

PRAY FOR VISION, NOT WHISKEY, ON YOUR VACATION

Rev. James D. Corby Preaches
Timely Sermon on What He
Thinks People Should Take
With Them on Outing.

Yesterday morning, at the Universalist Church of the Good Tidings, Broadway and East Twenty-fourth street, Rev. James D. Corby, pastor of the church, preached a most timely sermon on "Some Things to Take With You on Vacation." His text was: "The word of the Lord came to Elijah, saying, turn eastward and hide thyself by the brook Cherith. Arise, get thee to Zarephath and dwell there. I Kings, xvi:2-9."

After a graphic picture of the conditions when Elijah appears and the hatred of Jezebel for him, which resulted in her seeking the life of the prophet, so that he is hidden to seek refuge, Dr. Corby said:

"The incident teaches the helpful spirit to be found in the most unexpected places. The prophet went there for safety and as loving care kept him day by day he gained a high regard for the place and people. Then, as the famine spread he moves over to Zarephath and is ministered to by a poor widow in the very town from which Jezebel came, who was seeking his life. 'There is a conservatism which blindly declares that nothing is good away from home. Without taking the trouble to examine, they assume the outsider is unworthy, because he has had different training or surroundings.'

Religion's Important Mission. "There is a provincialism that fears the stranger, and is suspicious of anything different from what one has been used to. An important mission of religion is to break down prejudice and develop the power to see the divine values in the men and women we meet."

"In this age of fighting against other tribes and nations, it is important that we should have a closer corporation than the Hebrew commonwealth. But travel and intercourse, commerce and trade sweeping in ever wider circles made intramural existence impossible."

"They kept learning that all strangers were not as black as painted. When Naomi was among aliens, her sons dead and her heart sad, it was Ruth who said, 'Where thou lodgest I will lodge, my people shall be my people and thy God, my God.' Paul's travels were a revelation to him of human kindness and help. The crusades of the middle ages increased knowledge, abated prejudices and strengthened human ties."

Vacation Works Wonders. "A vacation should shake us out of the rut. It should enable us to view things from another angle. It would be educational and inspiring in every congregation in the city required its pastor to exchange, not with those of the same denomination, but the exact opposite, so that those used to hearing a conservative preacher should now hear a liberal, and those who hear every Sunday the universal message, should now listen to the partial message of another speaker. It would surprise many to note how much of agreement there is on the great essentials."

"Christianity is not dead; it is alive and growing. For an individual to say, 'The religion of my fathers is good enough for me, but I do not like it, but usually prejudice. This was just what the majority said to Christ. Yet the Master said, 'I am not come to destroy, but to fulfill.' They had the blade; Christ would give them the full corn in the ear. The vacation season can make us rich if we are hospitable to its best lessons."

Serves Humanity. "You may not go out of the city or you may go far away, but as you go pray God to give you vision to see the kind hearts, loving unselfishness and moral heroism in those you meet. The youth who waits on your table is earning a college education that he may benefit."

O. N. G. BOYS OFF ON CAMPING TRIP

For Ten Days at American Lake
Will Live at Soldiers Do-
During War.

Tears dropped and kisses showered on departing soldier boys at the Union depot this morning. Mothers and sweethearts mingled fond farewells with parting obligations, then stood and waved hands and handkerchiefs at one section after another of the Oregon National Guard trains bound for American Lake near Tacoma pulled out of the city. It would have been like a real war scene had the khaki-clad soldiers viewed the occasion fearfully instead of taking it as an outing.

The first train left at 7 o'clock this morning. It was made up of Portland boys and the headquarters, including Adjutant General Finzer, Quartermaster Captain Knapp, the regimental and battalion staff and the ambulance company.

On this train there were five companies, B, K, C, F, and B. Clad in new uniforms they made a striking appearance and their manner showed that they were not at all ashamed of themselves either. At 9:30 o'clock the Fourth regiment and Company M departed. At 11 o'clock the Third Infantry, Companies A, I, G, and L, with Companies H and P of the Fourth Infantry left from the Union depot.

The distance to American Lake, where the members of the National Guard will go into encampment for ten days, is 142 miles, or five hours by train. Stores and equipment were loaded on the trains yesterday and everything gotten ready for departure on schedule time this morning.

At American Lake the boys will become to all appearances real soldiers. They will drill and sweat, eat army food, build campfires and dream of home. During the last few days they will be compelled to march and engage in maneuvers such as would be necessary in the event of a possible invasion of the Pacific coast.

SUNKEN TREASURE
IN GREAT LAKES

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Aug. 8.—Captain Ellis J. H. and a submarine wrecker from San Francisco, has expressed the opinion that more than \$12,000,000 of treasure lies at the bottom of the Great Lakes in the hulls of wrecked vessels. From 1878 to 1898 alone 6000 ships went down in the inland seas, many of them loaded with bullion, copper, and machinery. Captain Holland is exploiting a company for the recovery of some of the sunken wealth.

TORPEDO BOAT FLOTILLA
ON TARGET PRACTICE

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Diego, Cal., Aug. 8.—Led by the flagship Whipple, the Pacific torpedo boat flotilla steamed out of the harbor this morning bound for San Pedro to engage in three weeks' target practice. The boats have been thoroughly overhauled and the crews expect to shatter some records.

