has said little and done pretty nearly everything, is a wonder. He is responsible for the fact that last night's parade moved off on time, instead of being two hours or more late as has been the case in other cities. He has attended to every detail with a splendid patience and a wonderful exhibition of executive ability. National Hibernianism owes much to Ed Deery. Portland is the greatest of all convention cities."

A sum of \$45,000 was pledged yesterday afternoon for the extension of the work of the Catholic church. Of this amount \$25,000 will be spent in church extension in the northwest, the remainder in Canada. Oregon will receive a large proportion of the money to be used in the northwest. The largest single contributor was James O'Sullivan, head of rubber heel manufactory which bears his name in Lowell, Mass. Mr. O'Sullivan gave \$1000.

HIBERNIANS PARADE STREETS IN PAGEANT OF GOLD AND GREEN

"Ood Mille Failte" swung over the city and boomed its "hundred thousand welcomes" from a hundred thousand throats when National Hibernians paraded the streets of Portland last night. It was a procession of green and gold and an embodiment of fervent Irish patriotism.

The battle songs of Ireland crashed in the music of the bands. The battle spirit of Irish-Americans was vivid in the decorations. Participants and spectators alike thrilled with the pageantry displayed by those who have organized and who live to compass Irish independence.

Chief Cox, a platoon of police, Captain Baty and the police band headed the parade, which formed at Tenth and Alder streets. In the first division were Archbishop Christie, National President Cummings, National President of the Ladies' Auxiliary Anna C. Mallie, Grand Marshal J. D. Mann, Chief of Staff F. Hogan, Rev. Father York, Postmaster C. B. Merrick, Acting Governor Jay Bowerman and others, riding in decorated automobiles.

Witness that Hibernians are Americans first. The first float was a beautiful reproduction of the American shield; then the float, "All Ireland," formed like a sprig of shamrock. In this division the delegates from various states marched under their state banners. "The Castle and Harp of Ireland," a float, was the feature of the third division. In division four came carriages containing national officers of the Ladies Auxiliary and representing the 48 states of the union, the Hawaiian Islands and Canada. The last float was in representation of famous Admiral Jack Barry and the frigate Lexington.

The spectacle of the marching Irishmen was imposing. Cheers greeted their march all along the way. The crowds were densely packed from end to end of the line of march.

LADIES' AUXILIARY TO ELECT OFFICERS THIS AFTERNOON

Election of officers will be the task before the ladies' auxiliary of the Hibernians this afternoon. Lively contests have been waged for some of the offices, especially the presidency, and the election is certain to be interesting. The rivalry is of the most friendly character, the question hanging largely on geographical location of the candidates.

The morning session of the convention was given to discussions of amendments to the constitution of the order. Material changes were proposed, and lengthy and able discussions resulted. The amendments were not all passed upon when recess was taken for luncheon.

The attendance is large, the Knights of Pythias lodge room being comfortably filled. Additional chairs have been provided to make it possible for visitors to find seats during the deliberations.

LABORITE MEMBER DENOUNCES AWFUL DRAIN OF ROYALTY

"Immoral," cried a Laborite from the floor.

Balfour retorted, saying that he did not know that the Laborites deemed royalty immoral. Then he added that unless England were able to support a monarchy properly it would be better to alter the system of government and find another that would be cheaper.

He declared that it would be impossible to conduct England as an empire as cheaply as the United States is conducted under a president, and that, besides, he did not believe an English republic would be cheaper than an empire. Sir Charles Dilke declared that the crown lands of Cornwall and Lancaster needed more rigid management by the government.

Gibson Bowles averred that those lands never belonged to royalty in a private capacity, and consequently ought to be surrendered and the revenue should go to the state treasury instead of to royalty. If the king and

the Prince of Wales were permitted to retain the lands and income, he argued, it was improper to allow the king to escape the provisions of the income tax, which applies to every one.

Following the debate the house voted to grant the amount asked in the civil list.

Barnes moved to reduce the amount to \$50,000 pounds. This motion was defeated by a vote of 206 to 26.

James Kier Hardie, laborite, then moved to omit the provision for the royal children except the Prince of Wales and to provide for the queen only if she survive the king. This was defeated by a vote of 207 to 26.
