

EX-SALOON MAN FILES AFFIDAVIT AGAINST GRILLS

Angry Because His License Taken From Him for Violating Law, Would Start Trouble for Other Cafes.

Oliver Lee Hull, former proprietor of a grill room at Second and Madison streets, who was put out of business by the city for violations of the liquor ordinance, has taken up the cudgel against other grill rooms in the city. His first move, after losing his license was to appear before the Anti-Saloon league and make a speech. He told many things about the inside conditions of a certain class of grills.

The second move was to make a visit to all of the larger grills to see if they were serving liquor without meals, on which charge his license was revoked. As a result of his investigation, he signed affidavits reciting what he saw and sent them to the executive board and council. They were received yesterday and referred to the police committee. They are as follows:

"Gentlemen—I respectfully request that the affidavits annexed hereto be read before the honorable body and the executive board with all hopes that they may assist in regulating the liquor traffic in the city of Portland:

"I, Oliver Lee Hull, being first duly sworn, depose and say that on the evening of August 17, 1910, at 2:30 p. m., I visited the Halle grill at Fourth and Yamhill streets. I was accompanied by A. D. Smith and Mrs. B. M. Fuller and Mrs. J. Gilbert. We remained in the above-named grill for one hour, during which time we purchased beer and whisky, the same being served without meals. There were seven other tables, all of which were occupied by women, some of whom had men escorts, and all were being served freely with liquor without the formality of a meal.

On the evening of August 19 Mr. Hull further makes affidavit that he visited the Louvre with his party, where he secured liquor without a meal, and saw men and women at 14 other tables. All were drinking without the formality of a meal. From the Louvre his party went to the Hof Brau, Oregon grill and Edelweid, Portland grill, Perkins' cafe and Quella. At each place he saw his party purchased liquor and was served without the formality of a meal.

Hull failed to note that each of these places has a license for which it pays \$500 a year and has the privilege of selling liquor without meals. He recites in his affidavits that some women were alone and ordering drinks. This is against the ordinance. No woman can legally secure liquor without a meal in any place.

JUDGE GEORGE NOLAND WILL OPPOSE BENSON

Salem, Or., Aug. 27.—Judge George Noland, Democrat, has filed his declaration of intention of being a candidate to succeed himself as judge in the First judicial district, comprising Klamath and Lake counties. He will have to oppose him Judge Henry L. Benson, brother of Governor Frank W. Benson. Judge Benson resigned while occupying the office of judge in this district about 18 months ago and Judge Noland was appointed by Governor Chamberlain to succeed him. C. A. Buckley has filed his declaration of intention to be a candidate for joint representative in the Republican primaries from Sherman, Gilliam and Wasco counties.

MOTHER AND CHILDREN SPEND NIGHT ON PORCH

August 12 was an unlucky day for Mrs. Grace Ludington and her children, according to a complaint she has filed in the circuit court, asking for a divorce from K. F. Ludington. She says her husband was so violently insulting she was afraid to stay at home with her children that night, so she and the children spent the rest of the hours of darkness on the porch of a vacant house in the neighborhood of their home.

Mrs. Ludington alleges her husband frequently called her bad names and further accuses him of drunkenness. They were married in Topeka, Kan., in 1906, and have two little girls, whose custody the mother desires.

Walter B. Locke acted as a separator from Bessie M. Locke, alleging she deserted him in May, 1908. They were married in Portland in 1905.

BRITISH TORPEDO BOAT AND DESTROYER WRECKED

Hard Surface Road in Lewis County.

Chehalis, Wash., Aug. 27.—Lewis county will see its first piece of hard surface country road built this fall. This week the county board let a contract to the Warren Construction company for the building of about half a mile of such road beginning at the Chehalis city limits and extending eastward. The Warren road will be put in and if the experiment proves the success that it is claimed it will be anticipated that there will be more hard surface road work later. The road to be built will be 26 feet driveway.

