GREGG BREAKS UP
OAKS' WIN STREAKOlson's Daring Baserunning
and Casey's Timely Two-
Bagger Help Beavers.

San Francisco, Aug. 6.—Gregg's elusive pitching, Olson's daring bit of baserunning and a timely two-bagger by Casey, combined with errors on the part of the Oaks, gave Portland a chance to break into the win column after losing three straight to the Wolverines. The score was 2 to 1.

Gregg and Mosier pitched well, both letting their opponents down with four hits and walking four men. But Gregg was away to the good on strikes, getting 10 to Mosier's four. In one inning the Portland southpaw struck out the three men up.

Portland began scoring in the fourth inning, when Fisher was safe on an error by Wares. He took second on a wild pitch and caught home easily when Casey slammed a two-bagger into right field.

Oakland tied up the score in the sixth session. Carroll started with a single and Mize's walk placed him on second. Gregg put the screws on Mosier. When Hogan laced the ball into left field Carroll reached home from second.

Go Out to Win.

Portland went right after the Commodore in the eighth inning. After Ryan was out, Olson nearly tore Wolverton's hand off with a grounder and Rapps out at first, Olson speeded up, rounded second and lit out for third. He beat the ball to the bag by the prettiest piece of base running seen here this season, catching the Oakland infield flat footed. When Cutshaw booted a hard grounder from Fisher's sapling, Olson was across the plate with the winning run.

By some clever headwork in the last half of the ninth, the northerners retained the Oaklanders on bases, the whole infield being mixed up in the affair.

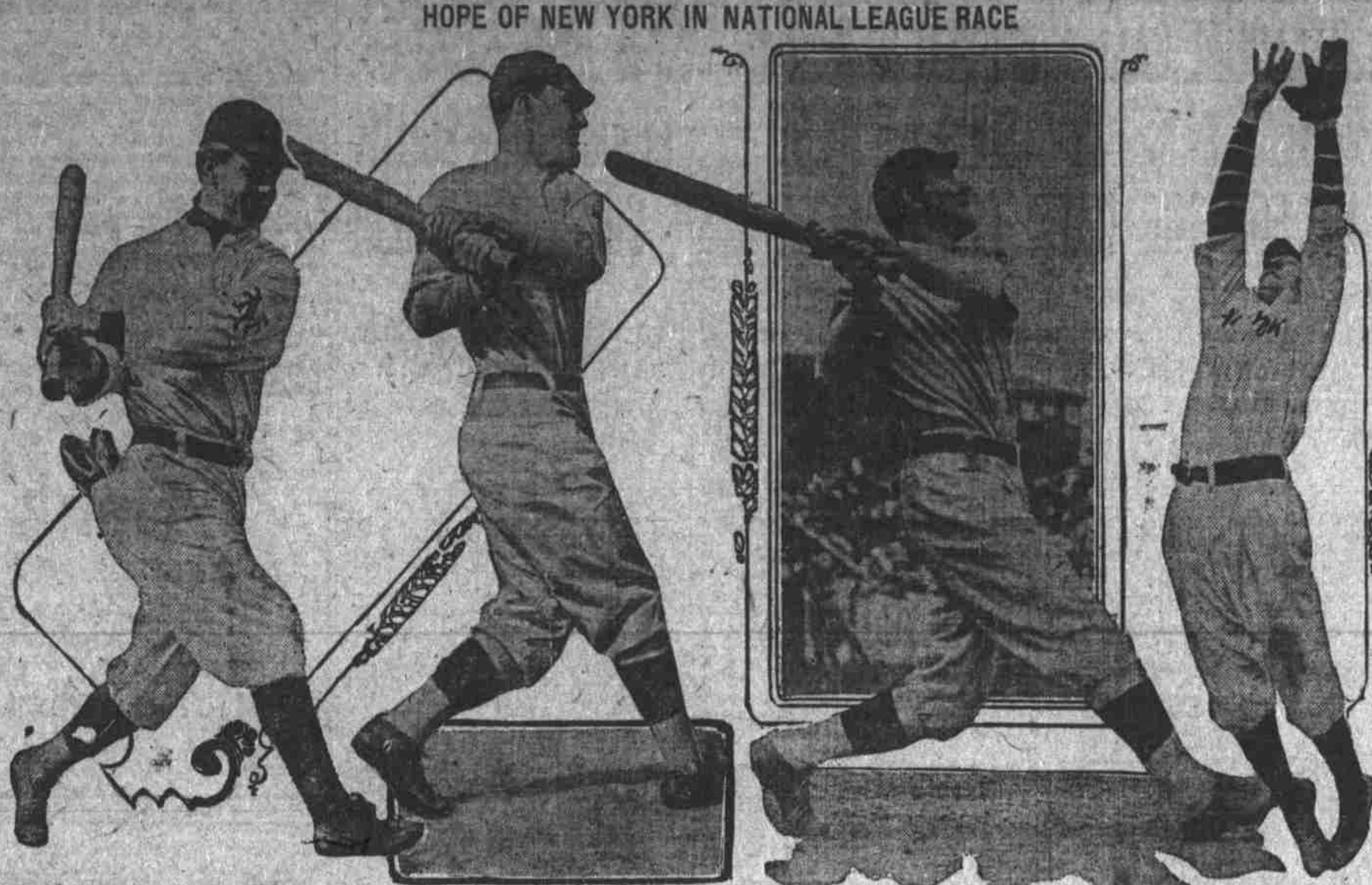
