

PYTHIANS TO MEET AT MILWAUKEE

Biennial Convention of Knights
of Pythias to Be Held One
Week, Aug. 1 to 7.

Milwaukee, Wis., July 22.—Within another week Milwaukee will witness a blossoming out in attire such as has not graced its streets for many years. A small army of decorators has been at work for some time and all will be ready for the city to don its holiday dress when the biennial convention of the supreme lodge and the grand encampment of the uniform rank of the Knights of Pythias begins.

The convention and encampment proper will be held August 1 to 7, but services July 31 in churches all over the city will be the real beginning. The same day is expected to witness the first arrival of troops in camp.

Importance is attached all over the world to this meeting of the Knights of Pythias, and at this time the attendance gives promise of surpassing any previous similar event in the history of the order.

The work on the decorations has progressed so satisfactorily that no difficulty is anticipated in getting the various arches and shafts in place before the end of next week. It is planned to have everything complete before the opening day, with no eleventh hour hurrying when the visitors are already here. The decorative scheme will center in a magnificent court of honor in Grand avenue.

The camp of the uniform rank has been laid out under the direction of General J. B. Zaun, brigade commander of Wisconsin. A beautiful level stretch, situated in the northwestern part of the city has been chosen. It will be named Camp Henry Parish Brown, in honor of the supreme chancellor of the order.

The general parade will take place Tuesday, August 2, on the same day that the supreme lodge holds its opening session. It is estimated there will be at least 25,000 uniformed knights and 50 bands of music in line. Reviewing stands for the accommodation of the supreme officers, state and city officials and invited guests will be erected opposite the courthouse and on Grand avenue.

In addition to the big military parade there will be a parade of the subordinate lodges Wednesday evening. The competitive drill, for which many valuable prizes are offered, will take place on the parade grounds, beginning Wednesday and continuing until Saturday. Another prominent feature of the program will be the exemplification of rank work by the picked teams.

A grand ball will be included among the social features of the week's program. It will be held in the new auditorium, one of the most commodious gathering places in the country, and will be open to all knights and their ladies. Hand concerts and numerous other attractions will be included in the entertainment program.

PRIMARY ELECTIONS IN TEXAS TOMORROW

Austin, Texas, July 22.—Following one of the most hotly contested political campaigns in the history of Texas, a general primary election will be held throughout the state tomorrow for the purpose of nominating a United States senator, 16 representatives in congress, members of the legislature and governor and other state officials. The nominations on the Democratic ticket will be equivalent to election.

Senator Charles A. Culberson, who is a candidate for reelection, has no opposition. Nine of the 16 congressmen will be renominated without opposition. The congressmen facing opposition are Dies of the Second district, Simpson of the Third, Beall of the Fifth, Randall of the Fourth, Greck of the Seventh, Gillespie of the Twelfth, and Stephens of the Thirteenth.

The contest for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination, which has been actively waged for six months or more, is the feature of the election in which most public interest is manifested. There are four leading contestants in the race and the final result cannot be foretold with certainty. The candidates are William Polk of Johnson county, Robert V. Davidson of Galveston county, O. B. Colquitt of Kaufman county, and Cone Johnson of Smith county. A fifth candidate who has not figured very prominently in the contest is J. Martin Jones of Cherokee county. State wide prohibition and "Bibleism" are the chief issues of the fight.

CITY RECEIVES \$500 FROM UNITED RAILWAYS

An unpaid fee from the United Railways company for a franchise in 1907 has been paid to the city treasurer. This fee is \$500, and was practically forced from the company by City Auditor Barbur, who discovered the Oregon Traction company agreed to pay that amount each year for the franchise for certain streets, upon which they proposed to lay tracks. The tracks were not laid, and the company forgot to pay the same for 1907.

When the United Railways company took over the Oregon Traction company in 1908, nothing was said to the city about paying the back amount. When the new company asked for an extension of time on the Mount Calvary cemetery line, the city auditor wrote the company about the unpaid fee. The extension was granted, and the matter of the \$500 was referred to the city attorney for an opinion.

City Attorney Grant advised the auditor that the fee was due the city, and suggested the plans necessary to collect it. This was done, and another demand for the money brought it.

May Be King of Spain.
Madrid, July 22.—His Royal Highness the Infante Don Jaime of Spain, second son of King Alfonso, entered upon his third year today, having been born at La Granda palace, July 22, 1908. He is a fine, active little chap, fond of donkey riding and extremely interested in everything pertaining to the military. On account of certain infirmities of speech and hearing which rumor attributes to the king's elder son, the Prince of Asturias, there is a growing belief that Don Jaime may succeed his father on the throne.

STOWAWAYS HAVE ENOUGH OF JAPAN

San Francisco Lads Fail to
Find Joy and Wealth in Land
of Cherry Blossoms.

