CRAZED BY PAIN,  
MAN DEFIES POLICEDrives Nurse and Members of  
Family From Home; Finally  
Surrenders.

Crazed by the pain of his ailment, James Beal, a fruitgrower, drove the nurse and members of his family from the house on East Harrison street, near Twenty-eighth street, at midnight last night, and held it against a squad of police until 6 o'clock this morning. Beal is suffering from a cancer and at various times has been rendered temporarily insane by the suffering. Shortly before 12 o'clock last night he jumped from his bed, grasped a loaded shotgun and a knife which were in the room and drove the frightened nurse out. When members of the family approached him he also threatened them and they retreated for the time being. Police headquarters was notified and a detail of patrolmen under Sergeant Joseph Keller was hurried to the residence. When the officers approached the house Beal appeared at one of the windows and pointed the gun at them. After being ordered to come out of the house to finish the discussion, Beal came out unarmed and while Keller kept him busy talking other officers slipped into the residence and got possession of the gun and knife. These were turned over to a neighbor at the request of Mrs. Beal. Beal's attack of frenzy had passed away and he was sent back to bed, members of the family promising to keep a closer watch upon him.

INITIATIVE PETITION  
FOR BETTER DOCKS  
BEING CIRCULATED

(Continued from Page One.)

The improvement of the water and harbor front of the city, for the acquisition, construction and improvement of public docks, and for the acquisition by condemnation, or otherwise, of lands for the same; to create a commission to carry on such work and to regulate and control the construction, maintenance and operation of wharves, docks, slips, piers, and other water front structures in the city and to authorize the issuance and sale of bonds of the city of Portland up to \$2,500,000 for the above purposes, and to levy a tax as may be necessary for current expenses in carrying out the stated purposes.

It is pointed out by those favoring the measure that, unless public docks be secured at this time and without delay, Portland will be badly handicapped in the future, especially in the matter of attracting trade that will follow the opening of the canal. It is also explained that, as time goes by, property values along the river front will greatly increase, so that when eventually the matter of public docks becomes forced upon the city, the burden will be much heavier than now, while values are comparatively light.

Regulation of the water front by the municipality, it is held, would also result in a transformation of the appearance of the city from the river, which is now anything but attractive, with poorly kept up docks of flimsy construction.

Another forcible argument in favor of the public dock movement and city control of the streets abutting thereon is that it will insure entrance into the city of railroads that are bound to come with future development of the city and state.

**A** SOUTHERN woman, Mrs. Alice Louise Lytle, has struck the true chord in the matter of woman's suffrage. Discussing sociological matters in which she is deeply interested, she said: "I am greatly interested in children. I have one son 15 years of age, and he has been brought up under the only theory I have of raising children—that is, children should be brought up by the mother in every instance. He is not a molly-coddle, is accustomed to get in fights and scraps, but is a clean boy, and realizes that nature demands penalties for every one of her laws which he breaks."

"He is also imbued with the idea that one set of morals for men and another for women is wrong, and that I demand the same life of him that he will demand for the girl he may marry. If I have a hobby, that is it. I have no use for the suffragette, and I am teaching my son to voice my sentiments political when the time comes for him to vote. Here is women's power to do and be, the power that the political conditions of the day call for. All the street parades and banners will never get women the franchise, and if I have to share it with the negro women of the south, with the immigrant women of the north and with the demimonde everywhere, I am not going to be able to wield as much influence as I can through the child, who will be my son, when he has reached the age of discretion."

What a fine, sensible woman! What splendid, wholesome ideas! Would there were more like her. It is such womanhood that may be truly cited as the "Pillars of Society." She is the sort of woman who greets you with the phrase "Old friendships never rust."
