FIGHT RIGHT AWAY**

RICH PRIZES WILL
GO TO AUTO RACERSEight Thousand Dollars to Be
Distributed at Indianapolis
Speedway.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Indianapolis, Ind., July 25.—Cash prizes aggregating \$8000 will be held out to automobile racers from France, Germany and Italy as an inducement for them to enter the September meet on the Indianapolis motor speedway. The official program for the Labor day events, Saturday and Monday, September 3 and 5, was made public today. Each day's card offers 10 races. The first rewards range from \$75 to \$1000.

The generosity of the management in offering larger money in September than ever before is to tempt famous foreign pilots who will invade American courses late in the summer and prepare for the grand prize and Vanderbilt events on Long Island in October. The speedway management is determined to make local events international in character as a means of avoiding criticism of its events as being the "show" of some American manufacturer. Such criticism has been directed at race meetings here earlier this year.

The longest race of the meet will come on Labor day. This will be run 200 miles. The prizes are \$1000, \$500 and \$200. A 100-mile free-for-all race is scheduled for Saturday, with four prizes—\$1000, \$500, \$200 and \$100.

SUES SOCIETY MAN FOR
\$1500 DOG FIGHT STAKE

Pittsburg, Pa., July 25.—Dog fighting is a popular sport among the wealthy bloods of Pittsburg, according to a suit filed against Ralph H. Tannehill, an attorney by George C. Armitage, of New Kensington.

Armitage says Tannehill was stakeholder at a dog fight in which the plaintiff and Bernard McDonald were the interested parties. It was for a purse of \$1500, with side bets of \$500, all of which money Armitage says was given to Tannehill to hold. At the end of the battle Armitage alleges that, although the dog he was backing won, Tannehill insisted on giving the money to the other side.

Armitage says that after he had explained his grievance to Tannehill the latter agreed to repay the money out of his own pocket, but has failed to do so. The fight occurred May 9 at Bakers-town, and Armitage demands principal and interest from that date. Attached to his suit is a copy of an agreement and rules under which the dog fight was "pulled off."

Armitage refers to a dog fight held under similar conditions on April 11 and declares that the money for some time govern the battle at which he lost his money. The papers filed go into the rules of the game of dog fighting.

Tannehill is a legal associate of Roddy P. Marshall, an attorney who is widely known as a sportsman.

WILL HAVE BIGGEST
DAIRY ON PACIFIC

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Marshfield, Or., July 25.—One of the biggest dairy projects that has been started in this locality for some time has been undertaken by the Catterlin brothers, who formerly lived in Tillamook county. They have taken a 10-year lease on what is known as the Star ranch in Curry county, near Langlois.

W. E. Catterlin, one of the brothers, was formerly inspector of food and dairy inspector for western Oregon and a dairyman of wide experience. The ranch which has been leased is one of the finest in Curry county. It consists of 1080 acres of excellent grazing land. The tract will be divided into different farms of equal size and it is expected that the place will support not less than 200 milk cows. It is the intention to build a large cheese factory to take care of the product of the dairy herd.

Fishing Season in Rogue. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Marshfield, Or., July 25.—The fishing season in Rogue river has begun and already some good catches of Chinook salmon have been reported. Clyde Chase, the local representative of the Union Fisheries company of Portland, has taken his fleet from Coos bay to Rogue river. Chase's fleet are also putting out their nets and will fish in the Rogue river. The season on Coos bay has hardly started yet. Employment is given to probably 200 or 300 men who get enough during the season to live on for the entire year.

At Convention Tomorrow In-
surgents Will Unite With
Democrats on Ticket.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Philadelphia, July 25.—Great interest in taken throughout the country in the state convention called by the Independents to meet here next Thursday. Until today the promoters of the movement have been generally looked upon as anti-Panrose Republicans, but the managers of the convention say that out of the 207 delegates who will be present, 90 will be Democrats.

It is also announced that the state ticket to be named will be absolutely nonpartisan. Three names have been suggested for governor. They are former State Treasurer William H. Barry, D. C. Gibbons, the Philadelphia reformer, and Rudolph Blankenburg. The remainder of the places are to be equally divided between Republicans and Democrats.

In most of the 136 legislative districts, independents will be put into the field, and in others, there will be combinations either with the Democrats or with the insurgent Republicans.

There will also be combinations in the congressional fight.

It is officially announced that the platform to be adopted will be progressive in the extreme.

VANLIEW HEARING
GIVEN NEW ASPECT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, Cal., July 25.—The Van Liew hearing got a new turn today when Chairman Corgins announced that he would not permit argument and wrangling by attorneys representing the quasi-defendant, such as marked the last two days of the hearing. Corgins maintains the question at issue is an inquiry into the moral conduct of Dr. Van Liew as head of the Chico normal school, not a criminal charge.

Attorney General Webb, who is conducting the case for the state and Superintendent of Schools Hyatt, was in consultation with Governor Gillett in San Francisco yesterday and it is believed here that the result of the conference will be a new and sudden turn in the inquiry. The general plan for the inquiry today was the examination of witnesses who it was believed would testify against Van Liew. Witnesses for the "defense" will be placed on the stand late this afternoon or tomorrow.
