

URGES PEOPLE TO ELECT DIMICK BEAT BOWERMAN

Judge Lowell Says This Best Way to Defeat Machine Candidate for Governor; Oregon Insurgent State.

"It is not alone a question of assembly and anti-assembly, it is a question of progression against retrogression. It is a question of whether the new order of things shall continue or the state shall go back to the old. I believe that the people of Oregon want to remain in the new era."

This is the way Judge Stephen A. Lowell views the political situation in the state at the present time.

"In my belief the anti-assembly forces should concentrate on Grant B. Dimick for governor and put him in nomination," continued Judge Lowell. "In my belief it is necessary for the retention of the new order of things political in Oregon to beat Jay Bowerman for the Republican nomination for governor. It is not a question of men, it is a question of principle. Jay Bowerman is a personal friend of mine. I admire the man, but if he were to be put in the governor's chair he would have a machine built before the end of his term that would put the old machine clear in the shade."

Bowerman Machine Men.
"Bowerman was raised in Marion county. He plays the game as he was taught to play it in Marion county in the old days. He is a machine man, and to elect him would be to fasten the assembly on the state for a generation to come. It is necessary to beat him. Therefore, I say that the issue here goes beyond the question of assembly or anti-assembly. It is a question of the insurgent against the regular, the new against the old. The assembly is trying to take us back to the old system. Those opposed to it are fighting that effort."

"Out over the state the sentiment is strongly against the assembly, and I have been in close touch with different sections. The people of the state generally do not want to retrograde. They want to advance."

Concentration Only Hope.
"But the Bowerman strength is a certain and definite strength. It is lined up and will stay that way until the votes have been cast. To defeat this strength it will be necessary to concentration. A split vote means the nomination of Bowerman, and for that reason, believing Mr. Dimick to be the strongest of the candidates in the field against Bowerman, I urge that a concentrated effort be made to nominate him."

Dimick as a safe man they look on as a safe governor. He is stronger than the other candidates. I have been urged to become a candidate for the nomination for governor. But I do not intend to get into the race. I believe it would further split the vote and make the nomination of Bowerman just that more certain. Ben Selling has been urged to run, but his business affairs will not allow it, as I understand Judge Bowerman has also been urged, but I understand that he is stronger than to come a candidate. But I believe that the surest way at this late date, is to join hands in helping one candidate, and that is what I intend to do, I trust, with success."

Judge Lowell will leave this evening for his home in Pendleton.

BANDIT KILLS CAPTAIN OF BUCKMAN; LEAPS INTO SEA

San Francisco, Aug. 22.—Responding to a wireless from the Alaska Pacific steamer Buckman, an ambulance and a corps of attendants from the emergency hospital is waiting at the dock to rush the unidentified accomplice of "Fred Thomas" to the hospital.

Unsuccessful in this attempt, with Thomas, to seize the steamer Buckman at the point of their guns and to launch her, the man was overpowered by the crew of the engine room and badly beaten.

The Buckman was coming through the Golden Gate at 12:30. She was met by a police tug, on which were officers waiting to transfer the would-be pirate from ship's irons to manacles. The Buckman, conveyed by the tug, was headed into the quarantine station at Angel Island.

Thomas' partner in freebooting, after his wounds had been dressed at the hospital, will be taken to the central police station. There he will be subjected to a "third degree" examination. After the legal police have heard his story of the attempted holdup that resulted in the slaying of Captain E. B. Wood by Fred Thomas, who then leaped overboard, the confederate will be turned over to the federal authorities. A charge of piracy under the federal statutes will then be lodged against him. If convicted the prisoner will be subject to the death penalty.

Eureka, Cal., Aug. 22.—A "harp look-out" is being kept the coast for "Fred Thomas," who shot and killed Captain E. B. Wood of the steamer Buckman while the vessel was off Eureka, and then leaped into the sea. The body had not come ashore up to 1 o'clock this afternoon.

BOY STATE TRIP PLEASES CHAPMAN

Commercial Club Manager Returns From Valley Tour Favorably Impressed.

C. C. Chapman, manager of the Portland Commercial club, returned this morning from a very interesting tour of the state from Eugene and Springfield to Ashland, the purpose of which was chiefly to ascertain what various communities have to offer settlers with \$1000 capital to invest and what classes of people are especially needed in the different localities.

Mr. Chapman says he returned with a great deal of information which will be very valuable in answering inquiries from the eastern and middle states, many prospective settlers wishing to know to a certainty which sections might be most appealing.

