

DIRECT PRIMARY ADHERENTS OPEN FIGHT TOMORROW

State Campaign Starts With Mass Meeting at Salem—Assembly Ticket Will Be Opposed in Marion.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., July 22.—Direct primary adherents will open their state campaign in this city tomorrow afternoon at an open air meeting in Marion square. Addresses will be made by Dan Malarkey of Portland, George C. Brown of Oregon City and Willis Dunaway, state printer. No attempt will be made to recommend any person for office, but those who contemplate filing declarations of candidacy for county offices and for the state legislature from this county under the direct primary law will be present, and will address the gathered voters.

Saturday evening another meeting will be held at Astoria in this county, and subsequent gatherings will be held throughout the county.

A full legislative ticket will oppose the assembly ticket in this county, and there will also be direct primary candidates for those county offices where candidates on the assembly ticket are not also the people's candidates elected under the direct primary plan two years ago and serving their first term.

E. Hofer, who yesterday announced his candidacy for governor, will open a statewide campaign Monday. He will make every city, town and hamlet in Oregon by automobile, and will be on the road from now until the primary election on September 24. Hofer has planned a complete and vigorous campaign, and has already hired halls and meeting places in practically every town in Oregon.

LAWYERS CONTROL STATE ASSEMBLY

Legal Lights Shine Brilliantly When It Comes to Conducting Party Gathering.

Portland, July 22.—To the Editor of The Journal.—In view of the criticism that the Oregonian has made against the lawyers' assembly recently held, because it was composed of lawyers who, as the Oregonian declares, make their living off the public, it would be well to note that the state Republican assembly does not seem to have the same prejudices against the profession. For instance, that the chairman of the state central committee who called the assembly to order in an eloquent speech, was Judge George A. Sawyer, a lawyer; that the secretary of the stand, C. E. Lockwood, is a lawyer; that the assembly unanimously elected for its temporary chairman W. C. Bristol, a lawyer; that while this lawyer was preparing the committee to conduct the convention and declare its principles, he called to the chair C. N. McArthur, a lawyer, who proceeded, in order that the assembly might be entertained, to call for speeches and in response to his call, George Brown, a lawyer, Mr. Stapleton, a lawyer, Honorable William W. Fulton, a lawyer, D. Solis Cohen, a lawyer, and Judge R. B. Butler, a lawyer, responded and spoke to the assembly. Although there were something like 1200 other gentlemen here, the second temporary chairman called for J. L. Rand, a lawyer, and Judge Benson, a lawyer, who were absent. There were only two speeches by laymen.

Lawyers Prepare Platform.
Then, the next order of business being the presentation of the platform, Judge H. H. Northup, a lawyer, as chairman of the committee, composed largely of lawyers, read to the convention the declaration of principles.

In the meantime the nominations for congressmen being in order, the two districts organized and Mr. Colvig, a lawyer, put in nomination Mr. Hawley for congress and Mr. Huston, a lawyer, as chairman of the congressional assembly, put in nomination Mr. Ellis, a lawyer, for congress.

Nominations for governor being then in order, R. Butler, a lawyer, in an eloquent speech, nominated for governor, Jay Bowerman, a lawyer. His nomination was seconded by Mr. Stapleton, a lawyer, and several other lawyers.

Dr. Smith, a physician, was then put in nomination by Wallace McCamant, a lawyer, whose nomination was seconded by Mr. Jayne, a lawyer, and by Joe Bennett, a lawyer, amongst others. Charles B. Moore, a lawyer, was also put in nomination.

The result was the nomination of Mr. Bowerman, a lawyer, over Dr. Withycombe, a professor in the agricultural college. Dr. Smith, a physician, and Mr. Ackerman, superintendent of public education.

In the proceedings in the evening the lawyers took a prominent and controlling part. Enough appears, however, by this report to show that lawyers were not discriminated to any great extent in the assembly held under the advice and auspices of the Morning Oregonian. It is difficult, therefore, to perceive how one assembly may be denounced because it is composed of lawyers of all political faiths, and another assembly be supposed to represent the virtue and intelligence of the Republican party when all of its words and most of its acts are the words and the acts of the legal profession.

Their effort to show the films last night nearly caused a riot. After the theatre had been filled with an eager audience, the owners of the building informed Nixon and Zimmerman that they were violating the provisions of the lease by exhibiting the pictures.

When it was announced that there would be no pictures the audience protested and almost mobbed the box office in its haste to collect ticket money.

TEACHERS HOLD CLOSING SESSION

Sixth Annual Institute of Catholic Educational Association Makes Progress.

The closing session of the sixth annual institute of the Catholic educational association of Oregon will commence this afternoon with an address by the Most Reverend Archbishop Christie and Reverend P. C. York, D. D. The institute has been attended every day by over 300 teachers and has been the most successful ever held.

"The work accomplished," said Father O'Hara, this morning, "has been almost entirely along practical lines and with very little theory. I consider the institute a great aid in upholding the standard of education in the schools. Forty-three schools were represented at the sessions of the institute and we expect more to come in this fall."

