

27 COWS FOUND TO BE TUBERCULAR; ORDERED KILLED

Dairyman Stands to Lose All But 10 Cows of His Herd as Result of Test Made by Dr. Mack.

In a herd of 27 cows on the Columbia slough tested this week by Dr. D. W. Mack, 27 were found to be suffering from tuberculosis and three marked suspicious. The 27 animals were ordered to be slaughtered and the milk stopped from the Portland market. Milk from this dairy has been coming to this city for the past four years.

In the destruction of the condemned animals, the dairyman is placed in a bad financial state, as it practically knocks him out of business. The dairyman will receive from \$10 to \$20 for his slaughtered animals. He has been working to get a good dairy for the past six years, and when told by Dr. Mack of the condition of his herd, said down on a milk stool and cried. His wife also watched the test with much interest and wept in sympathy with her husband. Such an affair further emphasizes the need of state provision for reimbursement of the dairyman in cases where his cattle are condemned.

Another dairyman on the Columbia slough with 150 milk cows has asked Dr. Mack to test his herd as soon as possible. He says he wants to find out which animals are suffering from tuberculosis and have them separated from the healthy animals. He further declares the test is the best thing for the dairyman and that he wants to have a good, clean and sturdy lot of cows.

Another herd of 96 tested by Dr. Mack this week showed 11 were in bad stages of tuberculosis and two were taking it. 11 animals were ordered slaughtered.

ASSEMBLY LEADERS DIVIDED BETWEEN CONNELL AND GEER

his campaign and make no great fight against the opposition.

Malakoff's campaigning ability is much feared, and it was contended by the assembly strategists, that if he were not to talk too much they might save something of the wreck.

Then Beach came into the game and spoiled it by getting Connell into the running, printing the "amended" ticket and giving it wide circulation. That blew things up, and now there is war.

Beach, they say, wants to steal Judge Cameron's job at the head of the state central committee. He wants to be the generalissimo of the campaign.

Judge George does not want to be shunted aside and his friends are of like mind. So there is resentment in the ranks, and bitter feelings and civil war.

Besides, there is a deep seated conviction in the minds of some of the more conscientious of the convention boosters, that they are on an illegal track, that they have no right under the law, not even a shadow of legality, in putting a new man in the field to take Clarke's place.

Opinions Differ.

These people argue that the only way to fix things up with a show of righteousness would be to call together the delegates to the state convention from Multnomah, Clackamas and Columbia counties. That action might give their candidate some show of being on the ticket in a quasi regular way, they argue. Others, more bold, say that the assembly is about as legitimate as a convention anyway, and that the old system allowed the state central committee to fill vacancies on the ticket. They want the state central committee to pick a man for the place. Then there is the other bunch of strategists who would leave the hole in the ticket in order to lull Malakoff into comparative inactivity.

When these three different bunches of opinion come together tonight, there will be trouble. There was last Tuesday when the "leaders" met in solemn convocation over the discovery that Beach had slipped one over on them and Connell had filed his declaration. At that time part of the gathering insisted that Connell would add any strength to the ticket, and that, anyway, his irregular method of coming into the fold would give the opposition a club with which to beat the whole bunch into line. The disposition was so warm that Joe Beveridge, of the strong adherents of Beach, went home, leaving the ship to whatever hands would guide it.

Tonight, it is expected, that still more heat will be shown. Invitations have been sent out to the "managing committees" of Clackamas, Columbia and Multnomah counties to gather for the purpose of settling the question and picking a man. It is not believed, even by the leaders, that there will be a big attendance outside of Multnomah county.

T. T. Geer, who has run for office before in different parts of the state, is the man who has been picked by the George faction for Clarke's successor on the ticket. Mr. Geer, if he can be persuaded, will be nominated, if any one is, the George faction says, while Connell will be ignored or heaved out of the camp. It is liable to be very interesting. Incidentally, the meeting tonight is not open to the public.

MALICIOUS SETTLERS BELIEVED TO HAVE SET CRATER FOREST FIRES

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Medford, Or., Aug. 20.—That the present forest fires raging in the Crater national forest were set by some disgruntled homesteader in an effort to even up scores with the rangers who reported upon his homestead last fall is the belief of the forestry officials here. It has also developed that the government now has three secret service men in the vicinity of the big fires endeavoring to apprehend the guilty party or parties.

During the past year a number of homesteaders found, when they came to prove up, that adverse reports had been made regarding their holdings. The investigation had been made, for the most part, by rangers, and this is said to be responsible for the forest fires.

A representative of the United Press traveled 20 miles Friday by automobile, horseback and on foot through the burning area. Unmistakable evidences were found that fires were set. In many instances they failed to grow into large fires, so vigilant are the men fighting the flames.

