College President Visiting Portland.—Alexander Beers, president of Seattle University, is registered at the Imperial. He is here in the interests of the school which he heads and having lived in Oregon for a number of years, he has a large acquaintance here, many students attending the institution from Portland. He is desirous of meeting prospective students and can be found in the hotel this evening and tomorrow evening. Rev. B. F. Smalley, pastor of the First Free Methodist church, corner East Ninth and Mill streets, has secured Mr. Beers to preach for him next Sunday morning, he having just returned from a trip through Europe and to Edinburgh, Scotland, where he was a delegate to the World's Missionary congress. He will doubtless have things of special interest to say with reference to his trip, and the great religious gathering.

Clark Carrier Examination.—The United States civil service commission announces that the annual clerk carrier examination for the postoffice service in the city of Portland, Or., will be held November 5, 1910. As the commission has heretofore been unable to secure a sufficient number of male eligibles to meet the needs of the service, all qualified persons are urged to apply for and take the coming examination, the age limits for which are 18 to 45 years of age. Applicants should at once apply to E. A. Leigh, local secretary at Portland, Or., postoffice, or to the secretary of the Eleventh civil service district, postoffice building, Seattle, Wash., for application blanks and full information. Applications should be filed with the district secretary at Seattle prior to the hour of closing business on October 1, 1910.

Goodager Wants Witnesses.—Five witnesses from Astoria are wanted by Hans Goodager to testify in his defense when he faces a jury for the second time on September 20 on a charge of murder. Affidavit that these witnesses are needed has been made by his attorneys, Messrs. Fouts. Those wanted are Thomas Lindville, Albert Thompson, George Langley, E. M. Houghton and Andy Young. Goodager was once convicted and sentenced to 12 years for manslaughter, but the case was reversed and a new trial ordered.

Jorgensen Gets \$2750.—The Chapman Timber company has settled the case brought against it by Hans Jorgensen by the payment of \$2750. Jorgensen was awarded \$3500 damages by a jury on April 13, and by accepting the lesser amount he avoided the delay and uncertainties of appeal to the supreme court. He was injured in a logging camp near Scappoose in September, 1908, his leg being broken when he was caught between a trip line and a tree. His attorneys were Logan & Stevenson and L. N. Smith.

Use Too Much Street.—Acting Chief of Police Moore yesterday issued an order requiring an investigation of the conditions around buildings being constructed in and near the business section. Complaints have been received that the contractors were using more of the street than their permits allowed. Conditions at Seventh and Taylor, Eleventh and Stark and Tenth and Salmon streets were those criticized in particular. The use of 13 feet of the street is permitted in most instances and in the case of the larger buildings 16 feet.

Assault Charge Dismissed.—A charge of assault and battery which has been hanging over Cled Vaughn, son of a former councilman, for several weeks, was dismissed this morning by Municipal Judge Bennett. It was shown that C. E. Hickey, who had made the complaint, had provoked the assault by taking one of Vaughn's shoes from his foot while another held him. Later he tried to stop Vaughn when he started home in an automobile after a vain hunt for the shoe. Vaughn then struck him with his fist.

Funeral of Louis Zimmerman.—The funeral of Louis Zimmerman, who died yesterday morning at St. Vincent's hospital, will be held Saturday morning at 9 o'clock from St. Lawrence Catholic church. It is planned to have Archbishop Christie officiate if he can arrange to be present, and to be assisted

by Father Hughes of St. Lawrence church. The deceased was an influential citizen, and at one time was president of the city council. His illness extended over a period of one year.

Dr. Coe Is Sued.—Suit against Dr. Henry Waldo Coe for \$50 for electrical work was heard in Justice Olson's court this morning. The Skeen Electrical company being the plaintiff. It was said the work had been ordered by United States Marshal E. B. Colwell during Dr. Coe's absence and he was named as agent, but in court today he denied he was the physician's intermediary. Justice Olson permitted a non-suit to be entered so that the case could be heard again.

Charged With Cruelty to Animals.—Charged with cruelty to animals in permitting an injured horse to haul heavy loads, Walter S. Alderson, an ice dealer, was arraigned in municipal court today. Sergeant Crute humane officer, testified that Alderson had ignored his warning not to send the animal out of the barns. Alderson denied that the horse was seriously affected and the case was continued so he could bring the animal down and exhibit it to Judge Bennett.

Dog Poisoner Working.—The police and a private detective are searching for a dog poisoner in the vicinity of Whitman Station. The latest victim of the miscreant was "Queen," a thoroughbred bull terrier owned by John Barrett, a newspaper reporter, and valued at \$100. Patrolman J. G. Montgomery had the animal at his home temporarily. A few weeks ago three dogs owned by W. K. Stewart, a fancier, were poisoned.

Stocks Up Alley.—Complaint was made to the police yesterday that W. F. Perdue, a real estate dealer of Astoria, had moved his small office building into an alley and was blocking the lane. Patrolman M. E. Sims notified Perdue that he would have to move the building at once. Perdue said he was then negotiating for another site and would act promptly.

Mother Hunts Children.—Taking with him his two children, aged 5 and 4, Charles T. Clarke, a Salem painter, left here week ago and came to Portland. Mrs. Clarke followed, but she has been

unable to find them and yesterday she appealed to the police to assist her in the search. She has taken employment at 716 Washington street to support herself while she remains in the city.

Jury List Drawn.—One hundred names for jury duty at the September term of court were drawn yesterday afternoon by Presiding Judge Cleland and County Clerk Fields. The jurors will report on September 8, when the fall work of trying cases is resumed.

Slayer Waives Examination.—Aurilia M. Richardson, slayer of Freeman J. C. Hale, was arraigned in municipal court this morning and waived the preliminary hearing. He was bound over to the grand jury by Judge Bennett without bail.

Clear Has a Double.

The car has a double, and when the car is reported as walking about the streets of St. Petersburg unattended, it is his double who is doing this instead of the ruler of Russia. This is certainly something new. The car has never been notorious for leaving his attendants and walking alone about the streets of his capital. As a rule when he traverses half a dozen roads a small army of secret service agents and police go ahead of him and wait while he passes. And very likely at the last moment he won't go the way that had been planned—just in case any one has happened to hear of it! The car has not forgotten that he had not come to the throne before a Japanese fanatic attempted his life; near Sebastopol a mine was discovered under the railway over which he was to travel. At Moscow three years ago a happy incident brought to light 100 kilograms of dynamite stored beneath the apartments which the car had intended to occupy; while the jubilee of the naval cadets was made the occasion for another attempt, this time with a bomb. The most

incidental attempt of all was the sending to the car of a packet containing plague germs. With all these evidences of danger there is no wonder that he is a nervous man, or that he avoids all the risk he can. If there is one thing he

does not do it is to go out into the streets alone.