AUTO PARTY ROLLS DOWN BANK AND THREE ARE HURT

J. H. O'Brien Jr., Driving Machine When He Tries to Pass Another Car; One Girl Loses Tooth in Fall.

Driving his father's new touring car toward Portland on the Base Line road at 12 o'clock last night, James H. O'Brien Jr., son of James H. O'Brien, a prominent railroad contractor, with offices in the Columbia building, plunged over an embankment about a mile east of Montavilla when he tried to pass another automobile, and as a result is lying in St. Vincent's hospital this morning with a broken arm. Two young women who were riding in the machine are also confined to the hospital on account of injuries received in the accident.

O'Brien was driving the car toward Montavilla at about 30 miles an hour, according to his own statement. Coming to a full where the road is narrow he attempted to pass another machine going east, but swerving too far out the auto went over the edge of the embankment and crashed into a tree.

Girls Thrown Out.

Rhoda Griffith, one of the girls in the car, was thrown in front of the machine and planned against the tree. The other girl, Ethel Gates, was thrown out, while O'Brien, who kept his position behind the driving wheel, was caught by the arm between it and the tree, the contact breaking his wrist and two fingers. Jack Currin, the other young man in the machine, was thrown out, but escaped injury.

The machine was badly smashed up. This morning J. H. O'Brien Sr. went out with others to bring the ruins of the car back to Portland.

It was reported this morning by House Surgeon Brook at the hospital that none of the victims were injured seriously in the accident, receiving no injuries worse than broken bones. All were badly bruised except Jack Currin, and will be confined to the hospital for a day or two. Miss Griffith suffered the loss of two teeth.

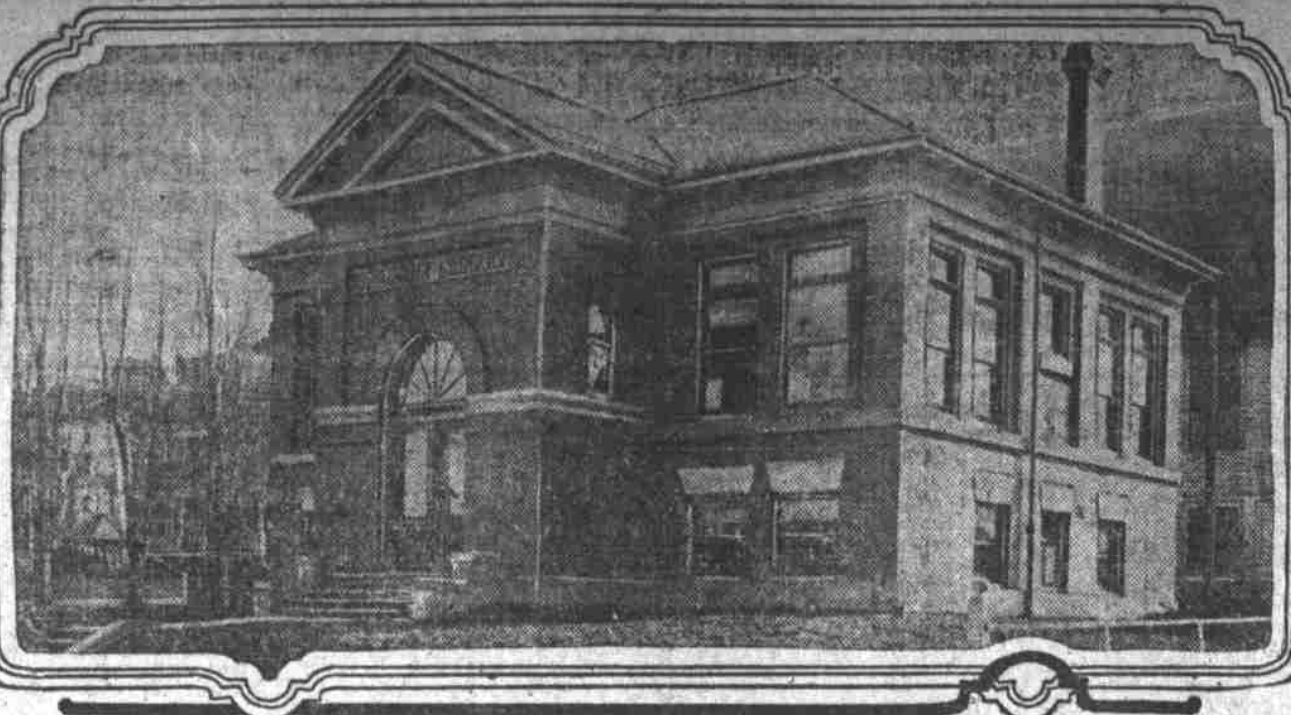
Father Forgives Son.