There is plenty of room for settlers in the Willamette valley, the Rogue and Umpqua valleys, but as a rule the farmers have been opposed to selling in small tracts within reach of the man of limited means. I made this subject the main issue of my conferences with farmers in many places, and I was exceedingly pleased with the change of attitude after the matter had been discussed. It seemed that these large landholders thought it not worth while to talk sales except on a big scale and for cash. Of course, they came here in pioneer days, went through the mill and all the hardships, and certainly are entitled to every consideration, but the days of the small farms are upon us, and to invite settlers and a more intense development of the country and the cities, small tracts must be placed within reach of the man of moderate means.

"I dwell particularly on this subject in my talks and endeavor to show how the farmer can dispose of his land in small tracts on terms and draw his interest as well as some one to come along and buy the whole farm and cut it up. Each transaction of this character increases the price of the land and places it further beyond the reach of the man who would buy and build for himself a home."

Crop Situation Favorable.
Mr. Chapman says that while the weather has been very dry, crops of every description are exceptionally fine and will bring great prices in the country this year. The only complaint farmers have had this year has been because of the thick dust. Fruit never looked better.

"One fact that impressed me very much," Mr. Chapman explained, "was that corn is being grown with excellent results between the trees in two and three-year-old orchards. This year they are allowing the corn to ear and it will produce from 75 to 100 bushels an acre, but in smaller seasons the corn will be cut for fodder for which there is a big demand."

"The Rogue River valley is going heavy for pears and in the Ashland country peaches of the very finest quality are being raised. Particular pains are being taken in packing and the result is a remarkable output of fruit."

"At Springfield I visited the asparagus farm of G. A. Dorris and it certainly is wonderful. Mr. Dorris was a lawyer who thought he would enjoy a life of farming. He has a quantity of land for pasture, but he soon found it worth all his undivided attention. Today he is making big money off a 26 acre field of asparagus, the product being finer than any I have ever seen produced in California. Dorris operates a cannery on the farm and gets the product ready for the market right at home. He explained to me that no fertilizers are necessary and that there are thousands of acres available that would produce equally remarkable results."

Tonight Mr. Chapman will leave for the upper Columbia river country to talk cooperation between the cities and the country.

**PARENTS SENT TO JAIL;
NO CARE FOR CHILDREN**

A deputy sheriff from Seattle arrived today to take charge of P. J. Gren, alias Peter Larson, wanted in the northern city on a grand larceny charge. The prisoner was arrested Saturday night by the sheriff at Deputy Sheriff Beatty's home on East Oak street.

Mrs. Gren went to Seattle a few days ago to wind up a deal on some furniture and was arrested and sent to jail on the same charge. They are alleged to have illegally disposed of a quantity of furniture. Their three children, 14, 11 and 7 years of age, were with their father, and no one is left to care for them if he is returned to Seattle without them.

Gren claims to be able to raise some funds and if he is able to do so the three children will go with their father to Seattle, where Gren expects to be able to care for them by securing the release of himself or wife on bail.

DISSOLUTE MEN MUST LEAVE CITY POLICE ORDER SAYS

"Moral Squad" Gets Detail to Drive Undesirables to Other Fields, and Eight Arrests Are Made.

Orders issued by Acting Chief of Police Moore, instructing the captains of police to "clean the city" were followed yesterday by the arrest of five alleged dissolute men and three women. The officers have been detailed to a new "moral squad" with instructions to rigidly enforce the order.

"Instruct the officers of your commands," reads Moore's order to the captains, "to give better attention to their beats to idle and dissolute persons. Reports have reached this office that a number of them and their women friends have recently returned to the city. I see that they are quite noticeable on the streets and around certain resorts of this city. Instruct the officers to be on the alert for this class of people and, when found, arrest and bring them before the court to be dealt with according to their deserts. There is no class more dangerous and despicable in a community than these people. The patrolmen and sergeants of each relief are especially charged with the enforcement of this order, and I expect to see it strictly complied with."

Order Comes Suddenly.
The issuance of a "police" order during the absence of Chief of Police Cox occasioned considerable surprise around police headquarters, and it was inferred that it came from "higher up" officials. Officers at once started out to enforce it, and shortly afterward George R. Kawan, an attorney and proprietor of the Empress hotel, Sixth and Stark streets, and Charles Johnson, who says she is his housekeeper, were arrested by Plain Clothesmen Montgomery. They are held on a charge of vagrancy and will be given a hearing in municipal court tomorrow.

