

SEATTLE DAY AT TACOMA STADIUM

All Attendance Records Broken and Programs Are Revelations to Visitors.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Tacoma, Wash., July 28.—This is "Seattle day" at the big military tournament here, and every streetcar and boat that reaches the city is loaded with visitors from the city across the sound. The mammoth stadium is breaking all attendance records at a public celebration in the northwest. Up to last night 100,000 persons had witnessed the programs already given, and the crowd tonight promises to exceed any previous one. There were 27,000 in the stadium last night.

Tonight a special program will be given, following a parade of the Automobile club of Seattle, which will traverse the principal streets of the city, heading the Seattle delegation.

The program last night was a revelation of remarkable gymnastics by the soldiers of Uncle Sam. The twenty-fifth infantry (colored) won the tournament record in the wall scaling contest and came close to the world's record. The competitive drills, obstacle race on mules, rescue contests and cavalry rough riding were special features.

HAWLEY CRIPPEN AND MILE. LENEVE GOOD AS ARRESTED

Law pictures of both printed in London and in Antwerp. There is no doubt of the identity of the pair.

"Crippen and Mile. Leneve do not know that they are suspected and they are allowed every liberty. A strict watch, however, is being kept on them. Other passengers aboard do not know the identity of the couple."

"Crippen reads newspapers, magazines and novels constantly. He appears very nervous and does not sleep much. The girl is sometimes gay and sometimes appears worried. She watches Crippen tearfully at times. There is no doubt that the man is really Crippen."

DOMINION POLICE TAKE NO SORT OF CHANCES ON CRIPPEN GETTING AWAY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Father Point, Que., July 28.—The Canadian police and secret service agents gathered here resolved today upon a plan of action for the deportation of Dr. H. E. Crippen and Mile. Ethel Leneve, believed to be on board the steamer Montrose, which is due at Montreal tomorrow. The American dentist, suspected of the murder of his wife, Belle Elmore, formerly a noted singer, with his young companion, is being sent back to England by the dominion government as "undesirable aliens."

The Montrose will arrive at Montreal either at midnight Saturday or early Sunday morning. Dr. Crippen and Mile. Leneve will be arrested as soon as the ship docks, will be rushed to Quebec, and then deported, thereby avoiding the legal entanglements attending extradition. The suspects will then be placed aboard the steamer Royal George, which sails for England August 4.

In the wireless message yesterday came the first news to the dominion authorities of the presence of Crippen and the girl aboard the Montrose. Police officials started at once for Father Point.

Chief McCarthy of the Quebec provincial police, Chief Denis of Lewis, near Quebec, and Chief Constable Gauthier of the dominion police of Ottawa, rushed here, and are in conference at the Marconi wireless station at the lighthouse here today. The steamer Laurentic, with Inspector Dew of Scotland Yard on board, will arrive this afternoon, and the inspector will disembark. With the arrival of Dew the police will board a fast train for Montreal, and will go aboard the Montrose before the vessel berths.

Inspector Dew will not participate actually in the arrest, the law requiring that Canadian police make the capture. McCarthy will read the warrant and Dew will identify the prisoners. Newspaper correspondents will be barred from the Montrose until after the arrests are made.

"Colonel Percy Sherwood, chief of the dominion police, has telegraphed cautioning us to prevent the possible suicide of the suspects," said McCarthy. "The orders evidently are applied by Scotland Yard from fear that Crippen and Mile. Leneve, seeing themselves trapped, will attempt to cheat the gallows. We fear that scores of reporters and newspaper photographers, swarming over the sides of the liner would arouse the fugitives' suspicions and give them an opportunity to commit suicide."

Newspaper correspondents here have chartered a schooner which will go out to meet the Montrose after the arrest. The suspects will be taken ashore at Grande Isle, will be passed through the immigration office and then taken to Quebec, where Judge Chauveau will arraign them and remand them to jail, pending deportation.

