It is desired to construct the bridge from Ellsworth street on the East Side to a point between Sherman and Meade streets on the West Side. Funeral of Mrs. Holman.—The funeral of Mrs. Harriet E. Holman, wife of George A. Holman, foreman of the Holman Transfer company, who died yesterday at her home at Canas, Wash., will be held at 10 o'clock tomorrow from Holman's undertaking parlors. Interment will be in the Riverside cemetery. Mrs. Holman died at the age of 49 years. She was the daughter of Montgomery Payne, of Grass Valley, one of the old pioneers of the state. The Holman home has been on a ranch near Canas for the past six months.

A large Koo-Koo excursion is being arranged in the eastern states, and while it will disband at San Francisco, it has been suggested by the arrangements committee that delegates returning east pass a day or two in the Rose City, San Francisco is making elaborate preparations for the entertainment of the black cat enthusiasts.

Woman Released on Bail.—Hazel Morrison, arrested some time ago at Astoria as an alien brought into the country for immoral purposes and held to answer before the federal grand jury, was released today under \$1000 bail. The woman has been in the county jail since her arrest and she was released today with the understanding that she was to appear as a witness against Al Nathan, who is accused of having brought her to the United States from Victoria, B. C. Nathan is in jail waiting investigation by the grand jury.

Wife Gets Divorce Decree.—Presiding Judge Robert G. Morrow put on file today a decree in the divorce action brought by Celia Surkis against her husband, Joseph Surkis, allowing the plaintiff her plea. They were married in New York city in 1892. In Portland in May 1909, Surkis deserted his wife for an affinity, Freda Wise. There are five children, and the court awarded them to the plaintiff, ordering Surkis to pay \$5 a week for their support.

Chauffeur Exonerated.—Thomas Magers, a chauffeur, was exonerated by the verdict of the coroner's jury yesterday afternoon in the inquest into the death of Herman Heisig, aged 44, who was struck Tuesday by a machine driven by Magers. Testimony of five witnesses showed that Heisig had jumped from a wagon directly in the path of the automobile and that Magers was unable to stop in time, although he was moving slowly.

Antes Run Too Fast.—Broadway, between Twenty-fourth and Thirty-first streets, has been converted into a speedway for automobiles to such an extent that residents declare that lives are constantly menaced by an almost continuous procession of machines going from 80 to 90 miles an hour, complaint was made yesterday to Chief of Police Cox and he instructed officers to keep a particular watch on the stretch favored by the speed fiends.

Murderer May Recover.—An operation was performed by Dr. Fred Ziegler at St. Vincent's hospital yesterday on H. M. Lambert, who in event of his recovery, must answer to the charge of slaying his wife in Woodlawn last month. An abscess had formed near the wound made by Lambert when he shot himself and after this had been cleaned he rallied from the operation. His recovery is now expected.
