

DON JAIME SAID TO BE POPULAR

Pretender to Spanish Throne
May Be Proper Person to
Bring Order Out of Chaos.

Paris, Aug. 10.—Spain, torn internally by the dispute with the Vatican, threatened by socialism and anarchism, and disturbed by the agitation for a republic, is believed by many well informed persons here to have a new view in store for her. The star of the Carlist cause, which had been buried below the horizon for many years, is again blazing full in the firmament of Spanish politics.

Within the past few weeks Don Jaime of Bourbon, pretender to the throne of Spain and the hope of the Carlist cause, has come to be the most discussed person in Europe. Private advices from Madrid state that never since there was a pretender to the Spanish throne has the outlook been so favorable for the fall of the constitutional monarchy. The Carlist clubs in the kingdom—and there are several thousand of them, it is said—are active as never before; the breath of conspiracy is in the air; the old loyal blood of the Basques is stirred to the innermost chambers of its heart, and the Carlist leaders, with ample money at their command, powerful friends and strong in purpose, are only waiting for the moment to come when they can strike the blow.

At the present time Don Jaime is living quietly at the chateau of Frohsdorf, near Vienna, which has been his principal home since the death of his father, the late Don Carlos. Prior to that event, which made him the legitimate pretender to the throne of Spain, Don Jaime spent much of his time in Paris, residing in an apartment house in the Rue Benjamin Godard, in the Passy neighborhood. Upon the death of his father it became necessary for him to exile himself from France, under the law passed by the French parliament, after Don Carlos, in 1881, allied himself with the Count de Chambord, forever banishing the eldest representatives of any family that ever reigned in France.

The majority of those who were acquainted with Don Jaime during his residence in Paris are of the opinion that he will stand fast by the declaration he made after his father's funeral, that he would never involve Spain in the horrors of a civil war for the advancement of his own rights to the throne. At the same time he is generally believed here that the young pretender would willingly accept the throne if disaster should and the reign of his cousin, Alfonso XIII, providing that such action on his part might contribute to the restoration of law and order on the peninsula.

The training and career of Don Jaime have been such as to make him the ideal boot and spurred prince. His military education was received in the stern school of the Russian army. Ten years ago he saw active service as an officer of the Russian cavalry during the campaign in China and four years later he returned to Manchuria to act as a war correspondent in the conflict between Russia and Japan. It is agreed by all who know him that he is vastly more popular than was his father, and that he would not lack followers should he decide to buckle on his sword and fight his way to Madrid at the head of an army.

TOTAL ABSTAINERS IN ANNUAL CONVENTION

Boston, Aug. 10.—The fortieth annual national convention of the Catholic Total Abstinence Union of America began today, when the thousand or more delegates, many of whom have been in the city several days, engaged in committee work in connection with the convention, assembled in Faneuil hall for the formal opening exercises. Prior to taking up the regular program of business, the delegates attended the celebration of a solemn pontifical mass at the Cathedral of the Holy Cross. ITALIANS CELEBRATE
BIRTHDAY OF CAUVOR

Rome, Aug. 10.—The one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Count di Cavour, the greatest of Italian statesmen of modern times, was celebrated throughout Italy today. Especially notable were the observances in Rome and in Turin, where the great statesman was born August 10, 1810.

Cavour is one of the three leading figures in the history of modern Italy, Garibaldi and Mazzini completing the trio. In 1854 France and England concluded their alliance against Russia, and Sardinia, at the suggestion of Cavour, was permitted to join them. This was the beginning of the unity of Italy. From this first step he was enabled to carry out his scheme of securing the aid of France in expelling Austria from Lombardy and the Italian and of realizing the unity of the Italian states in the new kingdom of Italy, of which he immediately became the prime minister.

EXCURSIONISTS PICNIC;
WHITE STEAMER STICKS

Seattle, Aug. 10.—The steamer Chipewa, which ran aground a few miles west of Anacortes yesterday morning while carrying 795 excursionists from Bellingham to Victoria, is in the drydock at the Moran shipyards today for repairs.

Captain William Thornton, on the bridge at the time of the accident, said today:

"We were about 100 feet off our course. The weather was thick and I had set the regular course to Victoria."

Captain Thornton protested against sensational reports of the wreck printed here.

"There was no excitement whatever," he said, "and the passengers took the accident more as a lark, spending the day picnicking on the island."

DISTRICT FAIR AT
ROSEBURG POSTPONED

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 10.—Because of the appearance here of Buffalo Bill's circus on September 23, and the regular primary elections on September 24, this year's district fair to be held at Roseburg has been postponed one week, to September 27 to October 1, inclusive.

The Lane county fair at Eugene is to be held September 20 to 24, and the holding of the fair here the following week will give horsemen an opportunity of attending both events. Some fine prizes are offered here.

Asbury Park's Aviation Meet.
Asbury Park, N. J., Aug. 10.—Inter-laken, a suburban colony on Deal Lake opposite Asbury Park, is to be the scene during the next 16 days of the first big aviation meet in New Jersey. The Asbury Park Aero and Motor club has engaged Walter Brookings and a number of other well known aviators to take part. Several of the machines were set up today and it is intimated that the aviators will try for some new records before the end of the week. The field where the meet takes place is enclosed by a canvas wall two miles long, and stands to accommodate 15,000 spectators have been built.

TAFT SET DAYS TO TALK POLITICS

Will Meet Leaders on Campaign Matters on Mondays, Wednesdays, Fridays.

Beverly Mass., Aug. 10.—Monday, Wednesday and Friday will be conference days at the summer capital. President Taft has decided to see visiting politicians who want to talk over the coming campaign on those days each week. The other days will be devoted to the presidential vacation, except when important matters pertaining to the work of the administration come up for settlement.

Taft today inquired by long distance telephone regarding the condition of Mayor Gaynor. He expressed gratification when he found that Gaynor passed a satisfactory night.

President Arthur T. Hadley of Yale is scheduled to visit the president during the afternoon. Taft will try to induce him to accept the chairmanship of the stock and bond commission, an appointment Hadley has been considering.

During the morning the president played golf with John Hays Hammond and William J. Boardman.

TO DISCUSS PLANS FOR
HOSPITAL AT DINNER

Members of the Peninsula Development league will give a dinner at the Portland Commercial club rooms at 6:30 o'clock tonight, and will begin circulating subscriptions for a public hospital the organization proposes to build near Columbia park. Representative men of the peninsula and east side have been invited to attend the dinner and discuss with physicians and surgeons the necessity of some kind of a relief institution on the east side.

The league decided to give the dinner after its members had interviewed many residents of the peninsula and found the hospital plan received with favor. The league's plans contemplate the erection of a fireproof structure costing in the neighborhood of \$10,000, adjoining Columbia park. A stock company will be formed to finance the erection of the hospital structure and operation. Many parts of the peninsula are more than 10 miles distant from any hospital. Because of the large number of mills and factories on the strip and the multiplicity of accidents, residents believe a relieving institution, at least, necessary.

ATTEMPT TO GET
CORNER ON SILVER