Victoria, B. C., July 22.—Japan is not a land flowing with milk and honey, according to the story of two San Francisco lads who arrived from that country on the steamer Ava Maru. They do

not like Japan, and they do not like Japanese fare. Salt cabbage, salt turnips and rice is not a diet to their taste.

The lads are only 18 years of age. Thinking to make their fortunes on the other side, they took passage from San Francisco and arrived in Japan with only a few cents in their pockets. They could not find employment and neither Japanese, American nor English residents wanted them nor would lend them any assistance. They managed to visit Nagasaki, Kobe and Yokohama, but found neither to their taste and then they found themselves without food.

At this point more difficulties arose. The British and American consuls could give them no aid except to recommend them to the captain of a steamer, who did not want them. They were ingenious, however. Going aboard the Japanese liner, they crept into a small room, where men are not supposed to enter and on the outside of the door were seen the letters "engaged." There they remained while police officers ransacked the boat in search for them. After the steamer was well out at sea,

they came forth and were permitted to live and eat with the Japanese steerage passengers.

Bootlegging Charge Against Six.

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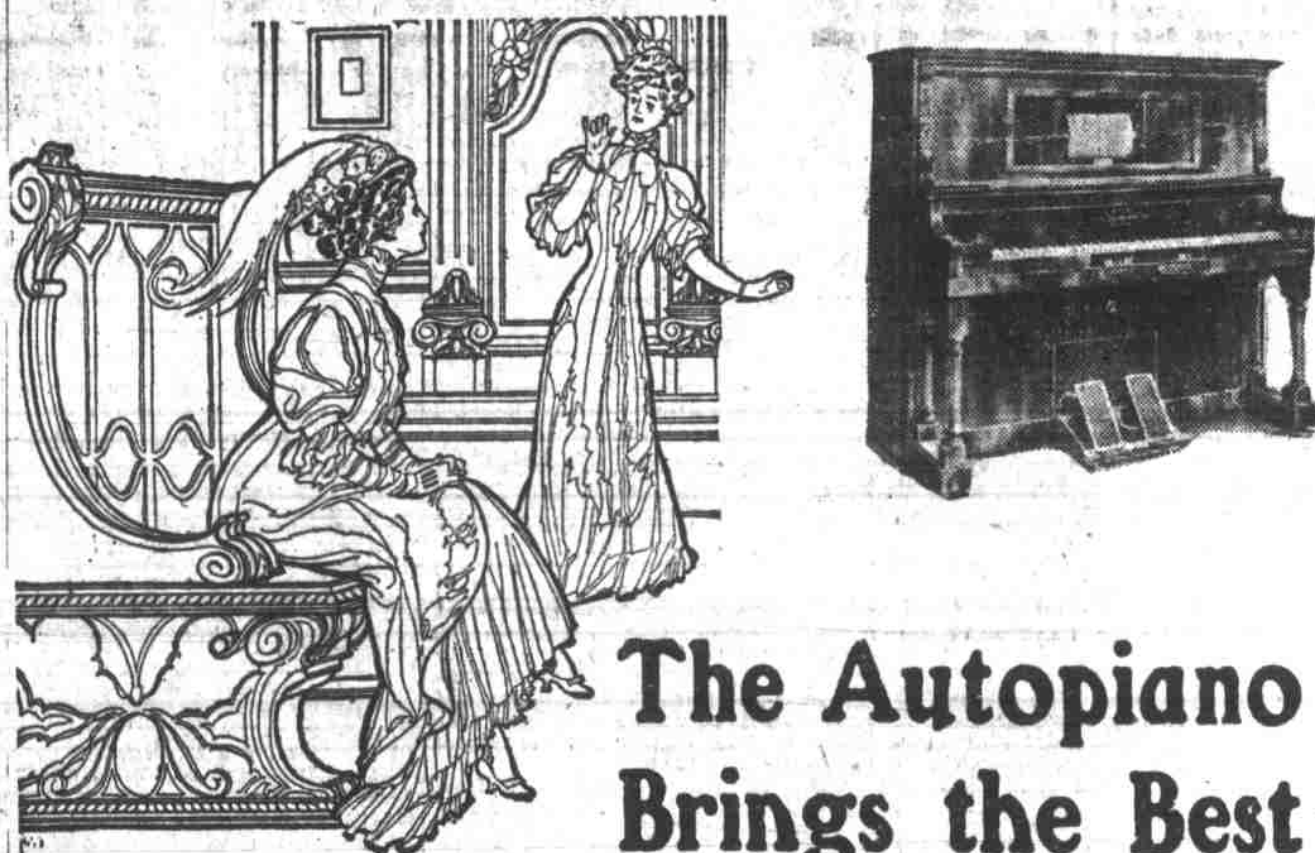