Henry Gabi, August Digson and Alex Alexander, Frenchmen who have been frequenters of a resort near Fourth and Everett streets, were also placed under arrest and charged with vagrancy. Digson was tried before Municipal Judge Bennett, with Albert E. Gebhardt, a law partner of Judge Bennett, defending him. He was convicted and ordered to leave the city. The cases against Gabi and Alexander went over until tomorrow.

Reports of Robberies.
Following a report from Tom Bernhart that he had been robbed in a resort at Second and Flanders street, Annie Smith and May Olsen, two of the inmates, were placed under arrest. Bernhart was held as a witness and an intoxication charge placed against him. The cases of all were continued in municipal court today.

Information has reached the police department that 24 women of foreign nationality have been brought into resorts in the city. A large number of men who prey on the earnings of women are also said to be loitering around the resorts. Reports of robberies committed in resorts are also said to have influenced the order to turn the police lights on the dark places.

**DECLARE THEY DID
NOT KILL JOHNSON**

Man and Woman to Plead Not Guilty in Trunk Mystery.

Tests Show That 90 Cows on Sauvie's Island Are Free of Disease.

Two Large Dairy Herds, Absolutely Free from Tuberculosis, Were Found on Sauvie's Island. One herd belongs to W. H. H. Morgan and the other to Goodwin & Reader. Dr. Herbert Silverwood, one of the veterinarians testing all herds supplying milk to Portland, today announced that the two herds in good condition.

The two herds contained 90 cattle. It is a rare occasion to find such large herds without some diseased cattle. There have been herds entirely wiped out by the test, as all animals found suffering from the dreaded disease have been ordered slaughtered. Many dairymen have not been observing this restriction, but the state authorities plan a surprise upon those failing to carry out the law.

**BOYS AND GIRLS
ENJOY SWIMMING**

The attendance record the past three days at the municipal swimming pool at Bellwood Park shows that 922 persons have taken a plunge in the new pool. The tank was opened Thursday afternoon. On that day 150 boys used it. The next day 170 girls were swimming, while Saturday was boys' day again, and 235 spent an hour in the pool. Sunday, 334 was the record.

The pool is open from 11 until 12:30 in the forenoon, and from 1:30 until 7:30 in the afternoon. It is absolutely free, except Wednesday and Thursday. Towels, bathing suits and lockers are furnished. Boys and girls from all over the city are going there for an afternoon swim.

STANDPATISM ON DECLINE IN STATE OF KANSAS

Chief Justice of Supreme Court Says Commonwealth Hotbed of Insurgency; Cannon Loses Strength.

Standpatism on the decline and progressiveness dominant in the manner in which William A. Johnston, chief justice of the supreme court of the state of Kansas, and for 26 years a member of that body, today characterized the situation in his home community, Judge and Mrs. Johnston arrived in Portland last night, meeting Justice Henry F. Mason, of Kansas, whose wife, formerly Miss Lucy S. Greene, lived in Portland. Judge and Mrs. Johnston are the guests of Martha J. Patton and her son, W. J. Patton, at their home in the Patton road, Council Crest. They will stay in Portland a week or more.

"Insurgency in Kansas," explained Justice Johnston, "does not mean that a certain faction is breaking away from the Republican party, but that it is a spirit of progressiveness rising. The Republican party in Kansas is as strong as ever, but Kansas people are progressive—so progressive, in fact, that they do not mind calling themselves insurgents. Have they repudiated President Taft? No, they have not. They are merely expecting him to 'make good' the promises of the party. I have not heard a word derogatory to President Taft, and the people seem to believe in him. They are expecting him to 'make good'."

"Cannonism is no longer popular in Kansas. The recent election showed that fact. Out of the eight congressional districts in the state, six elected insurgents. And many of them were rank insurgents. I believe Cannon's stand and speeches defeated one or more visit and speeches defeated one or more standpat candidates. The Kansas people resented his intimation they were breaking away from the Republican party. They are not."

"Some idea of the strength of the insurgent candidates may be gained from the race made by Madison and Victor Murdock in their different districts. So strong a hold did progressiveness have on the people that no candidates dared face these two, and they ran and were nominated without contest."

Explaining that the judiciary in Kansas is practically nonpolitical, Justice Johnston veered from the subject of politics. He has served as a supreme justice for 26 years continuously, and has worked with all sorts of administrations.

