BONEHEAD PLAY ROBS BEAVERS OF CONTEST

When Tommy Sheehan sprang an ivory skulled bit of base running in the eighth inning yesterday on a perfect "squeeze" bunt by Billy Speas, Portland virtually handed the game on a silver platter to the Seals, 5 to 3. Naturally enough, all the starch was taken out of Steen and Tennant's homer, that broke up the game in the ninth, was more easily made.

Portland had the bases full in the fatal chapter, with one out. Sheehan was on third by virtue of a walk while Martinke and Casey adorned the other cushions through singles. Speas came to bat with instructions to bunt, and he carried them out perfectly. He converted one of Brown's shots into a bunt, and a few feet in front of the plate. Sheehan ran up toward the plate, stopped suddenly as if bewildered, and then retreated to third. In the meantime Brown shot the ball to Williams at the plate to force Tommy; and the latter trotted up to third and put Martinke out for a double play, as he was trying to make the bag. Had Sheehan dashed for the plate as Speas dumped the ball, there could not have been a prettier example of the play. But for some reason or other Tommy lost the drift of things, and a chance to get into the lead was lost.

Bad as Sheehan's "solid bone" was, Martinke's was even worse. When Sheehan pulled his sneak back to third, Martinke turned and dashed back toward second, while Casey was frantically motioning for him to beat Williams to the bag and be safe. But Martinke was oblivious to what was going on, while the keen-headed Williams gets credit for the easiest double play ever pulled off at Vaughn Park.

Tennant settles matters for sure in the ninth, when, as the first man up, he smashed the ball over the right field fence, a few yards inside the foul line.

Portland's brace of runs were made on Vitt's error. With one gone in the third inning, Ryan was on base through a fielder's choice. Olson slammed a double to left field and Buddy hove to at third. Rapps felt victim to three strikes. Then Sheehan drove one at Vitt, who heaved to Tennant. The throw was low and the ball scooped out. Tennant's paw. It was little exertion for Ryan and Olson, Indian file, to score.

San Francisco made one of the runs back in the fourth, when Lewis reached third on a three-ply hold to left field. Garrett was pitching during this period, and was saved a teup when Buddy Ryan plucked Bodie's long fly from among the splinters in the left garden wall.

Melchior got Jerry to one of Jesse's slants in the next frame, and it burrowed its way into the embankment in

left field. Before Ryan and Speas could excavate Melchior was fanning his tooties on third, and before the wisenheimers could have a chance to yelp, Manager Mac jerked Garrett out and sent Steen to the eminence.

Williams Takes Kindly.

Williams took kindly to Steen's offerings and clouted one of them to left scoring Melchior. After that Steen held the visitors safe till the ninth, when Tennant four-bagged out of the enclosure.

Probably the largest ladies' day crowd of the season was on hand to see their favorites hanged, drawn and quartered by Mohler's ruffians. Buddy Ryan warmed his way into the collective hearts by a number of nifty catches. Gus Fisher came limping across the field in the closing innings, and the girls gave him the glad hand. Gus was sent in in the ninth, but the best in his single repertoire was a fly to McCardle.

San Francisco, July 23.—With the fighting game "on the blink," the sports here are beginning to turn their attention to wrestling as an athletic diversion.

Louis Blot, whose efforts to stage a Kaufman-Langford scrap three weeks ago caused Governor Gillett to send in the militia to San Francisco, is figuring on presenting a wrestling match between Frank Gotch and George Hackenschmidt. Gotch and the "Russian Lion" would probably draw a large crowd. Blot has cabled Hackenschmidt offering him the match, and expects an early reply. Gotch, it is believed, would jump at the chance to meet the Russian.

Blot thinks the go would pack his arena on Admission or Labor day. He has not yet talked terms with either man, but anticipates no difficulty in completing arrangements.

The big match probably would be well received in the absence of the monthly big fight cards that have so long been an attraction in San Francisco.