The victims were brought to the hospital by B. W. Kibby, who was driving the machine which O'Brien had tried to pass. Jack Currin disappeared last night, although he visited O'Brien at the hospital this morning. An effort was made to keep his name from becoming known.

J. H. O'Brien, the father of the injured youth, was shocked when he learned of the accident this morning in his office. He said, however, he was willing to forgive his son if he would give up his habit of driving at night. "Jim is generally a careful fellow," said Mr. O'Brien, "but I know how it was when I was a young fellow."

Before Mr. O'Brien had learned how his son was faring at the hospital, and just as he was pacing the floor wondering if any fatalities would result from the accident, a representative of a painting company came in and wanted to know if the machine needed painting.

Beautiful New Carnegie Library Will Be Opened at The Dalles on September 15th



The Dalles, Or., Aug. 27.—The Carnegie library, completed last year, will be opened to the public September 15, under the supervision of Miss Elizabeth Stevens, formerly of New Rochelle, N. Y. The library occupies a quarter block on the corner of Third and Washington streets and is centrally located, being sufficiently near to the business part of the city, and is on the most generally traveled street leading from the residence part to the business section.

Under the direction of Miss Stevens, librarian, and a board of trustees appointed by the mayor, \$1500 worth of books has been selected, all of which will arrive and be catalogued before the opening day, and these, added to the 1150 volumes that have been donated by the schools and old free library, make a very complete equipment. Miss Stevens for a number of years was head librarian of the New Rochelle library and has had a course in library work, hence is well qualified for the position of librarian.

ASK REFERENDUM ON ORDINANCE

Labor Leaders Want People to Vote on Measure Prohibiting Banners.

The banner ordinance did not go into effect today. This was prevented from taking effect by a referendum petition filed by the labor element, which asks that the measure be submitted to the people at the fall election. The ordinance has been called the "boycott" banner measure.

It specified that it should be unlawful for any person to carry, or cause a sign to be carried or exhibited on the streets. The original ordinance directly specified that "boycott" banners should not be allowed, but it was amended to include the signs of all business houses and advertising schemes. The measure passed the council July 27, and would have gone into effect today if the labor people had not asked for the referendum.

With the determination of calling out all union men connected with the building operations in Stockton, Cal., the lumber handlers and team drivers of that city have gone on strike. They expect to win victory by making the tie-up complete.

FINDS DAUGHTER AFTER 10 YEARS

Without Funds Mother Seeks Child She Lost 10 Years Ago; Finds Her Married.

North Yakima, Wash., Aug. 27.—Mrs. Rose McDonald of Anaconda, B. C., found her 16-year-old daughter, Mrs. Hubert Harris, in North Yakima today, after a search of ten years, and fainted in her arms. The girl had been told by her father that the mother was dead, but of late she had begun to doubt it. The father, Joseph McDonald, left his wife 10 years ago in Anaconda, picking up the 6-year-old girl, Rosella, and walking out of the house. The father and daughter have been in various towns in Washington and Canada since and the mother did not know where they were until she saw her daughter's name in a Spokane paper yesterday. Mrs. McDonald has been in part supported by her son, Captain John W. Fawcett, who is stationed in the Philippines. But did not have money enough to carry on a thorough search. She is a nurse. Sixteen-year-old Rosella eloped with Hubert Harris last spring and it was on account of the father's refusal to recognize her that gave the mother her clue.

