

APPLE WILL BE KING IN PORTLAND, NOV. 30 TO DEC. 2

Show of Coming Fall to Be Greatest in History of Oregon; Will Be Held Early to Avoid Frost.

The apple show to be given on November 30 and December 1 and 2 under the auspices of the Oregon State Horticultural society will be the largest and most pretentious ever held in the state if the plans of the secretary, F. W. Power, and others interested work out successfully.

For the reason that the show this year will be held two or three weeks earlier than last season's show was held, the chances are greater that there will be no freezing weather to interfere, and hence the growers can ship in their exhibits without any danger of their being injured by frost. Last fall many growers in Medford and eastern Oregon points who had prepared unusually fine exhibits were kept away on account of the inclement weather.

The occasion will have a double significance due to the fact that it is the twenty-fifth anniversary of the horticultural society. The exhibits will be by Oregon growers only.

Cash Prizes Total \$2000. It is expected the cash prizes will amount all told to about \$2000. Besides this the horticultural society will offer 50 or 60 medals. The premium list will be out early in August. The premium donations received so far are more numerous than was the case last year, but several more subscriptions are still expected from various commercial bodies in the Willamette valley and other business towns.

In order not to have the prizes lunched on two or three kinds of exhibits, Secretary Power, with the sanction of all the growers, is arranging the classification of all the awards. One new feature of the show which, it is expected, the exhibitors will appreciate, will be the awarding to each one winning a prize a beautiful diploma. The diploma will be large enough to look well in a frame. It is thought this stunt will be a drawing card for many exhibitors who would not show otherwise. Last year the stunt failed with the announcement of the premiums won were issued.

Prizes for Vegetables. The show will be held on the fourth floor of the Meier & Frank building, where there will be considerably more space for exhibiting than last season's show had. A number of prizes and medals are offered for vegetable exhibits. At the last show no vegetables were shown, but this time with the fact known that prizes for vegetables are up, it is thought the growers will respond. It is the desire of the management that the vegetable exhibits be made a prominent feature of the show.

It is the plan of the Oregon State Horticultural society, the hotel men of the city and the Portland Commercial club to hold a big apple show one year from this fall in the Armory or in other commodious quarters and make the affair as pretentious as the National Apple show of Spokane. There was some talk of attempting the stunt this fall, but it was decided to postpone the big show for another year in order to allow the farmers time to grow their exhibits and give the organizers plenty of time to solicit subscriptions for premiums and complete the necessary arrangements for so large an undertaking.

It is the intention to secure exhibits from all over the northwest for this show. The premium list will necessarily have to be large, but in each case business houses and interested persons in the sections from which the fruit is brought will be asked to furnish the premiums.

Agitation for the big show will be started immediately and the work of getting out the premium list will be under way during the apple show this fall. The prominent hotel men of the city and the Portland Commercial club are very much interested in the proposition and sufficient backing is promised to make the affair a big success.

TELLS OREGON HISTORY IN MAGAZINE ARTICLE

Mrs. Beattie Guinean Stone, a newspaper and magazine writer of considerable experience, has composed for publication in the Simmons Magazine of New York a historic article about the state of Oregon and intended as an advertisement for Oregon, and Portland in particular.

The article will appear in four or five of the monthly installments of the magazine and will be about 60,000 words in length, all told. The first installment will appear in the September issue of the magazine.

Mrs. Stone has gathered the data for the article after several months of extensive research through all the records she could find covering important events connected with the development of the state back to the earliest dates. She has also traveled extensively over all parts of the state in her search after historic fact.

The origin of the name "Oregon" is dealt with and the early historic facts are brought out in an interesting manner. Considerable stress is laid on the rapid development of the state within the last few years, and the opportunities and advantages of the country are brought out in detail.

It is the author's intention to write, in the near future, similar historic magazine articles concerning the states of Idaho, Washington and Montana.

ONLY 15,105 NAMES ON REGISTRATION BOOKS

After 40 days of registration only 15,105 names have entered their names on the rolls than in the corresponding number of days two years ago. Apparently the people have not yet grasped the size of the job ahead of them, for at this rate, unless there is rapid increase, there will be a great rush in the last week or two and consequent grumbling over having to stand in line to be waited on.

The registered vote yesterday reached 15,105, with 11,687 Republicans, 2071 Democrats, 1387 Independents or members of minor parties. In corresponding time two years ago there were 10,012 Republicans, 2308 Democrats and 665 miscellaneous, a total of 12,985.

HOOD RIVER SHOWS HEALTHY INCREASE

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., July 23.—The annual school report for Hood River county, which was filed in the office of the state superintendent of public instruction today, shows a healthy growth for the past year. Since 1903 the enrollment in the schools has increased from 1411 to 1563 and the census shows an increase from 1265 in 1909 to 2022 in 1910. There are 25 teachers employed in Hood River county. The average monthly salary of male teachers is \$101 which is an increase from \$89 since 1909. The average monthly salary of female teachers increased from \$66 to \$61 during the same period. There were expended for school purposes in Hood River county last year \$65,224.54 as against \$57,719.90 the previous year. The number of eighth grade graduates last year was 22 against 22 for 1909.