"I believe the direct primary has proved a great success in Kansas," he said. "We have tried it for the second time, and everyone—that is to say, the insurgents and those who want popular rule—are pleased with its operation. The commission form of government is working well in practically all the larger cities of Kansas and is popular."

Justice Johnston, intimated that the people of Kansas demand correct reform of the tariff and that the Republican party carry out promises made in its national platform.

"The people believe President Taft is willing to carry out party promises," he averred, "but that he has been unfortunate in the selections of his advisers. They do not seem to be called progressive, but are willing to be called themselves to be known as insurgents."

Kansas' progress was the subject of many remarks. Justice Johnston told of the industrial advancement of the state and of its wealth. He said the financial depression was not felt, and that now while other states seem to suffer slightly from lack of money, Kansas notes no difference in the situation. Justice and Mrs. Johnston will tour over the coast.

It is on my first trip west," said the jurist. "Seattle and Tacoma are magnificent, but after seeing Portland from Council Crest, I may safely say I like it best of all."

**NO TUBERCULOSIS
IN TWO BIG HERDS**

Special Trains Will Bring 300 Prominent Men for Two Day Stay.

Fully 300 of America's most prominent veterinarians will be in Portland Sunday, September 4. They have arranged to stop here from Saturday morning until Sunday evening and possibly Monday morning. The party will be in special trains, and en route to the forty-seventh annual meeting of the American Veterinary Medical association which convenes at San Francisco. The session begins September 6 and closes four days later.

The chief topic to be discussed by the association this year will be tuberculosis in cattle. Two days will be given to this subject, as the veterinarians consider this the biggest problem before them. Dr. J. G. Rutherford, a veterinary general of Canada, and who was recently given an honor degree by the king of England for his work along the line of bovine tuberculosis, will be present, and give an address. Dr. J. R. Mohler and Dr. C. Schroeder, connected with the bureau of animal industry at Washington, D. C., will be two more speakers in the profession. Dr. V. A. Moore, well known for his experiments with tuberculous cattle, of Ithaca, N. Y., will explain the methods used to control the disease. Dr. S. H. Gilliland, of Ohio, will read a paper upon "Artificial Inoculation of Cattle Against Tuberculosis."

The international commission that has been studying the question from a world-wide standpoint, will make a report on the methods of control of bovine tuberculosis. This report will be of great interest and importance. Many other men of authority and leaders in the profession are on the program.

Among the veterinarians of Portland will be John H. Wright and H. Silverwood.

CUT WEEDS OR BIG POLICE FINE WILL ARREST YOU

City Attorney Requests Police to Turn in Names of Those Who Disregard Ordinance; Fines to Follow.

No longer time will be given Portland property owners in Portland who allow unsightly weed patches on their land and adjoining sidewalks. Complaints will be made immediately by the whole-sale, and arrests follow. City Attorney Grant today wrote the chief of police, instructing him to secure the names of all people who are allowing this obnoxious weeds on their property.

Hoping Chief Moore this afternoon gave an order to the patrolmen to turn in the name of all persons who are disregarding the weed ordinance. In the case of nonresidents, the city will have the weeds cut and the cost assessed against the property. Where an arrest is made, the city attorney will insist upon a fine, as he says people know weeds should be cut, and if they have neglected a fine will help them to remember it.

In view of the deplorable condition, City Attorney Grant made an investigation in different parts of the city, and found flagrant violations of the weed ordinance. He took the matter up with Mayor Simon. The two officials considered the best way to handle the question is immediately to issue complaints. To secure the names of the property owners the police are notified to give this their special attention.

The ordinance specifies that vacant lots shall be cleared of weeds and grass twice each year. For the past several weeks Chinese and Canadian thistles have grown in every nook and corner. The Chinese lettuce spreads rapidly and is considered one of the most dangerous vegetable pests in existence. Policemen in the residence districts have failed to note this condition until recently. Chief of Police Cox has been out of the city for two weeks, but nothing had been done previously by him, however, to enforce the weed ordinance. Last week Captain Moore, who is acting chief, issued orders to have the weeds cut.

Patrolman J. J. Murphy, one of the most aggressive officers in the department, was the first one to make a report on the condition. Last night he reported to Captain George H. Bailey that drug and weed on a lot at East Twelfth and Washington streets were a menace to that neighborhood because of the possibility of fire. Patrolman Murphy declares he notified Buchtel & Kerna, agents for the property, three days ago, to have the weeds cut, but his order has not been carried out. Acting Chief Moore asked the patrolman to again notify the agents, and if the weeds were not cut immediately to have them arrested.

