

DEAN AND STUDENT HAVE FISTIC WAR

Young Man Lights Cigarette
With Diploma and Dean
Would Stop Him.

Syracuse, N. Y., Aug. 5.—When censured by Dean Sheppard, president of the Lyman C. Smith College of Applied Science, because he lit his cigarette with his diploma, Herbert C. Faus of Elmhurst, Pa., censure and society man, challenged the professor to stop him. Dean Sheppard accepted the invitation, closed with Faus and rolled to the floor with him. The savant was badly bruised.

The trouble was caused by what Faus alleges was unfairness in the award of a diploma to him. Faus claims that he completed the course prescribed by the institution some months ago, but that no recognition was given him by the faculty.

2 BUILDINGS BURN AT PASCO; RECORDS LOST

Pasco, Wash., Aug. 4.—Fire starting in a hay shed of the Pasco barn at 12:30 yesterday completely destroyed building, harness and fixtures and spread to an old school building adjoining. Both buildings were completely destroyed in 20 minutes. The school house building was purchased by the Maxons six weeks ago for \$1600 and had just been moved. It was insured for \$500 and the barn for \$1500. All records of the police department, city council and police court, which had offices in the buildings, were destroyed. Both were frame buildings. The Maxons had made plans to spend \$4500 in improvements on the buildings. An incendiary is suspected.

WEALTHY MAN SHOTS SELF AT PASADENA, CAL.

Pasadena, Cal., Aug. 4.—Colin Stewart, 55, said to be worth nearly \$1,000,000, committed suicide by shooting himself in the head at the Hotel Maryland yesterday. Chronic insomnia is said to have caused the act.

His wife and son left him in bed during breakfast. When they returned to his room he was dead with a bullet in his brain.

Politics in Connecticut.
New Haven, Conn., Aug. 5.—The first steps looking to the Republican campaign in Connecticut this fall were taken today when the state committee met here to fix the time and place for holding the state nominating convention and incidentally to review the outlook. All politicians are agreed that the campaign will be one of the most interesting the Nutmeg state has seen in some years. In addition to the fight now on between Charles A. Goodwin and Everett Lake for the gubernatorial nomination there is to be a spirited contest for United States senator between the present incumbent, Morgan G. Bulkeley, and former Governor George F. McLean. Lively fights are in prospect also in several of the congressional districts.

Meeting of Colored Politicians.
Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 5.—President Taft came in for considerable sharp criticism from the speakers today at the third annual convention of the National Independent Political League, an organization of negroes with membership extending over a large section of the country. The league represents the disposition of the Brownsville cases and also objects to the president's policy toward colored Americans, "as typified by his removal of colored office holders in the south, and the starting of a campaign of retaliation against indifferent Republican congressmen in all close districts." Bishop Alexander Walters and a number of other Afro-Americans of prominence were included among the speakers.

Printers Meet at Galveston.
Galveston, Tex., Aug. 5.—The Association of Employing Printers of Texas met in fifth annual convention here today as the guest of the Galveston Ben Franklin club. A wide variety of subjects relating to the printing business is to be discussed during the two days of the convention. The officers in charge of the meeting are President George M. Couris, of Galveston; Secretary Marvin D. Evans, of Fort Worth, and Treasurer Robert Clarke, of San Antonio.

Minnesota Banker Leaves Prison.
St. Paul, Minn., Aug. 5.—Broken in health and bowed down by sorrow and age, Thomas B. Clement, formerly a well known banker in Portland, will be released from the state prison at Stillwater today. Clement was convicted in 1907 of placing worthless paper to the amount of half a million dollars in his bank. The money was lost in southern land investments. Clement is now in his eightieth year. At the expiration of his friends his sentence was commuted to four years by President Taft.

Hotel for Laborers.

New York, Aug. 5.—An eight story fireproof hotel for the exclusive accommodation of working men, where low rates will be charged, will be built this fall on Long Island at the instance of the Sage Foundation.

A considerable settlement is being collected near the town of Forest Mills, L. I., for the use of laboring men and their families. Over 1000 families will move in before the winter months.

Medal for Carnegie.

Washington, Aug. 5.—As the joint gift of all the American republics, a gold medal has been awarded to Andrew Carnegie because of his prominence as a "benefactor of humanity," by the Pan-American Congress, now in session in Buenos Ayres.

