The booklet explains that incidents frequently occur under the operation of automatic signals that reveal the cause of heretofore unexplainable accidents.

An arc light was burning in the kitchen and it is probable that an explosion would have occurred within a few minutes. Byrne reported the matter to the police, and an investigation is being made.

Father Donnelly Leaving.—Rev. Edward Donnelly, who had been connected with this diocese for several years, was given a reception recently on the occasion of his departure to the Dominican monastery in Benicia, Cal., where he will reside permanently. His return to the monastery, from which he withdrew 23 years ago, recalls his zeal and devotion at that time, in a matrimonial case of national importance. The history of this case, fully published in the California press of that date, is most interesting. Father Donnelly being a skilled architect, officially planned and supervised the many magnificent church edifices in the Oregon City diocese. Before coming to Oregon, 30 years ago, he had professional fame in Los Angeles, Denver and other cities. It is announced that the Rt. Rev. Thomas (Abbott), formerly of Mount Angel college, will succeed Father Donnelly as diocesan architect on his return from Denver, where he is at present taking the Dalton cure from an eye specialist.

Male Salome Insane.—Matt Watts is mistaken in believing himself a great Salome dancer. This is the official judgment of Dr. E. D. Johnson, who examined Watts on an insanity charge yesterday and declared him insane. Watts was arrested in the Terminal yards a few days ago by Patrolman Harms while executing what he declared was the most difficult gyrations of the Salome dance. The skepticism of the officer is now justified, and Watts goes to the asylum at Salem. He is a Finn, and his history is unknown.

Had to Be Ejected.—After Hugh Milne, aged 20, had been discharged by the Royal Bakery, Eleventh and Everett streets, he refused to leave and Steven Stroble, Alvin Horan and Jose Freiberg, bakers, ejected him from the place. Milne then swore out warrants charging them with assault and battery, but when the facts were told in municipal court this morning Judge Bennett discharged the accused men and told them they should have taken Milne across a knee and spanked him.

Ticks Leads to Row.—Because John Kreitz, 1001 Kelly street, tickled his wife last night she slapped him. Kreitz then tore a handful of hair from her head and chased her into the cellar where he choked her, she charges, with the result that Kreitz was in municipal court today on a charge of assault and battery. Judge Bennett after hearing the counter statements of both parties gave Kreitz a suspended sentence and advised the couple to compromise their troubles.

BRIDE DECLINES TO ADMINISTER ESTATE

Mrs. Isabelle C. Marshall-Gibson, who married Robert Gibson less than two weeks after the suicide of her former husband, Arthur D. Marshall, at his Irvington home, has declined to act as administratrix of the estate of her late husband. Yesterday afternoon she filed in the county court her resignation, and upon her request her attorney, William S. Nash, was appointed in her stead.

Mrs. Marshall-Gibson had done practically nothing toward closing the estate of her late husband. Letters were issued to her on August 11, the day following the issuance of the license for her marriage to Gibson. No inventory of the property has been filed. Mar-

shall left no money, but he had about \$250 in personal property and owned the property at 725 Welder street, where he killed himself. This property is valued at \$6000, subject to an insurance of \$3000.

The property will be divided between Mrs. Marshall-Gibson and her two children, Ogden Eccles Marshall, 14 years of age, and Georgia Isabelle Marshall, a girl of 10.
