

MANUFACTURERS ASK THAT BAILEY EXPLAIN POSITION

Curious to Know Why Food
Commissioner Prohibits Use
of Coloring in Cones, but Al-
lows It in Butter.

Dairy and Food Commissioner J. W. Bailey is spending much of his time giving answers to angry manufacturers who want analysis of the processes of thought by which he has arrived at conclusions vitally important to their various business affairs.

Yesterday he ruled that saccharine, a sweet that has no food but considerable medicinal value, must not be used in manufacturing ice cream cones. The use of saccharine is recommended by the government, but Commissioner Bailey assigned as a reason that he did not like the sound of the word. Further questioning brought an impatient "Stop it! Stop it!"

"My position," he said, "is that colorings enable manufacturers to make inferior articles appear superior."

This ruling he made to apply in the use of coal tar or aniline colorings used only in ice cream cones but in jellies. He did not make this distinction, which he permits in candies, as was stated in The Journal yesterday.

Creameries Color Butter.

Then the manufacturers came back with another question: "Why, if you disapprove of colorings do you permit creameries to color their butter?"

"Because it makes the butter look better," the dairy and food commissioner promptly replied.

"That is precisely the reason why we wish to color our jellies and our ice cream cones," persisted the manufacturers. "That is precisely the reason why the favored manufacturers color their candies."

The conversation had the effect of bringing out the fact that every creamery colors the butter which it manufactures and is permitted to do by Dairy and Food Commissioner J. W. Bailey. The colors are not necessarily harmful, but neither are the colorings of the cones and jellies.

"Bailey came to my office," said a man who is intimately conversant with conditions in the office of the commissioner, "when no one knew anything about the necessities or duties of the position. The adulterations of food were so glaring that any ignorant could pick them out. But now have changed."

The adulterations are scientifically made and chemical experts are required to determine what they are. It is certain that Bailey never got his job because of his qualifications. He does not know as much as a child about the duties of his position."

Another of the commissioner's eccentricities came to light yesterday. Some lard is pure, some is mixed with tallow. He has decreed that all manufacturers who make the mix must stamp the word compound on the lard bucket. The manufacturers desired that they should be allowed to sell legally and at the same price as the manufacturer who uses less than 10 per cent tallow.

ROBBED IN RETURN FOR HIS KINDNESS

Leslie Roe Knocked Down by
Men to Whom He Gave
Four Dollars.

In return for his kindness in giving \$2 each to Ray Nelson and Stanley McDermott, 524 North Third street, where they told him they were "broke," Leslie Roe of 385 Ross street was lured from a saloon last night into the railroad yards in the north end of the city and robbed.

Roe met Nelson and McDermott in McHaffey's saloon, 84 North Third street, and grew convivial with them over several drinks. The young men then told Roe that they were striking teamsters and were badly in need of money. After Roe had given them \$4, displaying a large sum in doing so, they asked him to walk with them and meet a friend. Roe agreed, but when they got to the edge of the railroad yards he grew suspicious and declared he would not go further.

As he spoke one of the men grasped him in a powerful grip and the other struck him a powerful blow in the face, which knocked him stunned to the ground. Harbor Patrolman Lillis heard a cry from Roe as he ran and followed to the spot. Nelson and McDermott fled, taking \$7 they found in one of Roe's pockets, but in their hurry leaving \$63 he had in another.

Lillis traced Nelson to the rooming house on North Third street, where he found him in bed, pretending to be asleep. McDermott could not be found. At police headquarters Nelson was identified by Roe and then confessed. He was locked up on a charge of highway robbery. The prisoner is a brother of Patrolman Nelson, who was on duty in another part of the city when the crime took place.

Albert Crawford Back to Prison



Wenatchee, Wash., Aug. 13.—Albert Crawford has been taken to the Oregon penitentiary where he will serve out the balance of a two year sentence that was hanging over him when he escaped from that institution July 19.

