

PHONY DEAD MEN
STREW FIELD AT

GOSGROVE, WASH.

Theoretical Losses; Battle Begins Before Sunrise.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Manter Camp, Congrove, Wash.
Aug. 10.—In a battle today characterized by extensive fierceness of attack the fourth Oregon infantry was theor-

heavily destroyed by a heavy fire of sharpshoot and machine guns. The third and fourth Oregon regiments were a portion of the red army. Colonel W. L. Evans, twenty-fifth United States infantry, commanding, which attacked a wagon train convoyed by two regiments and a battery of artillery commanded by Colonel McGunnagle, first infantry.

In the battle south and east of Dupont the red army lost heavily in the early part of the engagement through the daring tactics adopted by Colonel Evans. Under the direction of his com-

manding officer, Colonel Yorlan led his troops into an open field where they were subjected to a scathing fire of small arms and shrapnell from battery "A" of the second artillery. Hypothetically the field was strewn with dead and dying. The third Oregon, Colonel Poorman commanding, also lost heavily in the major part of the conflict at Duncans Creek. After the

Starting early before sunrise as part of the red army the Oregon troops were forced to make a wide detour to secure their position. Hardly rested from their long march, they were thrown into the thickest of the fray under the order issued by Colonel Evans. Those who were declared by the umpire to be killed were granted a much needed

rest, but the remainder who were no so fortunate were forced to continue on the long hike.

At this hour (10 o'clock) it is impossible to foretell the outcome of the contest. The field of maneuver covered by the troops is several miles in length and the firing continues to be brisk.

CHARGES POLICEMAN ABUSED HIS PONY

Charging police officer No. 27 with wilfully abusing a small pony, William Romacly has filed an affidavit with Chief of Police Cox setting out the incident, which occurred yesterday. Romacly demands an investigation to determine if the police officer is guilty of the charges.

The affidavit states that Romac was driving a small pony yesterday afternoon on Grand avenue, when he drove to a public watering place at Hawthorn avenue to give the pony a drink. Cars were standing in the street and it was not possible for Mr. Romac to see that the water was cut off. Then it was

that the policeman appeared and struck the pony on the head, knocking it to the pavement, at the same time threatening to arrest Romacy. The arrest was not made, however.

Mr. Romacy says he has lived in Arleta for seven years and that he has never given anyone cause to quarrel with him or abuse the family pet pony.

Patrolman Adams, in a report to Chief

tain Bailey, says that Romacly was driving on the left side of the street, going south on Grand avenue, thus violating a clause of the traffic ordinance. Adams was standing at Grand avenue and East Hawthorne and as Romacly approached he held up his hand. He says that Romacly continued to drive toward him and he again held up his
