

GOVERNOR LIND WILL NOT ACCEPT

Is Going to Alaska and Will
Pay No Attention to His
Party's Call.

(United Press Special Wire.)
Everett, Wash., July 28.—I will not accept the Democratic nomination for governor, under any circumstances. I am out of politics for good, and my friends know it. I leave Everett in a few days for Alaska on a pleasure trip and expect to return to Minnesota early in September.

This was the emphatic statement made to the United Press this morning by John Lind, nominated for governor late yesterday afternoon by the Minnesota state Democratic convention.

"I wrote the chairman of the state central committee four weeks ago that my decision to quit politics was final, and I fail to understand my nomination."

"Will you refuse the office if elected?" asked his visitor.

"That's an impossible situation," was Lind's reply. "What I have already told you covers that." He added rather testily.

"Will you stay away from Minnesota until after election?"

"I have already said that I expect to be back in Minneapolis early in September," said Mr. Lind. "My statement cannot be misunderstood."

RESPECTED PIONEER OF ASTORIA IS DEAD

Astoria, July 28.—Dudley R. Blount, a well known and greatly respected resident of this city for the last 50 years, died yesterday of pneumonia, after a short illness. The deceased was born in Quincy, Ill., nearly 60 years ago, and has been a resident of Astoria over 30 years. Deceased was a charter member of Astoria Lodge, K. of P., this city and during the old volunteer fireman days was a member of Astoria engine company No. 1. The deceased leaves a father living in Albina, aged 89 years, a wife, one son, Eddie Blount, nine step children, three sisters and three brothers. The funeral will be under the auspices of the Knights of Pythias, for which arrangements will be made later.

ALARM CLOCK BRINGS ON HEART FAILURE

Rockford, Ill., July 28.—A coroner's jury summoned to pass upon the sudden death of Mrs. Mary Engdahl is expected to return a verdict of death from heart failure, resulting from intense excitement and shock superinduced by the rattle of an alarm clock she had placed near the head of her bed.

When the clock went off yesterday morning Mrs. Engdahl leaped from her pillow and then fell lifeless across the body of her five year old daughter, with whom she was sleeping. Terrified, the child lay beneath the body of her mother for five hours, before her brother, alarmed because neither the child nor the mother appeared, entered the room.

STATE HISTORICAL BUILDING AT TACOMA

NO POLITICS GO IN THIS LEAGUE

Mt. Scott Improvement Organ-
ization Decides It Can Find
No Room for Politicians.

The Citizens' league of the Mount Scott district has placed itself on record as wanting no politicians in its ranks. Nothing except the improvement of that district will be considered. The members of this thriving club declare that politics defeats the intention of any improvement organization.

"No public official or avowed candidate for public office may be a member." This is the terse and definite clause in the constitution, in which qualification for membership is specified. In speaking of this feature, E. W. Jobelmann, who is an enthusiastic club member and is the author of the clause, said politicians do not make good workers for such clubs.

"A short time before an election, many politicians join every organization they can get into and expect to secure a little support from each," he said. "We don't want any such men in our club. If one of our members is elected to a public office, he ceases to be a member. This is not to discourage men for office, but it is to protect the club. It is no criticism of a man or member, either, for we have to have public officials. We feel, however, that when a man is elected to an office, he should give up his club affiliations, especially an improvement club, and give his time to his office."

The Citizens' league of the Mount Scott district is doing things these days. The water question is the biggest thing at hand. The proposition of getting gas in that district has been taken up. The league has induced the gas company to lay mains in the territory, providing there be 200 subscribers. The club will make a canvass for this number. Free city delivery will also be installed soon. The streets are being designated by signs, and the houses are being numbered. As soon as this is completed, Uncle Sam has promised postal service. A new substation is also to be located there.

WHEN ARE TUBERCULAR ANIMALS FIT FOR FOOD?

Portland, Or., July 27.—To the Editor of The Journal.—In the news item appearing in your issue of July 26, under the caption of "Tuberculous Cows Sold to Butchers" appears this information:

"As it is, however, the tuberculous cows are generally sold to butchers, where there is no government inspection, and the people are eating tuberculous infected meat."

Dr. Albert Leffingwell in his recent book on "American Meat," says concerning the regulations issued by the secretary of agriculture April 1, 1908:

"The regulations begin by laying down certain propositions or principles, which are supposed to guide the inspector in his work. We are told in the first place that meat should not be approved if there is a reasonable possibility that it contains tubercle bacilli, or if it has been injuriously affected by tubercular

infection," statements with which we are all in substantial agreement. Then comes the assertion that when tubercle bacilli in an animal is limited to a single or several parts or organs of the body without evidence of recent invasion of numerous bacilli into the systematic circulation, it may be concluded that the disease is localized, and there is no reason to suspect that the flesh is unwholesome. Having thus cleared the way for an endorsement of tuberculous meat, the United States department of agriculture advances yet another step, and under certain circumstances requires the inspector's approval of the flesh of tubercular animals as fit food for human beings.

"Rule C. The carcass, if tuberculous lesions are limited to a single or several parts or organs of the body (except as noted in Rule A) without evidence of recent invasion of tubercle bacilli into the systematic circulation, shall be passed after the parts containing the localized lesions are removed and condemned."

The difference between the government inspected meat trust products and those of the butcher who is not inspected appears to be one of degree only. Dr. Leffingwell's book confirms the statement of the luckless inspector in St. Louis, who made the remark that government inspection is only a farce. A thorough agitation of the meat products question would have a very beneficial effect, and is a matter which our health officers appear to be loath to deal with except to cast reflections on butchers who do not belong to the trust.