Crawford was sent to the penitentiary from Umatilla county April 19, 1909, after having been convicted on a burglary charge and sentenced to two years. He made his escape while working on the penitentiary grounds and a reward of \$50 was offered for his capture by Superintendent C. W. James. Previous to the time of his conviction he had served one year in the Idaho penitentiary.

Crawford owes his recapture to his fondness for liquor. He was beating his way to Canada by the box car route. At Leavenworth he got hold of some money and spent the greater part of it for whiskey. He was intoxicated when he approached a brakeman on a train running west from that city and told him a hard luck story, confessing to him that he was an escaped convict. The brakeman sympathized with him and locked him up in a box car that was in a train coming this way. The brakeman then telephoned Sheriff Ferguson and Crawford was arrested as soon as the train arrived in this city. He put up a big bluff after being taken into custody, but when he was photographed and a copy of the picture sent to Salem he was immediately recognized.

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BUSINESS MAN OF EAST SIDE IN RACE FOR LOWER HOUSE

Charles Bigelow Seeks Repub-
lican Nomination in Direct
Primaries; Strong Advocate
of Statement No. 1.

Charles A. Bigelow, junior member of the well known east side firm of W. H. Markell & Co., announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for the house of representatives from Multnomah county yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Bigelow enters the contest for the nomination as a strong and earnest advocate of Statement No. 1, of the direct primary law as it is written and an opponent of the assembly movement. He will make his campaign on that platform, contending that the people have the right to designate their United States senators, that all candidates, under the law, have the guarantee of a free, open and unimpeded opportunity to submit their claims to the voters of their respective and that the assembly movement tends to evade and subvert the primary law.

Mr. Bigelow is one of the best known men in the east side district. He is a young man 36 years of age and has for a long time taken an active interest in the growth, betterment and upbuilding of that section of the city.

Becomes Junior Member.

Mr. Bigelow came to Portland 16 years ago and entered the employ of W. H. Markell the morning after his arrival in the city. Eight years ago, through his industry and close application to business, he became the junior member of the organized firm of W. H. Markell & Co. Mr. Bigelow was president of the East Side Business Men's club in 1908 and 1909, and is a director in the club now. He had charge of the arrangements for the big celebration of the east side, and the children's parade of the Rose Festival in 1908, 1909 and the present year. He is known as one of the chief boosters of the east side district and ranks high in the esteem of the business men of the entire city.

Mr. Bigelow has been an earnest advocate of the direct primary law since its enactment, having been one of its advocates while it was before the people for consideration, and having cast his vote for its passage. At that same time he was an ardent advocate of the principle of the direct election of United States senators, and of Statement No. 1, through which the feature of government can be maintained.

Backs Primary Law.

In discussing his candidacy today Mr. Bigelow made it plain that he stood for the integrity of the direct primary law in its entirety, and for progressive legislation in general.

"The direct primary law, of all laws, should be maintained," said Mr. Bigelow. "Statement No. 1 should be continued in force and observance without question."

"I believe also in the initiative and referendum. The necessity for that law has been demonstrated very clearly within the past six months in Portland. The experience of the people of Portland within that time with the city council when it gave away various privileges demonstrated the necessity for the referendum. I think that the law's application should extend to the control of gifts of franchises and streets and special privileges, when it is necessary for the people to use such control. I am opposed to the assembly," continued Mr. Bigelow. "I worked for and voted for the direct primary law."

People Know How to Vote.

"I believe in it as it is written, and as it should be obeyed. I do not countenance any evasion of it by assembly or other subterfuge. I am willing to take my candidacy for office before the Republican voters of Multnomah county and take my chances with them. I prefer it that way, as I have full confidence in the wisdom and discretion of my neighbors and fellow citizens, and believe that they are fully capable of selecting their public servants without dictation from any man or set of men or any source other than their own conscience and good citizenship."

"I do not believe that the assembly is within the spirit and intent of the primary law or that it has any legal standing. In my opinion the scheming necessity to put it on its feet showed that there was some question of its status in the minds of those who fostered it."

Mr. Bigelow will file his declaration of intention today and will make an active campaign for his nomination on a direct primary, Statement No. 1, and anti-assembly platform.