The little village of Father Point is overcrowded today with police officials, newspaper men and throngs of persons curious to learn the latest details of one of the most exciting pursuits ever recorded in the annals of Scotland Yard. Hundreds of tourists are here, and nearly every person in the village is armed with a camera. The general impression is that the suspects will be taken ashore here, although that is far from the intention of the police officials at present.

HISTORY OF A PURSUIT
OF FUGITIVES AT SEA
BY MEANS OF WIRELESS

The apprehension of Dr. H. E. Crippen and his typist, Mile. Ethel Leneve, will bring to a close one of the most spectacular detective feats in the history of Scotland Yard.

The yard received but the slightest tip that the suspects were aboard the liner Montrose when that vessel cleared from Antwerp. Ordinarily the clue would have been discounted, or at best, the officials would have left matters in the hands of the dominion police.

The honor and prestige of the great London detective bureau, however, was

at stake. The police had been caustically criticised for having allowed Dr. Crippen to slip through their hands once, and therefore when word came from the Montrose by wireless of the suspicions of the captain of the ship regarding a man and a "boy" among the passengers, Inspector Dew of Scotland Yard hurriedly left England on the steamer Laurentic in an effort to overtake the couple and assist the Canadian police in their capture.

Should the suspects prove to be Crippen and Mile. Leneve, as every indication shows, Scotland Yard will have redeemed itself by unusual aggressiveness.

Again the far-reaching wireless has been brought into play successfully in a case where time was the principal factor. According to London reports, the Montrose was sixty miles off the English coast, bound for Canada, when the authorities at London received the first flash of the captain's suspicions. A series of communications followed until the Montrose was within range of the way. Then the wireless fell silent, for the Montrose, it is said, carries only secondary apparatus. Dew just managed to catch the Laurentic before she sailed, and the race to Canada was on.

The wireless messages that were transmitted between the Montrose and Scotland Yard were not made public in England. The first authentic news London had of the presence of the suspects aboard the vessel was contained in cables yesterday, which told Europe and America of the approaching capture of the man by the dominion police.

Following this news, search for Crippen and Mile. Leneve on the continent and in England ended. The London police began again to bend every effort toward identifying the mutilated body found in the cellar of No. 29 Hill-top Crescent, North London, two weeks ago. Belle Elmore Crippen disappeared last February. The police of America and Europe have been seeking her, and no trace has been found.

The London detectives, it is reported, have received minute descriptions of physical characteristics of the supposedly murdered woman, including certain birthmarks, and they hope that these may lead to the identification of the body.

Meanwhile news of the arrival of the Montrose at Father Point, with notification of the couple's arrest, is awaited anxiously.

O. R. & N. PASSENGER TARIFF INVESTIGATED

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., July 28.—Having determined that there is ground for action upon its own motion, the Oregon railroad commission has started a comprehensive investigation into the reasonableness of all passenger rates on the line of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company. The matter has been set down for hearing at Salem Tuesday, August 30. The investigation will embrace every passenger tariff on the O. R. & N. system, but will apply more especially to rates on some branch lines where more than 3 cents a mile is charged.

An investigation of passenger tariffs on Southern Pacific lines in Oregon has also been started by the commission, but the date for the hearing has not yet been fixed. The two investigations will affect nearly every passenger tariff in the state.

MRS. FISHER FORCED TO KILL PERSISTENT SUITOR

(United Press Leased Wire.) Oklahoma City, Okla., July 28.—Mrs. Daisy Fisher, wife of E. B. Fisher, a prominent business man of Oklahoma City, today stands exonerated of any crime, though she shot and instantly killed D. E. Smith of Santa Clara, Cal. According to Mrs. Fisher, Smith and she were sweethearts at Hannibal, Mo. 10 years ago, when she married Fisher. Since her marriage, she says, Smith had haunted her, imploring her to desert Fisher and go with him. On one occasion she said he threatened to shoot her. Yesterday he attempted to enter the Fisher home and Mrs. Fisher shot him. Smith has a wife and two children at Santa Clara. When his body was searched after the shooting a revolver and a picture of Mrs. Fisher were found in a coat pocket.

