

JAMES T. CHINNOCK FILES DECLARATION

Portland Attorney Candidate
for Water Commissioner
for Western Oregon.

Salem, Or., July 28.—James T. Chincock, who has acted as secretary of the board of water control since the creation of the water commission by the code enacted by the legislature last winter, is a candidate for commissioner for the western Oregon district against the assembly candidate, F. R. Gettings of Coos Bay.

Mr. Chincock filed yesterday his declaration of intention to be a candidate before the district primaries. The new aspirant for water commissioner is a young attorney whose residence is at Portland. He is thoroughly familiar with the workings of the new water code and in harmony with the policies of State Engineer John H. Lewis. He has practiced law both in Portland and in Baker City where he had much experience with irrigation law, some knowledge of which is required for the position of water commissioner. He is about 31 years of age, was born in St. Croix county, Wis., and is a graduate of the law department of the University of Minnesota.

The water code requires that the commissioners have some knowledge of irrigation law and its administration as well as a knowledge of practical irrigation (see section 3) and Mr. Chincock's practice in this state as well as the past year's service for the water board, he believes, have made him a competent man for the office. The western Oregon district is comprised of the following counties: Benton, Clackamas, Columbia, Clatsop, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath, Lake, Linn, Lane, Marion, Polk, Multnomah, Tillamook, Yamhill and Washington.

TALK OF DECLARING GENERAL STRIKE HERE

The advisability of recommending the calling of a general strike of all labor unions in Portland will be considered at a meeting of the Central Labor council to be held tomorrow night. The direct cause of the proposed action is the decision of the retail merchants to raise cards saying "no standing for the open shop," meaning thereby a square deal and equal rights for union and non-union workmen.

If the Central Labor council recommends the calling of a general strike, the issue will then be left to the individual unions, each one setting its membership.

NEW COMPANIES FILE INCORPORATION PAPERS

Articles of incorporation have been filed in the office of the county clerk by the Moore Valley Orchards company, the capital stock of which is listed at \$5,000. The incorporators are William J. Patterson, W. F. Grace and W. H. Edwards. Head office of the firm will be established in Portland. The new corporation proposes to deal in and operate farm and orchards.

The Little-Diamond Lumber company is the name of a new firm for which articles of incorporation were filed in the office of the county clerk today. It is incorporated by J. F. Booth and D. Dorset with a capital stock of \$1,000. The company proposes undertaking a general lumber and mill business.

C. G. Elliott, William Palmer and P. A. Young, as incorporators, filed articles of incorporation in the office of the county clerk for the Oregon Land & Title company, which is named as having a capital stock of \$25,000. The company will embark in a general land and title business, according to the articles of incorporation.

Noted Lecturer Seriously Ill.

Atlantic City, N. J., July 28.—Considerable anxiety is felt today by the friends of Marshall P. Wilder, popular platform lecturer and monologist, who is seriously ill at his home here, with acute indigestion and nervous breakdown, due to overwork. Wilder has been ill since Friday. He has been under the constant care of a physician but no improvement has been noted in his case.

GARFIELD TARGET FOR GROUCHERS

If He Had Stayed in Race and
Fought for the Platform—
But What's the Use?

Columbus, Ohio, July 28.—This is the day of the political grouch in Ohio. Following the Republican state convention yesterday, insurgents are accusing James R. Garfield, looked upon as the progressive leader of the state, of "quitting."

The nomination of Warren Harding for governor is regarded as the indication of the reappearance of former Senator Joseph B. Foraker in politics, and this means, according to the wise ones, the downfall of Senator Burton and the northern Ohio Republican leaders.

Incidentally, the disgruntled Republicans, of whom there seems to be an abundance in all parts of the state, are predicting the defeat of the party at the polls this fall and a clean sweep for the Democrats.

President Taft is reported greatly pleased with the work of the convention.

Popular rumor here says that Theodore Roosevelt, who openly expressed the wish that a progressive platform might be adopted, does not like either the candidates or the platform.

All in all, the Republican leaders seem to be engaged in a game of cross purposes.

Harding, who has been a consistent supporter, is one of the strongest supporters of Foraker, and has long been Foraker's close friend. Harding was at first regarded as the Foraker candidate, and it was believed that he stood the best chance of the three regular candidates for the nomination.

That he received enough votes to win is believed by politicians to indicate that Foraker has "come back." Further, it is hinted that it may presage an alliance between Foraker and Cox, strong enough to control the party in the state.

Foraker's chief opponents come from the northern end of the state, where Senator Burton is regarded as the leader of the regulars. The nomination of Harding, therefore, is considered an indication that war between Burton and Foraker may break out and that the northern leaders would probably get the worst of the encounter.

The insurgents are perhaps the most disappointed of the factions developed by the convention. They are openly saying today that if Garfield had not quit he had an excellent chance of winning the nomination, and that if he had carried the platform fight to the floor of the convention the regulars would have been routed and the insurgents would have swept the convention.