TRY TO ASCERTAIN CAUSE OF DEATH

Physicians Examine Into Sudden Demise of Little Child at Gearhart.

Nancy Elizabeth Hughes, 5-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Hughes, 660 Ravensview drive, died Thursday morning at Gearhart Park. Unusual precaution has been taken in this case, as it is thought the child may have had diphtheria.

The body was brought to Portland yesterday evening on the Astoria & Columbia river railroad. Upon the arrival here, the city health officers and representatives of the state board of health met the relatives and body of the child. The relatives were taken to their homes in automobiles, and quarantined. The passenger coach was ordered fumigated and the body of the child taken to an undertaking establishment.

Cultures were taken this morning from which to make a bacteriological examination. This is to determine whether or not diphtheria was the cause of death. The funeral will be held Sunday, and will be private.

Mr. and Mrs. Hughes spent several days at Gearhart Park. The child had been complaining of a sore throat the past 10 days. Until Thursday afternoon, the father states, no indications of danger existed. At noon Thursday he said, the child was playing around the cottage. Shortly before 5 o'clock the little one grew worse, and Dr. John M. Holt, marine surgeon at Astoria, was called. He says the child was choking to death when he arrived, and died soon after. The case was pronounced membranous tonsillitis and laryngitis by the physician. Dr. Holt visited the family this morning and gave his opinion that that was the trouble.

ANTI-PICKETING ORDINANCE KILLED

Spokane Council Rejects Measure Forbidding Strikers' Propaganda.

Spokane, Aug. 27.—By unanimous vote the city council last night rejected the proposed anti-picketing ordinance, modeled after an ordinance introduced in Los Angeles, forbidding union men to talk with strikebreakers or to urge them to leave their jobs and join unions. Three hundred representatives of organized labor attended the meeting to voice their protest against the proposed ordinance, but it was not necessary. The campaign against the measure had been fought in the newspapers and at public meetings, and the councilmen were all convinced that it should not become law.

SHERMAN REFUSES TO DISCUSS POLITICS

Chicago, Aug. 27.—Vice President James S. Sherman stopped in Chicago several hours today en route to Decatur, Ill., where he will speak this afternoon. Speaker Joseph G. Cannon was in Chicago today, but the two leaders did not meet. Sherman positively refused to discuss politics or the Roosevelt-Taft situation.

NEW ZEALAND FAVORS SUBSIDIZED MAIL LINE

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 27.—A special cable from Wellington, New Zealand, says arrangements have been concluded with the Union Steamship company for a subsidized mail service to San Francisco via Rarotonga and Papeete. The government desires to obtain a service to Vancouver as well, and on this account tenders from Canada have been asked. If it is decided to establish a Vancouver service, the San Francisco contract will probably be extended, with Wellington as the terminal port.

In spite of last year's depression in Austria the railwaymen's union in that country has increased its membership from 4,000 to 62,000.

VANCOUVER FOLK RAISE FUNDS FOR FIRE SUFFERERS

\$507.50 Raised at Mass Meeting in 10 Minutes—Fund Expected to Reach \$3000—90 Families Homeless.

Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 27.—That Clarke county will take care of its fire sufferers was made manifest at a mass meeting held at the Commercial club house last night when \$507.50 was raised in 10 minutes. A committee was appointed to solicit money and a fund of \$3000 is expected to be raised within a few days.

The meeting was called to order by Ira M. Swartz, president of the Commercial club, who, after stating briefly the object of the meeting, awaited the pleasure of those present. Sheriff Sappington, who was perhaps more familiar with the situation than any other man in the county, stated that there were approximately 90 families homeless and that he had gathered 15 tents and sent seven to Shanghai and eight to Hellsong, they being in the greatest need. He estimated that besides clothing and food, at least \$50 in cash should be raised for each family. Some, he said, did not need any assistance in the way of money, but others were practically destitute and \$150 would be none too much.

