

YOUNG BRIDES FIND LIFE NOT WORTH LIVING

After Short Honeymoons Prineville and Vancouver Girls Tire of Married Life, Its Duties and Worries.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Prineville, Or., July 28.—Mrs. J. W. Stewart, who came here six weeks ago from Spokane, drank three ounces of carbolic acid yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock and died from the effects of the poison about 4 o'clock last night. Mrs. Stewart was but 19 years of age, and apparently happy and had never intimated a suicidal intent. Stewart has a position with the C. W. Elkins company as a salesman.
About 3 o'clock yesterday Mrs. Stewart went to the home of H. D. Still and asked Mrs. Still for a small quantity of carbolic acid. Mrs. Still gave her about three ounces, and she returned home leaving her 2-year-old stepdaughter. At 5 o'clock the little girl went home to supper and could not get into the house. A neighbor was called, who telephoned Stewart.
The acid bottle and a cup lay by the bed upon which Mrs. Stewart was lying unconscious, which leads to the belief that she had taken the entire three ounces. Dr. Belknap was called, but nothing could be done after that lapse of time, and death followed about 8 o'clock. She never regained consciousness, and left no message. Mrs. Stewart's parents live near Spokane. The body will probably be shipped to their home for burial. Mrs. Stewart was a bride of less than two months.

Vancouver, B. C., July 28.—Despondent because after three weeks of married life her husband showed attentions to other women, Mrs. A. W. Browne committed suicide in a downtown hotel last night, shooting herself with a .38-caliber revolver. She was only 19 years old, and was noted for her beauty. She was a telephone operator at New Westminster. The police are searching for Browne, in order that he may attend the inquest.

BULLET FIRED BY REALTY DEALER TEARS HIS SCALP

at his home at 725 Weldier street this morning. One bullet fired with a revolver placed just in back of his right ear was deflected by the skull and the other passed through his left wrist.
The attempt this morning took place about 9:30 o'clock in his room and before he had appeared for the day. Mrs. Marshall heard a revolver shot ring out and at once surmising what had happened she ran into the street and called for help. E. B. Herrick, 1440 Mallory street, who was passing and

Sidney Smith, a neighbor, responded and ran into Marshall's room where they found him lying partially dressed in a pool of blood with the revolver beside him.

Bullet Circles Skull.
Dr. M. M. Marcellus, 815 Broadway, was called and found that the bullet fired in back of the right ear had failed to penetrate the skull and had circled around the back of the head, inflicting a bad scalp wound. The other had passed through the right wrist. The wounded man was conscious, but could not talk coherently. Accompanied by Dr. Marcellus he was removed to the Good Samaritan hospital in the Red Cross ambulance.

The revolver with which the shots were fired was a .32 calibre weapon which from its appearance had been in Mr. Marshall's possession for some time. The bullets remaining in the chamber were corroded and the attempt at self destruction. If complications do not follow his recovery is expected.

Besides Mrs. Marshall, a son, aged 15, and the daughter, aged 12, were on the first floor of the house when the shooting occurred.

Retired From Business.
Mr. Marshall until a little more than a year ago was actively engaged in the real estate and timber lands business, with offices in the Chamber of Commerce and Abington buildings. A chronic case of stomach trouble and affected nerves reduced him to such a condition that he was unable to longer care for business matters and he retired. Recently the illness of his daughter, coupled with his own ailments appeared to have broken down his mind and he had acted strangely.

Mr. Marshall is 48 years old and was the son of the late George Marshall, a Portland pioneer, after whom Marshall street is named and who once owned many acres of city property.

STRIKE LEADERS DENY SHOWING WHITE FEATHER

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Toronto, July 28.—Strike leaders today deny statements of officials of the Grand Trunk railroad that the strikers have asked to be taken back.
The railroad officials say the request was made at a conference between Presidents Lee of the trainmen and Garretson of the conductors and President Hays and Vice President Fitzhugh of the Grand Trunk.

According to the company the strikers asked to be taken back and to be allowed to retain their pension rights. They said, according to the railway officials, that they had asked arbitration in time to secure the increase in wages offered by the Grand Trunk.
President Hays is reported to have replied that he could not treat with the strikers.
"The men," he is said to have told Garretson and Lee, "must apply as new employees. The company has hired a

number of trainmen in good faith and cannot discharge them to make room for strikers. The strikers will lose their pension privileges. We are willing to take back all those we can make room for, except those who have been guilty of violence."