The first troops arrived in Butte Falls, which is at the extreme northwest of the blazing forests, and early today left for the front. At Butte Falls they were met by rangers who directed their movements.

Supervisor Erickson has 75 additional men battling with the flames on the slopes of Mount McLaughlin, whence Medford derives its water supply. Here is found one of the fiercest and most dangerous of the sugar pine in the west and it is fast being consumed.

The damage done so far is estimated by Supervisor Erickson to exceed \$1,000,000, and the fate of Medford's water supply is in doubt. This is being seriously impaired it will mean a great loss as the city has just completed a gravity system at a cost of \$500,000.

Supervisor Erickson stated Friday to the United Press representative who found him directing the fight, that unless rain came soon there was small hope of an early control of the flames. Additional fires are continually starting.

No lives have been lost, owing to the fact that the fires are mostly in the reserve, where there are no settlers. Over 30 square miles have been burned over.

FLUMES THAT SUPPLY 2 CALIFORNIA TOWNS THREATENED BY FIRES

Grass Valley, Cal., Aug. 20.—Despite frantic efforts by a large corps of fire fighters, it is feared that before night the flumes of the South Yuba River Water company, supplying Grass Valley and Nevada City, will be destroyed. Residents of the two towns are filling improvised cisterns with water in anticipation of possible water famine.

Forest Supervisor Bigelow, of the Tahoe national forest, has issued a call for volunteers from among the several thousand miners who operate the quartz workings in this county. Two hundred have responded and before the day is over it is believed that fully 500 fire fighters will be in the Quaker Hill and Hunt districts.

The mining camps of Yount and Town Talk are in danger from sparks carried by the chief conflagration. The burned region covers more than 2,000 acres.

HOTEL AT GREEN RIVER HOT SPRINGS BURNED; FOREST FIRE INCIDENT

Green River Hot Springs, Wash., Aug. 20.—The Green River Hot Springs hotel and surrounding buildings were destroyed last night by a fire that started from a burning brand from a forest fire that raged all day yesterday. The hotel had been closed for repairs, and only a few guests who had arrived in the past few days were in the building. No one was injured.

The loss is a severe blow to the owners, who bought the property last Tuesday. The Pacific National bank and F. S. Harmon of Tacoma at that time formally transferred it to a stock company consisting of E. W. Dooley, W. H. Patterson, C. O. Talbot and C. B. Hunt of North Yakima and W. A. Lemke of Bremerton.

The new company paid \$140,000 for the property and had planned to spend \$15,000 in repairs.

His wife, W. A. Elledge, sister and two other persons were in the hotel when the fire broke out.

When the autoists reached the fire zone the men were immediately impressed as fire fighters and are struggling valiantly with the others to stop the onslaught of the flames. For one day Mr. Jennings was unable to do much work because of a weakened knee, but he is again working with the fire fighters.

The women of the party have entered into the work with equal zeal to that of the men. They have established a camp and are doing their cooking over an open fire. The automobile is being used to carry water and supplies to the fire fighters, and is doing invaluable service.

Mr. Jennings and other members of the party say they will not leave until they can no longer be of service.

RAIN ONLY HOPE OF EXTINGUISHING FIRES RAGING IN MONTANA

Missoula, Mont., Aug. 20.—The forest fire situation is becoming more desperate every day that the hot weather prevails, and it is felt here that there is no hope of extinguishing the different fires until rain falls. Ten companies of soldiers are urgently requested by the local forestry office and but two are available. A wire from Brigadier General Howe at Camp Stanley, Wyo., today notified local officials that he had two companies which are available for immediate use. One will be sent to Coram on the Great Northern and the other will go to Kalispell.

A company of colored troops from Fort George Wright will probably reach Borax today.

A pack train of 30 horses was received from Camp Stanley yesterday and they left last evening over the Puget Sound road accompanied by men. Twenty of the horses will be sent to Iron Mountain and the remainder to Avery.

The fire at Stetson, on the Puget Sound line, is reported to be in bad shape. The railroad company has 50 to 60 men there and a company of soldiers also is stationed at that point. Fifteen companies of soldiers are now fighting fire in western Montana.

The fire in the Lolo forest is raging with a fury extending more than six miles in width in a section of country heavily timbered with some of the best timber in Montana and it is difficult of access. The big fire at Borax is also spreading rapidly.

A dispatch from Plains, Mont., says the sun has seemed like a ball of fire today owing to dense smoke, which is the worst thus far this summer, and it is impossible to see 2000 yards distant. The fire nearest Plains yesterday was on Swamp Creek, seven miles distant, where Forest Ranger Scarlett had a big crew battling with the flames.

