

WORLD CALLED TO WORSHIP SAVIOR, SAYS PREACHER

Rev. W. H. Foulkes, in Sunday Morning Sermon, Tells Congregation Many Forget Music of Bells of Heaven.

"The Call to Worship" was the subject of the sermon delivered yesterday morning at the First Presbyterian church by the pastor, Rev. W. H. Foulkes, D. D. He took as his text Psalm 33: "O come let us worship and bow down; let us kneel before the Lord, our maker." He said in part:

"Nothing short of the whole wide world is being called to worship today. To some ears the call is faint and all but hushed in the midst of earth's great babel. The white of the world's machinery, the ardent clang of its rushing forces, the pandemonium of its myriad throated voice, too often drown the sweet tone of the silver chime calling men from work to worship.

"I am very doubtful if it could be honestly said that any man has never heard the call to worship. Many a man, alas, has forgotten the music of the bells of heaven, just as he has ceased to hear the rhythmic harmony with which nature was alive in the days of his youth. It is one thing to have forgotten; another thing never to have known. Many men have forgotten the call to worship. Few, indeed, have never heard it.

"All round this world of ours the call has never ceased to issue. From Moslem minarets and Catholic cathedrals, from the barest tom-tom in the hut of the chief of the aborigines, to the mellow toned bell that mantles some peaceful Christian village in a garment of Sabbath rest—over such a range as this, and wider, the call to worship has cast its spell. Men everywhere have heard, though they have not everywhere heeded its summons to spiritual rest and refreshment. Hearing the call anew today, let us heed it the more eagerly for our souls' good and God's glory.

"First, we must address ourselves to an equally bold and reverent analysis of the call to worship. What are its elements? By whose royal warrant are its mandates enforceable upon us? What shall be the manner of our obedience? These and kindred questions stir our sluggish spirits today and keep us alike from blindly worshipping, we know not what and care not how; and from failing to worship altogether.

Worship as Magnetic Needle.
"Worship is worth-ship. In it our heart, like a scientist analyzing the rare compound, finds the basis of value, the long sought primitive element. As a seer, the spirit discerns beneath all the heaving forms of religion, the reality of eternal worth. Through worship as a magnetic needle the conscience is ever pointed toward the north—God's pole of infinite majesty and glory. To the human will the call to worship comes as the summons to a quest for the 'pearl of greatest price,' the making of the will of God the law of human life.

"In fact, the call to worship crowds down upon the human heart like a celestial avalanche. It leaves no part of man's nature unscathed. The question is not at all whether man will worship but what, and eventually not what but whom.

"Man is incurably religious," runs the now very trite phrase of Sabatier. If inevitably follows that man is hopelessly worshipped; for if religion be a disease, worship is its distinguishing symptom. To worship or not to worship—that is not the question, except for fools and knaves. But what or whom and how to worship, that is the issue.

"Even a misanthropic Byron steals a crumb of comfort from the table he rudely left when he sees
"The heart run o'er
With silent worship of the great of old!
The dead but sceptered sovereigns who still rule.
Our spirits from their urns."

"It is only a scant crumb of very black bread, indeed—Worship of dead sovereigns who reign only from a shrine of ashes—but it gives evidence that even a crumb of bitter bread is better than none. What, then, is the authority of this age long call? By whom or what are men allured, persuaded, convinced of their obligation to worship? My answer is, the call is voiced with the power of God. He calls across the chasm of infinitude to our restless, spirits and we catch the echo of his call and imprison it in a silver chime, recede its way through human hearts back to him.

Nature's Voice Mellow.
"We need ask that nature be given a clear voice to carry the divine demand to our inner hearts. Her voice already is mellow and clear. She speaks a various language, but its unifying element is the revelation of her creator to us, equally his creatures if undeniably more."

"I do not need to take you as far afield as Switzerland to illustrate this phase of truth. The glory of this wonderful land of ours with its valleys and mountains is enough. Let me, though, share with you one recent experience in that scenic paradise across the sea, conscious that you may here duplicate it for yourselves. There at the summit of the Rigi we watched the sun go down in the glory of a perfect eventide and shivered in the biting night air of the mountain-top as the myriad lighted valleys once more came out of the dusk. The perfect night rest on the Rigi-Kühn, was sweet but all too short. In the early hours of morning we were awakened by the bugle call ringing and reverberating. It is the echo was spent in those great halls.

"Quickly, lest we should lose a moment, we dressed and climbed to the very summit and there waited and watched the unfolding of that most marvelous panorama—sunrise upon the Alps. It only needed such a choir as that band of German students with their splendid voices to make vocal the silence of that glory; and I worshiped God. From the first tone of that clarion bugle to the first touch of the sun itself, it was all a call to worship. The whole earth was filled with his glory."