The coroner's jury held Mrs. Fisher blameless.

RAWN DIED BY HIS OWN HAND

Whether or Not Shot Fired With Suicidal Intent, Jury Will Not Say.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, July 28.—Ira G. Rawn, president of the Monon railroad, who was shot in his home at Winnetka, died by his own hand. That is the verdict returned at 3 o'clock this morning by the coroner's jury.

"Whether death was accidental or suicidal, the jury is unable to determine," says the verdict. "But the position of the wound and the type of revolver found make the accidental theory the less probable."

Rawn was found dead in the dining room of his home in the fashionable North Shore suburb on the night of July 19. His family said he had been shot by a burglar whom he had surprised packing silverware. Private detectives employed advanced the theory that Rawn had been killed by an assassin. The Chicago detectives detailed on the case declared there was no evidence that a burglar had been in the house.

A negro chauffeur whom Rawn had discharged was arrested, but was freed a few hours later.

Rawn's name was mentioned yesterday in connection with the Illinois Central car repeller graft trial. Rawn was operating vice president of the Illinois Central at the time the alleged graft occurred. The detectives pointed out this fact when they advanced the suicide theory in connection with the case. The suicide theories were based on the ground that Rawn feared the result of the inquiry into the graft case. He had twice succeeded in securing postponements of the hearing.

ONE MAN KILLED; TWO ARE INJURED

Dynamite Stick Explodes With Fatal Results to Well Diggers at Lebanon.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Lebanon, Or., July 28.—W. J. Gatts was instantly killed last night by a charge of dynamite. Gatts was living on James Johnson's farm and had driven a new well. Johnson, Asa Baker and Charles Houck, a 12-year-old boy, were helping him and after the pipe had been driven 20 feet into the ground, they attempted to drop a stick of dynamite to the bottom of the pipe and blow off the end. Instead of the stick going down it lodged in the pipe at the top of the ground and exploded, killing Gatts instantly, breaking Johnson's leg and seriously injuring the boy. Baker, the man who put in the dynamite, was not injured. Gatts was 41 years of age and had lived near Lebanon for 30 years. He leaves a wife and six children.

Billy Sunday at McMinnville. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) McMinnville, Or., July 28.—Arrangements have been made with Billy Sunday, the evangelist, to hold a mass meeting in the city Auditorium at this place on Sunday afternoon, August 7, at which time he will give his great temperance lecture "On the Water-Wagon." An effort will be made to have him preach in the evening of the same day to a gathering of all the churches of the city.

JOHN G. CARLISLE AT DEATH'S DOOR

Suffers Heart Attack and Physicians Have Little Hope of His Recovery.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, July 28.—John G. Carlisle, former secretary of the treasury, but who has been practicing law in New York since 1897, is in a critical condition from heart disease. He suffered an attack Monday and his condition has grown steadily worse. His physicians have little hope for his recovery.

Carlisle is 55 years old. He entered public life in Kentucky and after holding a number of state offices was sent to congress, being elected by the Democrats. He served as speaker of the house from 1883 to 1889. In 1890 he was elected United States senator from Kentucky, to succeed James Beck, and was appointed secretary of the treasury by President Cleveland in 1893. He served in the cabinet until 1897. In 1898 he joined the gold wing of the Democratic party.

WHITE SLAVE CHARGES FALL FLAT ON TRIAL

The "white slave" allegations made by Hazel Grant against Mrs. Catherine Love, 246 Madison street, fell flat at the hearing in municipal court this morning, and Mrs. Love escaped with a \$15 fine for assault and battery. Charges that Mrs. Love had sent men to the girl's room in the former's rooming house were not substantiated, but it was shown that Mrs. Love had committed a technical assault in trying to prevent the girl from taking her trunk from the house. Mrs. Love said that Miss Grant owed her money for unpaid room rent.