The strikers assert that the alleged proceedings at the conference have been wilfully misrepresented by the railroad officials to weaken the position of the strikers. The strike leaders say the railroad has been almost completely tied up since the strike started and that the loss daily to the road has mounted into thousands of dollars. They declare the company will soon be forced to come to terms and that the men who are out are not asking to be taken back.

The strikers have plenty of funds to carry on the battle, they say, and are willing to fight as long as the company wants to carry on the dispute. The strikers, in a statement today, say they are confident they will win.

TROOPS ARE SENT TO SCENE OF TROUBLE

Detroit, Mich., July 28.—Four companies of the First regiment, Michigan National Guard, were dispatched to Durand today, where the strike situation on the Michigan branches of the Grand Trunk railroad is acute. A battalion of infantry from Grand Rapids is en route to Durand. The troops are under command of Major John S. Bersey.

Durand is one of the central points on the Michigan division of the Grand Trunk system.
The troops were sent to Durand following an appeal by Sheriff Watson, who claimed that the situation there was beyond the control of the local authorities. Watson declared that the strikers and their friends had intimidated strikebreakers and had completely tied up traffic.

GRAND TRUNK OFFICIALS ASK OTTAWA FOR TROOPS

Niagara Falls, Ont., July 28.—Grand Trunk railway officials have asked the Ottawa authorities for troops to guard the property of the railroad company following disorders incident to the strike. No soldiers have yet been ordered out.

TECHNICALITIES FAIL TO RENDER PRISONER FREE

Attorney Raises Novel Points in Effort to Secure Release of John McDonald From Rockpile.

Has Portland a city jail? Ask any one of thousands who have spent hours in the creepy, hag ridden battle at Second and Oak streets, and they probably will answer in the affirmative, yet W. H. Fowler, attorney for John McDonald, who is serving time at the Linnton rockpile, has compelled Circuit Judge R. G. Morrow to designate legally not only the city keep at police headquarters as a detention house, but to establish the city's right to work city prisoners in the county's quarries.

Admitting that Lawyer Fowler raised a neat question when he submitted the argument on a motion for a writ of habeas corpus that not only has the city council by ordinance failed to legalize the battle at Second and Oak streets as a city jail, but has no contract with the county giving it a legal right to imprison lawbreakers at the Linnton rockpile. Judge Morrow held for the city. Therefore, until his term of sentence runs out John McDonald must do hard labor at the quarry.

Many interesting legal questions were raised in the application made by McDonald for a writ of habeas corpus releasing him from the custody of the sheriff, and points if decided in favor of the appellant, would have upset the city's practice of turning over long time prisoners to the county authorities.

John McDonald was convicted of assault and battery March 23 of this year, and sentenced to be imprisoned "in the jail of the city of Portland" for a term of 90 days, and to pay a fine of \$300.

After being sentenced he was imprisoned in the city battle at Second and Oak streets for a few hours and then the police officers, following their usual custom, took him to the Linnton rockpile. Some question was raised as to the sentence being excessive and without the powers of the municipal judge, but the higher court, considering the brief of the petitioner for a writ of habeas corpus, upheld the legality of the term of sentence.

But the most interesting question raised was whether or not a man sentenced to be confined in a jail of the city of Portland can be legally imprisoned at the Linnton quarry. Fowler's brief pointed out that evidence showed the rockpile to be without the city limits of Portland, that it is a county institution, that the officers in charge draw their salaries from the county, that the county owns the property, owns the product of the work of the prisoners, directs the persons in charge as to disposition of the product, and that it did not appear that the city had any interest of any kind in the quarry. He further argued that no ordinance has been passed by the city council making the rockpile a city prison and incidentally pointed out that so far as that was concerned, neither has the city prison at Second and Oak streets been declared a municipal lockup by ordinance. He charged that McDonald is illegally imprisoned and restrained.

"The fact," reads Fowler's brief, "that the city council has even failed to legalize the so-called city jail at Second and Oak streets, not only cannot help the city's case, but it might well be held by your honor that even it was not a city jail, as it was not properly provided for by proper ordinance passed by the proper authorities."

Judge Morrow considering the briefs of the attorneys, commented upon Fowler's point as to the legality of the rockpile as a city jail well taken. But he disposed of the point by declaring that the fact that Superintendent A. S. Briggs, as a special policeman of the city of Portland, is in charge of the quarry, he is compelled by law to be under the order of the chief of police, as well as the sheriff, and therefore he is acting legally in detaining city prisoners, even though the rockpile is outside the city limits and has never been legalized by city ordinance. He said he is not disposed to release misdoers on such technicalities.
