Mrs. Ed Burke Granted Divorce.
A divorce was granted yesterday at Oregon City to Mrs. Ed Burke, wife of a former reporter for The Oregonian. The decree was granted upon the grounds of cruelty, and no contest was offered. Burke mysteriously disappeared May 1, and has not been heard of since. Soon after his disappearance, it was discovered he left heavy financial obligations unsettled. The wife was out of the city with relatives, and did not know of her husband's disappearance until a few days after his disappearance. In the decree, she is given her maiden name, Agnes Huard.

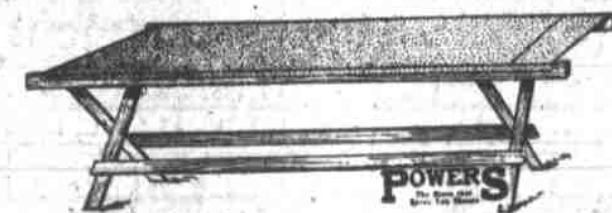