POSTAL DEPARTMENT
SAVES \$10,000,000 IN
RETRENCHMENT POLICY

Washington, Aug. 5.—In consequence of the policy of retrenchment pursued by the post-office department, the auditor's report for the year ending June 30 shows a reduction in the deficit of over \$10,000,000. During the fiscal year of 1909 the deficit amounted to \$17,480,000; this year the deficiency was but \$6,970,000.

HARRIMAN ROADS' MEN IN EASTERN OREGON

Nampa, Idaho, Aug. 5.—A special train passed here yesterday carrying officials of the Oregon Short Line, and prominent among them were Judge Lovett, successor to E. H. Harriman and head of the Harriman roads; General Superintendent W. H. Bancroft, Chief Locating Engineer Carl Stadler, and Superintendent A. B. Stevenson of the Idaho division. The officials were joined here by E. H. Dewey of the Idaho Northern railway. The special proceeded to Vale, Or., where Mr. Lovett, Carl Stadler and E. H. Dewey will take automobiles for a trip into southern Oregon. Mr. Bancroft and Mr. Stevenson returned east tonight. No little importance is attached to the trip of the prominent officials into Oregon by wise ones of this section.

FALLS TO DEATH DOWN ELEVATOR SHAFT

Loosing his balance near an elevator shaft in the building of the Kilham Stationery company at Fifth and Oak streets last evening, B. A. Finch, a teamster, aged 35, fell three floors and died a few hours afterward at St. Vincent's hospital. Finch was employed by the Henderson & Finch Transfer company and had been sent to remove some furniture from the Kilham building. An employee took him up to the third floor and then went up to the fourth floor with the elevator. A few minutes later a cry was heard and Finch was found unconscious at the bottom of the shaft. His skull had been fractured and both arms and several ribs broken.

SMUT EXPLODES AND THRESHER DESTROYED

Weston, Or., Aug. 5.—The threshing of Joe Keys was totally destroyed by fire yesterday evening. No insurance. The origin of the fire was from the explosion of smut. No further damage resulted, the fire being kept from spreading to the wheat sacks.

Threshing is about completed in this section. No very large yields have been reported. The average is from 30 to 40 bushels per acre. All wheat is of good quality, full weight and over, some weighing as high as 61 pounds to the bushel.

No sales are being made, and the farmers are all inclined to hold for high prices.

LIBERATED MEN GIVEN OVATION

Mexican Political Agitators to
Be Honored With Mass
Meeting by Laborers.

Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 5.—Magon, Villalaz and Rivera, the Mexican political agitators who were released Wednesday from the prison at Florence, Ariz., after serving an 18 months' term, arrived in Los Angeles yesterday and were greeted by a big crowd at the railroad station. The committee of the Mexican Liberals, Socialists and laboring men who officially greeted them, explained that it was difficult to get many at the station so early after the noon hour.

When the three men left their car a cheer went up. The three quietly boarded a streetcar and went to their homes. Plans are under way for a mass meeting in Labor temple Sunday night in honor of the three Liberals.

WICKERSHAM AND NAGLE IN ARCTIC BROTHERHOOD

Skagway, Aug. 5.—Joining President Taft in his honorary membership in the Arctic Brotherhood, the big fraternal organization of Alaska, Attorney General Wickersham and Secretary of Commerce and Labor Nagle have been initiated into the mother camp of the order here. Former United States District Attorney Griggaby of Nome, who was recently removed, following charges preferred by the Pioneer Mining company, is also a prominent member of the order.

Charged With Whiskey Frauds.
Philadelphia, Aug. 5.—Jacob Selber, who was arrested two weeks ago on a charge of being implicated in the distilling and disposing of 102,340 gallons

of spirits on which no tax had been paid, was given a preliminary hearing before a United States commissioner here today. Selber is a former employee of the Illinois Fruit Distilling company, which is alleged to have engaged in extensive "moonshining" operations in the heart of Chicago. The president of the concern and nearly a dozen of its employees have been arrested in connection with the case. They are said to have defrauded the government out of nearly \$115,000 in revenue taxes. Selber denies that he was concerned in the alleged frauds and declares that he has not been in Chicago for nearly two years.