The main address this morning was made by Bishop Carroll of Helena, Mont., on "Work in the Catholic School System." The bishop traced the history of the growth of the Catholic educational system.

"The school system," he said, "is an integral part of the life of the church and no parish is complete without the school."

The speaker then encouraged the teachers in their work and pointed out that they have the great mission of training the young who will be the future citizens.

WIFEY WOULD NOT COOK HIS MEALS

Louis Sherman Says Spouse Wanted Diamonds and Idleness.

Instead of a happy honeymoon for Mr. and Mrs. Louis Sherman, trouble crept into their home and from the second day after the wedding, he charges her with treating him cruelly. Upon this and other showing this morning in the circuit court, Judge Gatens out the bonds that have held them as husband and wife. The suit was not contested.

Sherman testified that he left his wife three times, returning to her upon her promise to be good. A change was noted for a few days, he said, but trouble would soon break out and he would be compelled to again desert her. Among the chief complaints he had was that the wife would not prepare his meals. He was often compelled to go to the restaurant when the pantry was loaded with food, only waiting for Mrs. Sherman to prepare it for the table.

What he did for his wife, he declared, was never appreciated, and things went from bad to worse, until he could no longer tolerate it. Another form of cruelty which she inflicted upon him was that of telling him that she would leave him, and go away with a man who would furnish her with diamonds. She frequently reminded him of this, which, though was very painful to harbor. He also said she frequently swore at him, and accused him of meeting other women. They were married in 1905.

Gertrude Ward wanted a divorce from Harry Ward. They were married in South Dakota, and separated in haste. This happened in 1909. She traced him to Billings, Mont., and later heard of him at Reno, Nev., where another young woman figured in his life.

Mary J. Luce had a complaint against her husband, Frank, who left her soon after they were married in 1903 at John Day, Or. She was declared free from her husband.

JURY BLAMES NO ONE FOR DEATH OF BOY

No censure was placed on anyone in the verdict of the jury, which held an inquest over the body of John Klein, the five year old boy who was killed by a steam roller on Brazes street Wednesday morning. The verdict was returned this morning. Charles Ames of the Pacific Bridge company, denied before the jury that he had allowed boys to ride on the roller. Robert Austin, seven years old, declared that he and young Klein had ridden on the roller two weeks and that Ames had not ordered them off.

SEVEN MEN WILL A SUEVE FOUR POW WITH WORKMEN

Three Arrests Follow Trouble Yesterday Morning, and 4 Warrants Are to Be Served; Truitt Arrested.

Two arrests were made last night, following the attack on cablebreakers at Sixth and Irving streets yesterday morning. At the instance of the Employers' association, and warrants are out for four more. A warrant has also been issued for the assault of J. B. Tucker, who was attacked on Second street Tuesday, while Andy Capon, the special officer detailed to guard him, was in a saloon.

One of the men accused of assaulting Nicholas Krueger, who was injured in the Sixth street case, is E. E. Truitt, whom Krueger shot in the leg. A warrant was served on Truitt while on a cot in the hospital, charging him with assault with a dangerous weapon upon Krueger. An officer is guarding him. His case was continued for three weeks, when brought up in municipal court this morning. It is expected he will be out of the hospital by that time.

A Gordon, a striker, was arrested this morning by Deputy Constable Kierman for assaulting Krueger. Nels Martinson, aged 24, a striking teamster, was arrested at Sixth and Gilliam streets by Patrolman W. D. Humphries. He is alleged to have been one of the six men who attacked Krueger.

Another disorder marked the progress of the strike last night when an unknown man stopped a team owned by Clay S. Morse, at Eleventh and Everett streets. Patrolman Bennett ordered him to get out of the way and when the man refused he placed him under arrest. The patrolman, the fourth husband Bennett had started to use his club when the man suddenly jerked away and escaped.

Chief of Police Cox this morning appointed several special officers to fill vacancies made by suspensions, but there were no additions to the force. The chief declared that he believed the special officers now serving with the assistance of the regular members of the department were competent to guard the mutual resources of the forests and the Pinchot policy in general.

He held that it would be impossible to patrol the territory where disorders have taken place in such a manner as to have an officer on the spot when the trouble occurs.

ANOTHER CANDIDATE GIVES ASSEMBLY GO-BY

"In Hood River county," said Samuel W. Stark yesterday, "the assembly named a full ticket for the county and with the exception of county judge a full primary ticket is out. As there are about 35 per cent of the Republican vote in the county, the primary ticket will undoubtedly prevail."

"I am a candidate for the nomination of circuit judge in the Seventh district on the Republican ticket, but would prefer defeat than to be endorsed by the assembly," he said. "I have no knowledge of the corporations and could have probably been endorsed by the assembly, if I had lined up for the corporations, but instead I requested the assembly delegates to leave me out."

WASHINGTON BANKERS INDORSE FRISCO FAIR

HOOVER, Wash., July 22.—The Washington State Bankers association this morning endorsed the Panama Canal expedition to be held in San Francisco in 1916 and pledged its support of the organization to assist in bringing about the fair.