"Is not the earth as glorious every day and everywhere? Does not 'day unto day utter speech' and 'night unto night declare his glory'?"

COUNTY SCHOOLS APPORTIONMENT IS \$329,744.64

Largest That Has Ever Been Made in State; Every County Receives \$1.92 for Each Child of School Age.

Salem, Or., Aug. 1.—State Treasurer Steele today made the largest annual apportionment of the income of the common school fund to the several counties that has ever been made in the state of Oregon. The amount was \$329,744.64, which was apportioned that every county received \$1.92 for each child within its boundaries of school age; that is, between the ages of 4 and 20 years. The total number of school children in the state as reported by the county school superintendents of the different counties was found to be 171,742.

Apportionment Last Year.
On August 1 last year the amount apportioned was \$303,200.55, which was the largest sum up to that time ever apportioned. The number of school children a year ago, according to the school census taken by the county superintendents, was 166,649 for the entire state, an increase for 1910 of 5,093. The rate apportioned a year ago was \$1.85 for each child of school age within the county, as against \$1.92 today.

Under the new apportionment, of course Multnomah leads with the largest school population. Her school population is 39,624 and her allotment of school money is \$76,697.28. Marion is second with a school population of 17,753 and an apportionment of \$34,066.76. Lane is third with a school population of 10,492 and a corresponding apportionment of \$20,144.64. Clackamas is fourth with a school population of 9,508 and an apportionment of \$18,255.36.

On August 1, 1910, the total of the principal of the common school fund amounts to \$6,000,000 in round figures, of which \$5,000,000 is invested in first mortgage loans on land within the state of Oregon; \$250,000 is invested in school district bonds; \$750,000 in certificates of school land, and the small working balance is being loaned to applicants on first mortgage loans. There is practically no delinquency in the matter of interest payments, all patrons of the fund being required to pay interest promptly as it accrues.

The result of this large apportionment will be to reduce materially the tax levies for the common schools in 1911 and still allow more funds for the rebuilding of the schools than in any previous year in the history of the state. The continued sale of school lands and ready demand for the school fund among responsible borrowers assures a continued increase in the interest to be apportioned each year.

"It is God's voice hidden in the heart of nature and echoed in the heart of man that calls the universe to worship.
"Must we not testify—O immortal souls! whose hearts my words are pleasing today through the thin filament of flesh that hangs between—must we not bear witness that in the silent mysterious processes of our own souls, God is sounding his clear call to worship? The notions that rise unbidden to the surface of the soul, out of the troubled depth beneath—whence come they and whither bound? Do they come out of nothingness and into that same dull void as speedily return? Let them rather be interpreted to us as harbingers of a glorious presence, as the trumpet call of the Eternal, bidding our souls enter the holiest of holies and there 'worship the king in the beauty of holiness!'"

DEMOCRATS PICK MAN TO DEFEAT REP. NEEDHAM

Henry Hawson, Former Newspaper Man, Leading Insurgents' Fight in 6th Congressional District, California.

Henry Hawson, a delegate from Fresno, Cal., attending the head camp of the Pacific jurisdiction of the Woodmen of the World, has been chosen by the Democrats of the sixth congressional district of California as their standard bearer against Congressman James C. Needham, one of the Joe-cannonized members from that state.

Although Needham has served several terms, and has apparently come to regard himself as a fixture in congress, the sixth district, which covers the larger part of the great San Joaquin valley in the central part of the state, is a hotbed of insurgency and the standard record of Needham has weakened him with the voters to such extent that some of the political seers predict he will lose his seat this year to the Democratic nominee. Nominations will be made in the primaries.

Entered Race Late.
Hawson was brought into the race only a few days ago, and his name will have to be written in on the ballot, but as he is unopposed by the Democratic ranks, and is endorsed by the Democratic county committee, his nomination is a certainty. He is a former newspaper man and is now a deputy district attorney in Fresno county.

"Insurgency in California is gaining in strength every day," said Mr. Hawson today. "The Lincoln-Roosevelt league, the concrete expression of the insurgent movement, has nominated for governor a strong exponent of anti-machine rule, Hiram Johnson, a Sacramento man, now practicing law in San Francisco. He was the prosecutor who, when Francis J. Heney was shot down in the court room during the trial of Abraham Ruef, took up the burden of the work and succeeded in obtaining a conviction of that arch-grafter."