MT. PITT FIRES DYING

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 20.—The fires in the Mount Pitt region are reported dying down because of the subsidence of a high wind that had been blowing for several days. Rangers say they have hopes of smothering the flames soon. The belt of fire there is reported 18 miles long and six miles wide.

In the Clover creek region 30,000,000 feet of timber has been destroyed. Many more men are needed to fight the fires, and assistance has been asked from Portland and San Francisco.

Great Fire Near Nevada City, Cal.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Nevada City, Cal., Aug. 20.—A great forest fire which has been burning for several days is still raging fiercely several miles east of here. Hundreds of men are fighting the flames. Forest Supervisor Bigelow said today that he would wire for troops tonight if the fire was not then subdued. Several square miles of valuable timber have been destroyed, and the loss will reach a high total.

Marks on the partition of the third floor are on the inside, indicating plainly that the boards were pried off from within the store.

Tuesday night the rectory of St. David's church, corner of East Twelfth and East Morrison streets, was entered by thieves and jewelry valued at several hundred dollars stolen from Rev. H. R. Talbot and his wife, Mrs. and Mrs. Talbot, who were recently married, were away from home at the time.

DR. CRIPPEN ON SHIP FOR LONDON

With Him Ethel Claire Leneve, Alleged Accomplice, and Inspector Dew.

Quebec, Aug. 20.—The liner Megantic, carrying Dr. H. H. Crippen, Ethel Claire Leneve and Inspector Dew of Scotland Yard and his force, is headed today for London. The prisoners, returning to London to face trial in connection with the death of Belle Elmore Crippen, wife of Dr. Crippen, were taken from their prison in parliament house at 8:10 a. m. and rushed to Silery, where they were put aboard the Megantic.

The liner left Montreal at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon and awaited the prisoners at Silery.

Miss Leneve on her arrival in England will be imprisoned in Holloway Jail. She will be greeted in England by her relatives, who will be allowed to see her a short time.

GIRL DIES AS RESULT OF FALL

Nettie Curtiss Succumbs to Internal Injuries Received a Week Ago.

Boston, Aug. 20.—Nearly 10,000,000 spindles in the cotton mills of Massachusetts and the southern states will be idle during the first 16 days of September, according to notices posted in the big mills today. More than 50,000 operatives in New England alone will be affected by the shutdown, and many more in the south. The purpose of the cessation of work is to give the operatives a rest and to clean and repair the machinery.

The condition of Nettie Curtiss, who fell from the fourth floor balcony of the Buell apartments, Twelfth and Salmon streets, last Saturday morning, unexpectedly took a serious turn at St. Vincent's last night and the girl died at an early hour this morning. 5000 MOURNERS HONOR DEAD NURSE

Royalty Is Present at Funeral of Florence Nightingale—Interment at Westwell.

London, Aug. 20.—Five thousand mourners assembled in St. Paul's cathedral today to attend the memorial service in honor of Florence Nightingale. Representatives of the king and queen, members of the cabinet and leaders of the diplomatic corps of foreign nations, including Ambassador Whitelaw Reid of the United States, were present.

The dignified and impressive funeral service was held this afternoon at Westwell, where interment took place, relatives and close friends of Miss Nightingale attending.

ENGLAND GUARDS AGAINST CHOLERA

Examines All Arrivals From Continent; Situation in Russia Not Half Stated.

London, Aug. 20.—Port authorities of the United Kingdom were today ordered to examine all arrivals from the continent to prevent the introduction into England of cholera. Reports from Russia indicate that conditions there are far worse than the Russian officials will permit to be published. English health officers say that estimates of 112,000 cases and 50,000 deaths are not half the total actually existing in the czar's domain.

A report that cholera has gained a foothold in Rome was officially denied today.

IDAHO'S GOVERNOR BARS FIGHT FILMS

Picture Showman Threatens Invasion of North Idaho—Brady Says Nay.

Boise, Idaho, Aug. 20.—Idaho has been added to the anti-fight picture states that have made the owners of the Jeffries-Johnson films fume and fret at the moral wave sweeping the country. Governor J. H. Brady has announced that the moving reproduction of the Reno fight would not be tolerated within the bounds of the state.

Governor Brady's action was brought about by the rumor that the pictures were about to be shown in some of the Coeur d'Alene mining camps. He promptly put the crusher on the hopes of the promoters by issuing an open letter defining his position as against the films.

COLORED MEN READY TO BACK ROOSEVELT

New York, Aug. 20.—Colonel Roosevelt today has the support of most of the negro electorate of the United States, both for a possible third term and for endorsement of his policies, as a result of the action of the 1100 delegates of the National Negro Business Men's league, in convention in New York. The support of the negroes was pledged after Colonel Roosevelt had spoken to the convention yesterday, on the opportunities for advancement open to the colored race in the United States.

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