Complaints Against O. R. & N. (Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., July 23.—A petition signed by the farmers of Morrow county was forwarded to the railroad commission today from Iona, which is a point on the Heppner branch of the Oregon Railway & Navigation company's line, protesting against the alleged poor condition of crossings and fences along the railroad. Crossings are so bad that it is impossible to use them without breaking down the wagons, according to this complaint, and poor fences let stock on the track endangering its loss through being run down by the trains and killed.

WIRES TO CAPITAL KEPT HOT TO HAVE BRIDGES CLOSED

East Siders Bombard Senator Bourne With Telegrams in Fight for Closed Draws During Rush Hours.

Scores of Portland people telegraphed Senator Bourne yesterday to induce the war department to close the draws not only from 6:30 to 8:30 each morning, but from 4:30 to 6:30 each evening. They declared that 96 per cent of the people of Portland consider the closing of the draws at these hours essential to the business welfare of the city. They asserted that Major Melndoe's arrangement for the closing of the draws only in the morning with an open period from 7 a. m. until 7:15 a. m. did not relieve the situation in any material way, since the open period comes at a time when the traffic congestion is greatest and when the greatest number of east side people are hurrying to their work on the west side. Joseph Buchtel declared in behalf of the East Side Improvement association:

"Conditions have changed little in the last 10 years. Major Melndoe interviewed none, but rivermen in arranging for the closed period. I have personally ascertained that he did not interview any of the bridge tenders. The provision that the draws always open for ocean-going vessels is a subterfuge, since the rivermen would choose that time to take their own craft through. They would hold their long rafts and towboats for the time when the draws were open to let the ocean-going vessels through. The fact that 100,000 people are daily being delayed by open draws does not influence them in the least."

The messages sent to Senator Bourne are to be used by him when he appears before the war department July 28. Manufacturers and shippers had telegraphed the war department that the closing of the draws was a harm and an inconvenience to them. They asserted that the closing of the draws would injure business and be a financial loss to the city. The nearness of the war department session stirred east siders in action. Messages went from the United East Side club, East Side Business Men's club, Woodlawn Push club, East Side Improvement association, North East Side Improvement association and from the improvement associations in Mount Tabor, Woodstock, Sellwood, North Albina and on the Peninsula. Messages also went from B. S. Josselyn, president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, John F. Cordery, manager of the Oaks park; Mayor Simon, Tull & Gibbs' store, Meier & Frank, Woodard, Clarke & Co., Olds, Wortman & King, the Commercial club and Chamber of Commerce.

MORMONS WILL BE PLACED UNDER BAN IN GERMAN EMPIRE

Missionaries Ordered to Leave on Account of Polygamous Practices, Which Mormons Deny.

By Malcolm Clark. (Publishers' Press Lased Wire.) Berlin, July 23.—Germany has taken the lead in what will be an international movement against Mormonism and Mormon missionaries. For several years missionaries sent out from England and America have been working diligently upon the continent. Recently Mormonism has grown to such an extent that the government took cognizance of the practice.

The plan to drive Mormonism out will be sympathetic. Those who profess to be members will not be molested as long as their religious observances do not interfere with the civil or criminal laws of the country in which they reside. Only the missionaries who are active members of under-tactics in preaching their doctrines will be ordered to leave the country.

Ordered to Leave. Among the Mormon missionaries whose expulsion from Germany was ordered by the Prussian minister of the interior are three young American students who may be allowed to remain. The other members will have until Monday night to leave German territory.

The police today assembled the Mormon missionaries. The three young Americans had in the meantime appealed to Charge D'Affaires Irwin Laughlin of the American embassy, Mr. Laughlin, in the absence of Ambassador Hill, requested the foreign offices to cancel the order of expulsion for the young Americans until further investigation could be made. This delay will be granted. Herr Dalwitz, the Russian foreign minister, who has expelled the foreign missionaries, did not act hastily. It is understood that the French, Italian, Austro-Hungarian and other governments stand ready to continue prosecution if it is necessary. It may not be necessary for word from the foreign capitals today said that a number of foreigners who had established themselves as Mormon missionaries had already fled.

Although the missionaries disclaim polygamy, the authorities say it exists to an alarming extent in some of the Mormon settlements. It was this phase of the matter, together with the growing power of the Mormons, that caused the authorities to take drastic action.

Toledo Gets Box Factory. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Toledo, Or., July 23.—C. E. McDonald and H. L. Collins of this place have received machinery for a box factory. They are installing this machinery in the building formerly occupied by the power company. They will also install a large turning lathe.