The communication from the city attorney may cancel the second notification of the agents, and a warrant may be issued tomorrow morning.

City Attorney Grant is of the opinion that if the ordinance means anything it should be rigidly enforced. He has instructed Attorney Sullivan, prosecutor at the municipal court, to show no leniency to those arrested.

**VETERANIANS TO
STOP IN PORTLAND**

MAN IS SHOT AND
KILLED AT ACME, OR.

Eugene, Or., Aug. 22.—A telephone report from Acme at the mouth of the Siuslaw river on the Lane county coast states that John Johnson shot and killed E. S. Prindle near here last night at 10 o'clock. There are absolutely no shots yet on account of poor telephone service. Sheriff Bowen, Deputy District Attorney Skipworth and Coroner Gordon left in an automobile this afternoon for the scene of the killing.

**SHOPLIFTER GETS
YEAR IN PRISON**

One year in the county jail was the punishment given to W. H. Bonney, alias Fraley, a shoplifter, by Municipal Judge Bennett today. Fraley was arrested a few days ago by Detectives Hellyer and Maione, and a large amount of stolen merchandise found on him. Last night a search of his room was made, and enough goods to start a small store were found. Nearly a dozen stores have been robbed by Fraley in Portland at various times during the last month. He confessed to the offense and pleaded guilty in municipal court. The prisoner is 32 years old.

Mrs. Elizabeth V. Phillips Neglects Husband in Disposing of Her \$2500 Estate.

Mrs. Elizabeth V. Phillips, who died on August 5, was determined her husband, Charles J. Phillips, from whom she was separated, should gain no benefit from her estate, as was shown by the filing of the will for probate today. She gives most of her property to her youngest daughter, Alice Mary Phillips, and provides that if her father ever secures possession of them or of either, they shall receive only \$5 each. Five dollar bequests are made to each of the other children, Ida Belle Phillips of The Dalles, Anna Lee Phillips, Agnes Gertrude Phillips, Erna Amelia Phillips of Portland and Oscar M. Phillips of Mosier. Forty shares of Poulson Wireless Telegraph & Telephone stock is given to Effie J. Phillips. The total value of the property is about \$2500.

After payment of the specific bequests, the remainder is given to E. U. Phillips to be held in trust for the two younger daughters, 13 and 9 years of age, provided their father does not gain their custody. If he does, the property goes to E. U. Phillips and his wife.

**ARREST MAN WHO
FREED PRISONERS**

Frank Kennedy Falls Into Hands of Sheriff; Passed Saw to Jail.

Frank Kennedy, wanted for passing saws to prisoners in the Wasco county jail at The Dalles, was captured this city early yesterday morning by Sheriff Levy Christman of The Dalles, Sheriff Robert L. Stevens and Deputy Sheriff Frank Beatty.

The capture was made shortly after midnight. Kennedy was hanging around the Plaza block, apparently doing the officers upon a tip from his wife. The officers trailed the woman on her way to give Kennedy further information.

Kennedy is identified by Sheriff Christman as a man who passed the saws to one of the trustees of the jail, August 12. His intention was to aid in the escape of a pal named Richards, who in this he failed, for while three men sawed their way out, the opening in the bars was too small for Richards, who is a large man, and he had to stay behind. The prisoners who escaped were Marion S. Taylor, Floyd Benton and Frank Booth. Taylor has been recaptured. The others are still being trailed by the authorities.

Kennedy has admitted his guilt to Sheriff Christman, saying that he bought the saws in a second hand store on Second street and immediately went to The Dalles. Fearing to personally smuggle them into the jail, Kennedy placed the saws in a where one of the trustees could find them.

The capture of Taylor was sensational and reflects great credit upon Sheriff Christman. A few days after the escape Christman went to Government Island and found Taylor practicing shooting bluejays with a revolver. He brought down 17 birds and laid down his gun for a few moments to discuss his remarkable marksmanship with the sheriff whom he did not recognize. The sheriff took advantage of the moment and disarmed him, finding two other revolvers of large caliber in his pocket and a rifle near by.

Taylor, Benton and Booth had not been convicted, but were in jail awaiting trial. Kennedy's penalty for aiding in their escape will be severe, the law providing that it may be equal to the sentence of either of the escapees.

**MEDIUMS VOTE TO
