Carried Steel Knuckles.—A pair of steel knuckles with spikes attached were in the pocket of Theodore Shallenberger when he became involved in a brawl in a saloon at Front and Yamhill streets last night, but with two men attacking him he was unable to bring them into use. When Patrolman Barker ran into the place Shallenberger was on the floor and Albert Tammann and Gottlieb Sharz, the latter saloonkeeper, were beating and kicking him. Shallenberger was taken to the station as a witness against the other prisoners, but when the knuckles were found on him he was charged with carrying concealed weapons. He paid a \$25 fine in municipal court today and his assailants were fined \$10 each.

Bottle of Beer Cost \$10.—Frank Morretti, 331 Market street, laid down a \$10 gold piece on the bar of the New Market saloon at Third and Market streets last night, after taking a bottle of beer. George Olvay, temporarily in charge of the place, calmly ran it up and refused to give Morretti any change. Morretti complained to Patrolman H. A. Thatcher and the officer took Olvay under arrest. Later Jack Ogden, owner of the saloon, who had left Olvay in charge while he visited his sick child, returned to the saloon and after finding a \$10 surplus in the cash register gave Morretti his money. Olvay was fined \$10 by Municipal Judge Bennett today for being intoxicated.

Investigate Persecution.—Persecution of A. Kargel and F. Ratty, doing business under the name of the K. & R. Scavenger company, has been the cause of a police investigation. A few mornings ago Kargel and Ratty found a note pinned to their wagon making threats if they did not move it from the vicinity of their house at 324 Grand avenue. The men complied and then were ordered to remove their horses. Patrolman E. B. Lyon, who investigated the matter, reported to Captain George Bailey that the nearest neighbors of the men had no cause for complaint. To avoid possibilities of trouble the latter have arranged to move, they told Lyon.

Livermore has begun suit in the circuit court for annulment of his marriage to Jean F. Livermore. He also charges her with deserting him two years ago, when she went to Los Angeles. Livermore says he was married in Portland on September 30, 1903. Two years before that she married Edward A. Bevis and Livermore alleges she neglected securing a divorce from No. 1.

Wandering Man Dies.—J. A. Simpson, an aged man, whose address is not known, was taken to the National hotel at 10th and Yamhill streets Sunday while ill. Later Simpson left the hotel and while wandering around the streets was found by Patrolman Ernest Johnson and sent to St. Vincent's hospital. He died last night, the physicians attributing the cause to general debility. A horse and buggy belonging to Simpson was left at Williamson's stables, Front and Madison streets, and he has a trunk at the National hotel.

Auto Breaks Leg.—Walking from behind a streetcar into the path of an automobile, William Brocker, aged 55, an employee of the Hassayam Paving company was struck at Third and Burnside streets early last evening and his left leg broken. He was removed to St. Vincent's hospital in Holman's ambulance. The automobile was owned by C. M. Harris and driven by H. E. Hadley, but witnesses declared the driver was not at fault.

Move Into New Building.—The offices of the Oregon Traction railroad, the United Railway and the Oregon Electric are being moved into the new Railway Exchange building, where they will occupy practically all of the sixth floor. President John F. Stevens left yesterday on a tour of inspection of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway.

A copy has been on exhibition in the rooms of the chamber of commerce and has attracted much attention. Statistical information illustrating the growth of the city is also given.

Car Strikes Wagon.—A team owned by Nickum & Kelly and driven by John Kelly, aged 55, was struck by a Mount Scott car near East Twelfth street and Hawthorne avenue last evening and Kelly was knocked unconscious. He was taken to St. Vincent's hospital where he recovered and went home after his injuries had been attended.

Buns Amused in Park.—Russian Mikey, an ironworker, frightened a number of women and children in City park last night while intoxicated and then proceeded to lay waste to a number of flower beds. He was arrested by the night watchman and fined \$10 by Municipal Judge Bennett this morning.
