Employment Agencies in Limerick.
Vigorous prosecution of employment agencies whose methods are questionable is promised by Assistant City Attorney Sullivan. In the past when complaints were received at the city attorney's office from men who alleged they were victimized settlements were often effected without recourse to warrants, but Sullivan declares that some agencies have grown bold and pay no attention to suggestions made to them. Sullivan this morning issued a warrant for the arrest of D. D. Young, manager of Hansen's employment agency, on a complaint made by J. B. Sparks, an engineer. Sparks says that he was promised permanent work as an engineer on a concrete contract, but that in the past three weeks he has only been given about ten days' work.

FURNITURE MADE AT HOME

By Enthusiast.
I MAKE a good many things about the house, as I am fond of working hammer and saw and some people say I am quite handy with them. I had a wooden bedstead, displaced by one of the iron style. I made a writing desk of it and the entire cost was 5 cents for hinges, 15 cents for a wide board for the top and 10 cents for varnish. Taking the four legs I saved them to the proper length and applied the panels to making the body of the desk. I fitted the panel pieces together for the extension part, then took the sides of the bed, and placing the pieces upright, made the side panels. On the left side, I made two six-inch shelves, then putting in as many pigeon holes as I desired. The desk is eight inches deep from the back and six inches in front, 34 inches from side to side and 21 inches from front to back. A slot is fastened to one side of the writing bed, so that if I desire to hold it up while looking in the drawer it can be done with my hands free.

For a china closet I took four boards 15 inches wide, saved three corners, and fitted them 15 inches apart in a corner, nailing them firmly to slats. I made a frame five inches wide to cover the shelves, using three window panes to fill in the door frame, fasten-

ing the glass with putty. A pair of hinges and simple latch, with a little varnish, completed the closet. Then brass screw hooks can be put in the bottom of the shelves for cups.

Get a box from your merchant, say three or four feet long and fasten the lid on with hinges. Cover top, ends and both sides with cretonne, laid in pleats and tacked with brass tacks. Pad the lid heavily. Put a three-inch ruffle around the edge of the cover. Paper the inside. You have a dainty window seat and a neat place to keep short waists and other bulky articles.

Talk cracker boxes such as you can get of your grocer. Lay them on top of each other, as many as you like, and fasten together. Put a brass rod across the top, from which suspend a cretonne curtain by small brass rings. This makes a nice linen closet. I put small boxes inside the longer ones to use like drawers, giving added protection from dust. For collars, cuffs, neckwear and trinkets the box-drawers make an ideal arrangement.

To Lighten Labor.
Ironing is tedious and tiring work, but it can be made less so if these simple expedients are tried.
One of these is a floor cushion. Make a flat pad of excelsior, three inches

thick, and big enough to stand upon comfortably.

Another is the kneeboard—three feet long, thin and light—which may be held on the lap, thus making it possible to sit while ironing small things, as collars, handkerchiefs, dollies, etc.

A third, for table linen, is the roller. Get a big cardboard mailing tube as long as a folded tablecloth in width, and fasten a narrow ribbon inside, so a yard hangs out at the end.

Then instead of folding the ironed cloth, roll it around the tube and tie down the end with ribbon, cross the strings, pass them around the roll and tie on the other side, so keeping the cloth smooth and compact.

Salads of eggs, which make desirable additions to lunch baskets and may be carried safely if packed in covered jelly or marmalade jars.