Chinese Bootlegger a Suicide.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New Westminster, B. C., Aug. 8.—Ah Tong, a Chinaman, arrested Saturday evening for selling liquor to Indians, is a suicide. Tearing the bed coverings into strips and using his bunk and the window bars of his cell as a scaffold, he hanged himself. He was an old offender.

UNIONS DECIDE NOT TO DECLARE GENERAL STRIKE

Conservative Leaders Convince
Majority of Rank and File
Walkout Would Serve Em-
ployers More Than Selves.

Local labor unions will not order a general strike. By a narrow majority the workmen decided yesterday that a walkout would serve the employers more than themselves. Instead they voted to assess themselves \$1 a week per capita to support striking machinists and teamsters.

Conservative labor leaders almost sweat blood yesterday trying to bring to their way of thinking the executive committees from the labor unions. A strong strike sentiment was given emphatic expression by the rank and file of union men. The session which met at the Labor Temple at 11 o'clock in the morning continued for seven hours.

A meeting of the General Labor Council called immediately afterwards did not adjourn until 11 p. m. Both gatherings were stormy. Many of the men believed that employers had defied them and wanted to quit work as a counter act of defiance.

"But in the end we decided that the sane method of procedure would be to continue at work, thus getting week by week money with which to aid the strikers," said President Will Daly of the State Federation of Labor, today.

Work for Strikers. "The strikers are right. They will win. We will help them win. We will use every bit of organized influence in keeping them from defeat. We will co-operate with the strikers in all things. The strike may continue indefinitely, but the result will be a strengthening of unionism in this city."

Resolutions adopted yesterday originated with the waterfront association with which the striking teamsters are closely affiliated. The declaration reads:

"Owing to the industrial strife now being waged by and between the Employers' association, the Teamsters' and Machinists' unions, and as all kinds of wild talk about a general strike, and a lot of unnecessary negotiations, have resulted in no good being accomplished and, realizing that some effective and practical system must be adopted by the union men, women and friends in Oregon; be it therefore resolved:

"Resolved, That first, we do not favor a general strike, as it would benefit the employers now involved in strikes, etc., only, and would give them the long looked for chance to shoulder their burden on non-antagonistic and fair employers like, hoping that they would be forgotten in a general melee, and thereby save themselves from certain ruination now staring them in the face."

Militia Would Be Called. "They also consider that in a general strike the state militia would be as available and useful as the strikebreaker protectors and corporation tools now furnished the Employers' association by our worthy mayor and allies. Secondly, the teamsters' and machinists' strikes were won long ago, which any sane man can easily ascertain by the slightest investigation. Third, organized labor and its friends in Oregon are surely not to be led astray by a few open shop fanatics that have never in their lives earned an honest dollar, nor are they worthy of a workman's consideration or confidence, and should be eliminated from all negotiations henceforth; be it further resolved:

"Resolved, That all overtures on the part of organized labor to settle the present strike be held in abeyance, and that all negotiations with the Banfield association cease; but that we stand at all times ready to meet an arbitration committee to arbitrate the question at issue, and that a vigorous and effective campaign of retaliation be inaugurated at once. We recommend, first, that the authorized strikers be paid a reasonable weekly salary from an assessment of \$1 per week from all union men; lady members, apprentices, etc., 50 cents. Said money to be paid in promptly to the treasurer of the Central Labor council. A disbursing court shall be created at once, consisting of one member from each section, and two from the Central Labor council."

Stand Together. "They shall be given authority to investigate all matters that may seem proper in connection with paying off strike benefits, and be responsible to their section and their local union for their conduct of affairs; and, finally, be it

"Resolved, That organized labor, to a man, will stand by their fellow unionists on strike, and will see to it that no union man, woman or child contributes the red penny to any unfair or open shop firm or individuals, and will, at the proper time, advise you of a plan that never fails but will effectually put

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ROOSEVELT FILLS OUT ITINERARY

Will Leave for West on August
25, Returning to Oyster
Bay September 11.

New York, Aug. 8.—Colonel Roosevelt has added several cities where he will stop over and make speeches to the itinerary of his western trip, which has now been completed. Leaving Oyster Bay on August 25, Colonel Roosevelt will go direct to Cheyenne, using the New York Central to Buffalo, then west to Omaha and then up to Cheyenne. He will arrive at Cheyenne on Saturday, August 27, and remain there until the following Monday. Leaving Cheyenne, he will go direct to Denver and spend the afternoon of August 29. He will reach Oswatimie, Kan., August 31, and stop there Wednesday, leaving the next day, September 1, for Kansas City.

The colonel is to leave Kansas City at midnight of September 1, and will arrive at Omaha the next day, Friday, September 2, where he will remain until the Saturday following, jumping thence to Sioux Falls, S. D. He is to speak at Fargo, N. D., on Labor day, September 5.

One of his most important speeches will be delivered at St. Paul before the Conservation congress, which will be in session, September 6. On September 7 the colonel will be the guest of the Press club of Milwaukee.

The next stop will be at Freeport, Ill., and thence he will go to Chicago, where he will be entertained by the Hamilton club. The same night he will move on to Cincinnati and spend Friday, September 9, there. Next day he will journey to Pittsburgh to address the civic commission of that city. He will return to New York, making no more speeches for the rest of the trip and will reach Oyster Bay September 11.

After he returns from the west and starts on his southern tour he will make several short trips in the vicinity of New York.