Southern Pacific Is Issue.
"Hiram Johnson is making his fight on the direct issue of Southern Pacific railroad domination in state government. He is being received with great enthusiasm in many parts of the state but my judgment is that he will fall of nomination and that the candidate for the governor on the Republican ticket will be one of the three candidates who are regarded as being more or less friendly to the Southern Pacific interests. Charles F. Curry, present secretary of state; Alden Anderson, now or recently state superintendent of banks, and Phil Stanton, speaker of the assembly in the last legislature, who is making his fight on the ground that he was committed by Theodore Roosevelt in his stand against the anti-Japanese legislation introduced in the assembly and defeated only by the influence of Roosevelt himself."

"Curry, I believe, will be the Republican nominee. He has the largest personal following of any candidate and has been doing politics for years in a way which cannot but result in a great many voters supporting him at the primaries as an expression of personal support."

Believes Bell Will Win.
"Curry's nomination should, and I believe will, result in the supporters of the insurgent nominee, Johnson, turning their support to the Democratic nominee for governor, Theodore A. Bell, and I very confidently expect Bell will be elected governor."

"In the sixth congressional district, represented by Congressman Needham, for the last 12 years, the Democrats hoped the insurgents would nominate an opponent to Needham's 'stand pat' attitude, so that the Democrats would have had an opportunity of supporting such a nominee. The insurgents, however, allowed the golden opportunity to pass, and the Democrats, at the last moment, decided that as the insurgents had not given us a chance to support their man, they should be given a chance to support ours. My candidacy was the result of this determination. It came to me unsought and I regard it not so much as a personal selection, as the expression of the insurgent feeling in favor of opposition to a man who has stood pat and stood still to a degree not excelled even by the arch-stand-pat and stand-stiller, Joe Cannon himself."

"Mr. Needham's plurality in the last three or four elections has averaged between 6000 and 6000. This is a big plurality to attack, and yet we believe it possible that the insurgent sentiment will result in his defeat. Thousands of Republicans who are now supporting Johnson for governor will turn to the Democratic candidates as a means of rebuking the Republican party and I believe that in the sixth congressional district this sentiment will be as strongly evidenced as in any other part of the state."

"The result will, in my opinion, demonstrate that California has no sympathy with the policy which has characterized, and disgraced, the Republican party in congress."

"If I shall be chosen to succeed Mr. Needham it will not be a personal victory. It will be merely the outcome of the popular dissatisfaction with existing conditions."

Klamath Awaits Balling.

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 1.—No word has been received here regarding the coming of the secretary of the international peace congress, a gathering of peace advocates from the world over, formally opened in this city today. More than a thousand delegates are here prepared to take part in the various meetings which will continue until the end of the week. The accredited delegates from the United States include Dr. Benjamin F. Trueblood of Boston, Dr. Charles R. Van Hise of the University of Wisconsin, Mrs. Wilbur F. Crafts of Washington, D. C., and Mrs. Fannie Fern Andrews, secretary of the American Peace society.

300,000 VISITORS GOING TO CHICAGO

Knights Templar Conclave Will Draw Large Crowds in August.

Chicago, Aug. 1.—The police and local hotel men are completing arrangements for the accommodation of at least 300,000 visitors during the Knights Templar conclave which begins August 8. Chief Stewart has invited the police departments of nearly every large city to send details of detectives to aid in protecting the visitors from robbery. The hotels announce they can easily accommodate 500,000 visitors and will be prepared for that number.

Knights Templars visitors who attend the big conclave must mount the water wagon if they observe the order issued today by Grand Commander John D. Cleveland: "It is a breach of knightly conduct for any Knight Templar in any portion of his uniform or wearing an insignia of the order to enter a saloon or bar room," reads the order.

JUDGE BENSON DOESN'T CARE FOR AN OFFICE

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 1.—H. L. Benson is now an avowed candidate for the office of circuit judge of this dis-

trict. About two years ago Judge Benson resigned to go into private practice. It was his intention to retire from politics. His many friends have not seen fit to let him retire to his law practice, and consequently he is the nominee of the assembly for the judgeship.

In speaking of the matter Judge Benson said:

"I did not want the office. I can make more money out of my practice. My friends and some of the lawyers insisted on my taking the office. After much consideration I have concluded to become a candidate, and I am confident that I shall be elected."

It is not known who will be Judge Benson's opponent. Judge George Noland, Democrat, who is the incumbent, may make the race, but he has always maintained that in the event Mr. Benson wanted the office he would step aside. At present he is too busy with court to talk politics.

In county affairs more interest is being taken. The voters are beginning to register. The Republicans are greatly in the majority. It is also noticeable that the number of Socialists is growing.

White Salmon Joins League.

most important strategic points in the Revolutionary War. The control of the fort was transferred today from the war department to the treasury department and in future it will be used as a training school for cadets of the revenue cutter service.