The chief address of the morning session was that of Honorable J. L. Lohndorf, state bank examiner, on "Needed Changes in the Banking Laws." He said the majority of the board of directors of a bank should be residents of the state; that only citizens of the United States should be allowed to operate banks, and named a Japanese and a Hindu bank both doing business in this state as examples. He spoke at length on other subjects and wanted the bankers to cooperate with the office newly made and work for the best interests of all.

SCHOOLS OF UNION COUNTY SHOW GAIN

Salem, Or., July 22.—Enrollment in the public schools of Union county increased last year over the previous year from \$785 to \$898, and the census shows an increase during the same period of from \$274 in 1909 to \$77 in 1910, according to a report from the superintendent today.

Only 120 teachers were employed last year, however, as against 124 for the previous year, and about \$56 for 1909. The average monthly salary male teachers in Union county is \$32, and that of female teachers is \$33; there was no increase during the year. The sum of \$101,937.85 was expended for school purposes last year, as against \$84,544.66 for the previous year.

WESTERN FEDERATION TO SUE HOMESTAKE

Denver, Colo., July 22.—For alleged violation of the anti-boycott law the Western Federation of Miners, in convention today, adopted a resolution instructing the executive committee of the organization to bring suit against the Homestake Mining company in the United States court at South Dakota.

It is charged by the miners that the company refused to employ union men, requiring a pledge before employment that they would not join a trades union.

MRS. DIETZ SAYS HUSBAND WAS CRUEL

Alleging cruel treatment, Lella Dietz has sued for divorce from Benjamin Dietz in the circuit court. She says he struck her many times and made false accusations as to her conduct with Warren Williams. They were married in October, 1907. The cruel treatment is alleged to have commenced on Christmas following.

NORTHERN LOGGER ALONE IN RAP ON PINCHOT POLICIES

J. J. Donovan, of Bellingham, Stirs Convention of Loggers by Sudden Attack on Conservation Movement.

War was openly declared by the Clackamas and Columbia county delegations against the Multnomah delegation in the Republican state convention this afternoon when O. W. Eastman of Oregon City, after being turned down in favor of L. G. Clarke for joint senator, announced he will run independently.

For a half hour or so, while the three delegations were in caucus, there was open war that caused worried expressions to flit over the faces of the delegates, and caused many attempts on the part of members of the Multnomah body to reconcile their brethren from Clackamas and Columbia counties.

Barlett Is Defeated.
Failing to get the nomination for joint senator Clackamas then put in the name of E. W. Barlett, of Estacada, who held the convention of last week in line, for joint representative. So hot became the fight and so belligerent the attitude of the visiting delegations from the other counties, that a count vote was taken. Barlett, with 26 in his favor, was beaten by Jack Latourette, whose vote was 42.

The row started on the convention floor when J. H. Gibson, of Clackamas, tried to get Eastman's name before the convention. The motion to read the endorsement by the two outside counties of Eastman was voted down, and when Mr. Gibson protested, he was choked off by a motion that he was out of order. He said Clackamas has had no joint representative for eight years despite the pledge of Multnomah Republicans, and opposed a motion to ratify endorsements for joint senators and representatives "in a bunch."

Then the Multnomah, Clackamas and Columbia county delegations, presided over by L. L. Porter, went into caucus in the convention hall, and there the fight grew bitter. Opposed by the Multnomah delegation, which is nearly five times as strong as the combined delegations of Clackamas and Columbia, and which was instructed by L. G. Clarke, Eastman got up on a chair and presented his compliments.

"It is an absolute farce to call us over to this convention," he said. "If you have been instructed for Mr. Clarke, we are absolutely helpless. Mayor Simon, who sat here near me a few minutes ago, was at the helm in 1899, when the measure was passed by the legislature creating a joint senatorial district of Clackamas, Columbia and Multnomah counties. But you have not been fair."

"I am a member of your assembly," (Cheers.) "You won't cheer when I finish. The action of your Republican legislature in 1899 and its promises have not been carried out. Yet it is just as binding in this convention as it ever was. You can't meet in assembly and repudiate a promise."

Will Run Anyhow.
"I say I am the joint assembly candidate. I am entitled by pledged faith to the Republican legislature. I'm entitled to run for the office in the Fourteenth district, and I'm going to do it. I withdraw my name from the convention."

To newspaper men Mr. Eastman said he intended to run as the Republican candidate for joint senator.

After Mr. Eastman got down from the chair he had been standing on, Rev. C. E. Cline, a member of the Multnomah delegation, got up and asked agitatedly, "Does this mean that this man is going out to run?" He was not answered.

Then the name of Jack Latourette was put in for nomination as the Republican candidate for joint representative from the three counties. He was Multnomah's candidate. The other two counties put E. W. Barlett in nomination. Delegates from the outside counties, who made an uproar when it was moved that Latourette be unanimously named, were successfully squelched until Thomas Hisslop, a member of the Multnomah crew, arose and said, "For God's sake give these people justice." The vote which nominated Latourette was taken.

After all was over, delegates from Clackamas and Columbia counties said that the assembly in those regions will hereafter be a thing to be sneered at. "Think what O'Ken will do to us when we get back," one of them said.
