FAST HORSES IN
BIG RACE EVENTSTrainers of National Reputation
Are Bringing Well-
Known Stables to City.

Within a week there will be congregated at the Country Club race track in preparation for the September races, the greatest collection of high class harness racers ever seen west of the Mississippi. Horses are arriving daily and requests for stall reservations come in with each mail. The track is in excellent condition and is pronounced by horsemen from other states to be the fastest as well as the safest they have worked over this year. In this event some new records no doubt will be hung up.

Among those having arrived in the past few days with their horses to be ready for the opening of the races, Sept. 4, are several trainers of national reputation.

There is F. E. Ward, of Los Angeles, who has the great trotters Zomboni, 2:11 1/4; Paul W., 2:14 1/4; Escabado, 2:13 1/4; Dr. Weall, a green trotter who has a world of speed and is ready for the races, and Pegasus, a green trotter of great promise. Mr. Ward also has Conqueror, a good pacer with a record of 2:10 1/4, who won his race in the recent San Jose meeting, and had to step right to his record; also Amado, pacer, record 2:18, who worked a mile last week in 2:07 and is the great good thing in Mr. Ward's stable.

Also from California is J. C. Culicello, with a good stable belonging to A. L. Scott, of the Pacific Hardware & Steel company, including Lady Lane, 2:13 1/4, trotting; Mamie Alwin, three-year-old trotter, and Prof. Heald, a trotter who will take a lot of beating just now.

Durfee Has Stable.
C. A. Durfee, of San Jose, is on the grounds with Happy Dentist, who was second in San Jose in an evening finish in 2:07 1/4, and is not to be second on his next start at Portland; Dr. Lecco, who won in California in 2:12, and Helen Styles, who also won at San Jose, taking a mark of 2:10 1/4, are also in Mr. Durfee's string. No doubt these good ones will annex some of the money at Portland.

Walter Mahen, of Los Angeles, has on the grounds Zomali, Walter Barker, Judge Dillon, and the handsome sorrel male Chiquita, who won at San Jose in the fast time of 2:09 1/4. Chiquita is entered in the \$5,000 racing stake at Portland and beyond a doubt will give an excellent account of herself.

Veteran Dick Wilson Here.

Then there is the veteran Dick Wilson, the great Hoosier trainer, well known in Portland. Upward of thirty head of highest class speedsters are in Mr. Wilson's stable. These horses are in the very pink of condition, showing the consistent management in handling for which this eminent trainer is famous. Mr. Wilson is ready to go to the races any day now.

Al. Russell, of Minot, N. D., is on hand with Allerday, pacer, 2:09 1/4; Don Demore, pacer, 2:14 1/4; Franconia, pacer, 2:14 1/4; and Demore, trotter, 2:17 1/4. These horses are owned by D. A. Denny, of North Dakota, and are ready, waiting for the bell.

Son of McKinney Here.

Charles Jeffries comes from Great Falls, Mont., with Alfreda B., pacer, 2:14 1/4, and Buck, the buckskin son of the great McKinney. Buck is a green one, but has reservoirs of speed on tap and is ready for the word.

The F. E. Alley stable, of Roseburg, Or., includes Sonoma Boy, full brother to the illustrious Sonoma Girl; Bon-day, by Bon Voyage, Nevada, Roseburg Boy, a great two-year-old, and two high two-year-old fillies by Zoloch, all three entered in the Futurity.

GARRETT'S WING
FOOLS COMMUTERSOrt and Speas Hit Ball Hard
and Portland Retains
First Place.

Jess Garrett, the matinee idol, bolstered up in a critical moment by Lean Vean Gregg, trimmed the Oaks right merrily yesterday, 3 to 2 being aided by the generous hitting of Billy Speas and George Ort, who drove in the trio of tallies. It was ladies' day and the girls simply went into paroxysms of joy when the Beavers took command of the score column and held the Commuters safely.

There were all kinds of good plays, some of them of the most spectacular variety. It didn't make much difference whether a Portland or an Oakland player or was responsible for an unusual feat, the girls applauded, just the same.

Taylor, the X-tian, started to pitch for the Oaks, but was retired after he had walked a man in the third inning in favor of Moser. Christian had been going well though, but Wolverton decided that he had better be benched. With a couple of balls and a strike on Ort, Wolverton decided on a change, but McGreevy refused to allow him to go through with the plan until he had finished pitching to Ort.

Well, Ort walked and that gave us the first sign that Moser was liable to be wallpopped. Garrett laid down a neat bunt and Olson struck out. Then Wolverton made a hit with the ladies. Rapps slammed one at third base at right ball speed. Wolverton dived for it, caught it just off the ground while lying prostrate, and then crawled on his hands and knees to third base to double out Ort.

In the next frame Hogan started with a single and Cameron sacrificed. Then Wolverton clouted into right field. Ort tried to head Hogan, but Fisher did not get the ball in time. Gus shot it to Olson to head Wolverton who was caught 'tween bags. Cuthaw doubled to right for the third hit, but died at second when Sheehan swung Swander out.

Fisher Starts Swifter.

Fisher started Portland's half of the inning by clouting to left. The speed merchant pliffed second. Casey's fly was gathered in by Maggart, but Gus took third on Sheehan's out. Here Speas batted into the matinee and whanged out a single that scored Gus and tied up the thing. Speas stole second amid the little shrieks of the ladies, and when Chawls Ort smashed a double to the right field territory Billy raced home.

Portland took a still stronger lead in the sixth. After Casey and Sheehan had been retired, Speas caught the Oaks flatfooted and beat out a pretty bunt. Then Ort's colors flashed to the fore again and his single scored Speas from second.

Oakland was presented with a run in the seventh. With two out, Fisher let a fourth ball roll to the grandstand and when he was slow in fielding it, Swander went right on to second. Then Thomas hit one to Rapps, that covered the bases and had Garrett covered the plate in time, but he dropped Rapps' throw and Swander was home.

Keep Men Warm Up.

All during the game Manager Mao had Seaton, Steen or Gregg warming up. In the ninth, after Cameron singled, McCredle took no chances and benched Garrett, sending Lefty Gregg, the jinx of the Oaks to the mound. Carroll had previously been put in to run for Cameron. Gregg fanned Wolverton and then Cuthaw to hit into a double. He threw Cuthaw out at first and when Carroll tried to take third on the play, Rapps winged the ball across the diamond to Sheehan's waiting paw.
