

CHILDREN CRY FOR MOTHER IN JAIL

Woman Who Deserted Husband for Another Arrested on Complaint of Hubby.

The two children of Mrs. Mamie Swicker had to be forcibly removed from her when she was locked up last night at the city jail with Joseph Mallett, a painter, with whom she eloped from St. Louis, Mo., several months ago. The woman went into hysterics and the children, aged 6 and 9, clung sobbing to her until officers pulled them away as gently as they could. George Swicker, the husband and father, who had followed the eloping pair and his children to Portland, started to take them into his arms but they pushed him away and continued to cry for their mother. They were finally taken to the detention home at Montavilla by a policeman to be held until the case against the mother is disposed of.

Mrs. Swicker and Mallett left St. Louis early in May and came directly to Portland. They have since been living at 1063 East Twenty-fifth street. Swicker traced them in their flight and arrived here two days ago. He went to the East Twenty-fifth street house and tried to induce his wife to return to him, but she repelled him. He then went to the district attorney's office and swore out warrants for the arrest of both her and Mallett. The latter shows signs of being a craven and blames it all upon the woman.

"I didn't want to come with her," he said this morning at the city jail. "I was going to Chicago. Just before I intended to leave I met her and she told me she was going to leave her husband and go to Portland with the children. She asked me to go along, but I refused. Then she pleaded with me and coaxed until I finally succumbed to the temptation. We arrived in Portland May 6 and have been very happy until Swicker showed up."

The couple were arraigned before Municipal Judge Bennett today, but the hearing went over until tomorrow.

TEAMSTER FALLS DEAD FROM WAGON

Attacked by heart failure while seated on a wagon, O. C. Barnes, 125 East Forty-sixth street, fell dead to the pavement in front of the residence of W. E. Jacobs at 1028 East Alder street at 7:20 o'clock this morning. In falling Barnes struck upon his head and his skull was fractured. Dr. J. A. Pettit, thirty-fourth and Belmont streets, was called and declared that Barnes was dead. The body was removed to the morgue.

Barnes was 62 years old and leaves a widow and five children. He was employed by Jacobs, a contractor, as a teamster and had driven to the latter's house just before death took place.

HUSBAND FLEES WHEN WIFE DIES; CORPSE UNBURIED

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., Aug. 17.—A local undertaker is looking for M. D. Moore, a railroad laborer recently employed on the Southern Pacific company's Natron extension, for directions as to the disposition of the remains of his wife, who died here Monday. Immediately after the woman's death, Moore, taking his little daughter, left the city without anything being said about his wife's burial. He has not been heard from since.

Mrs. Moore died from melancholia, so the physicians said, and seemed to be in a demented condition before being taken to the hospital a day before she died.

INDEPENDENT NOMINEE FOR GOVERNOR URGED

CITY WOULD PAY SPECIAL OFFICERS

Court Hears Authorities on the Disbursement of Public Funds During Strike.

A policeman is worthy of his hire, and having performed service for the city, he should be paid. Thus argued Deputy City Attorney E. L. Latourrette before Judge Gantenbein in the circuit court this morning on the hearing of the injunction proceedings brought by J. Maguire to prevent payment of the July salaries of the special policemen during the teamsters' strike.

A policeman should not be paid if he is not employed by the proper authority. The charter says such appointments shall be made by the executive board and not by the mayor or chief of police. Otherwise the auditor or any other city officer could employ any number of men for special service and the taxpayers would have to pay the bill. This argued John A. Jeffrey, who contends that the injunction should be made permanent.

Judge Gantenbein listened for two hours this morning while the lawyers wrestled with the lawbooks. The spectators included nearly a score of the unpaid special policemen, who are hoping the court will turn loose the \$18,000 appropriated by the council to pay their salaries for July. The argument will be finished this afternoon.

Latourrette in his argument held that the court has no power to restrain the discretionary act of the executive board of the city in determining that special police protection was necessary. He placed emphasis on the city pleadings that the city officials acted in good faith, and said they could not be restrained except for a gross abuse of this power. Jeffrey held the executive board alone can put the specials to work, and subsequent ratification of their employment cannot cure the defect.

Largest Document Ever Placed on Record in Clatsop County Received.

It is a mortgage for \$30,000,000, given by the Pacific Light & Power company, which recently absorbed the Astoria Electric company, to the United States Mortgage & Trust company of New York.

RAILROAD COMMISSION HOLDS EUGENE HEARING

Salem, Or., Aug. 17.—The Oregon railroad commission departed this morning for Eugene where it will listen to complaints lodged against the Southern Pacific passenger services by the citizens of Eugene. One of the subjects to be considered will be that of a fast train service from Cottage Grove to Portland, so that many delays and inconveniences now experienced may be eliminated. Two propositions will be considered, the establishing of a flyer or an express train.

TARDY CANDIDATES CAN'T SHOW PHIZES

Two Protests Cause Chief Clerk Corey to Reverse Himself in Decision.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Aug. 17.—The secretary of state today received a protest from A. W. Lafferty, candidate for congress on the Republican ticket, against allowing C. J. Reed, candidate on the same ticket for the same office to have his cut and arguments appear in a pamphlet to be issued by the state printer, as he failed to have his nominating petition filed by August 14, as required by law.

A protest was also received from T. B. McDevitt, a Portland lawyer, who as a taxpayer asks the secretary to refuse to allow any candidate who did not have his nominating petition filed by August 14, to have his cut or argument appear in the pamphlet.

Chief Clerk Corey had announced that, though the latest time for candidates filing their nominating petitions and having their cuts and arguments appear in pamphlets was August 14, that he would extend the time to August 22 unless a protest was made.

In view of the two protests he has now reversed himself and any candidate who filed or will file petitions after August 14 will not be allowed to avail himself of the pamphlet as an advertising medium.

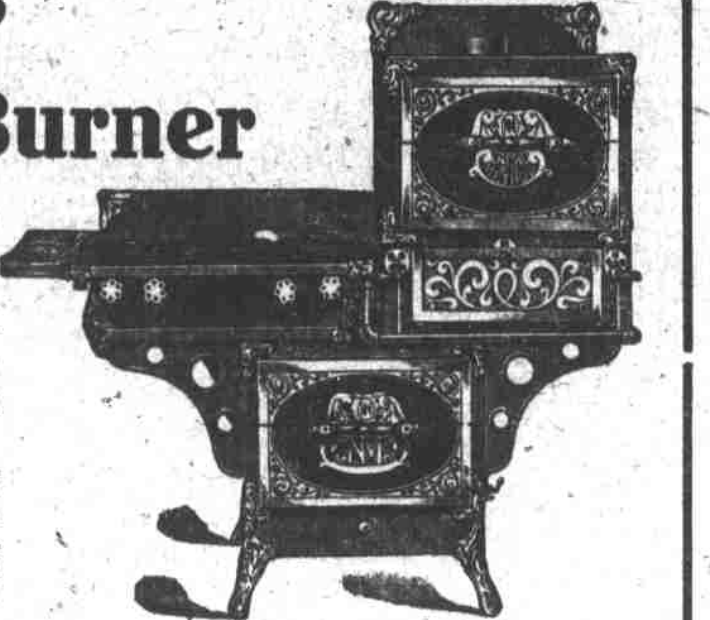