Committees Appointed.

E. E. Beard made a motion, which was seconded by Hugh Parcel, that a committee of ten be appointed to proceed with the work, five men and five women. The motion prevailed and the following names were named by President Swartz: Mrs. J. H. Jaggy, Mrs. J. L. Marsh, Mrs. Dan Crowley, Mrs. J. P. Kiggins, Mrs. Florence Walsh, Sheriff W. D. Sappington, Rev. H. S. Templeton, Hugh Parcel, E. E. Beard and C. A. Blurock.

The committee selected W. D. Sappington, president; Mrs. John Marsh, secretary; and C. A. Blurock, treasurer. The Blurock Market was named as headquarters for the organization and all contributions will be left there.

Sheriff Sappington left this morning with a party of four for Shanghai, and E. E. Beard with a like number for Hellsong. Their object will be to get names of needy families and ascertain situation as to what will be required.

A request has been made to the government for tents from Vancouver barracks and President Ira Swartz stated that the request would not be granted and that a supply could be sent to Hellsong this evening on the Yacont train leaving Vancouver at 4:40.

Sheriff Sappington stated that many people were sleeping under trees, and others who had been taken in by neighbors, were sleeping in extremely crowded quarters.

FIRES IN KLAMATH NOW UNDER CONTROL

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 27.—The strong wind yesterday spread the forest fires in the Clover Creek district worse than ever. A call has been sent in for 100 men. The fire is under control on all but the east side. About seven sections of government land have been burned over. The Crater Lake forest fire is working south and east. More than 20 sections have been burned over. A new fire is reported at Fish Lake. A small fire six miles east of here is now under control. The fire on the west side of Wood river that burned three sections, is now controlled. Most all of the fires are on government lands. Little loss is sustained by private parties. All parties in the woods are accounted for. The atmosphere is still very smoky, the wind has subsided and the flames are again being checked in all sections.

LAWS FORBIDDING COMBINES APPLIES TO LABOR UNIONS

Justice Goff of New York Supreme Court Issues Radical Restraining Order in the Cloak Makers Case.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, Aug. 27.—Holding that the labor union, in ordering the strike to enforce its demands for a closed shop violates the law, Justice Goff of the New York supreme court today issued what is considered the most sweeping anti-labor injunction ever given in New York state. The order came as the result of a bill for an injunction filed by the Cloak & Suit Manufacturers' association against the International Garment Workers' union. The manufacturers consider the injunction the strongest decision against labor unions ever rendered in America.

In the restraining order the court says: "It is the law that the employers cannot combine the state law applies to the unions; what employers may not do, the workman may not do. The primary purpose of this strike was not to better conditions for the workmen, but to deprive other men of the opportunity or right to work, and to drive them from the industry, which requires skill. These men have the right to pursue and gain a livelihood without being subjected to doing things which, to them, are disagreeable and repugnant."

STRAIN FILES FOR RAILROAD BOARD

Umatilla County Assessor Would Have Democratic Nomination.

C. P. Strain, assessor of Umatilla county, has filed his declaration of intention with the secretary of state at Salem, to become a candidate for the Democratic nomination for railroad commissioner.

Mr. Strain during the time he has served Umatilla county as assessor, has made a fine record for himself as a public official, and springing from his efforts have come many reforms in the assessment of other counties of the state, particularly as regards the valuations placed on railroad properties. His declaration of intention reads as follows:

"To the Honorable Frank W. Benson, secretary of state, state of Oregon, and to the members of the Democratic party and the electors of the state of Oregon:

"I, Charles P. Strain, reside at Pendleton, Umatilla county, Oregon; and my postoffice address is Pendleton, Umatilla county, Oregon. I am a duly registered member of the Democratic party. If I am nominated for the office of railroad commissioner for the state at large at the primary nominating election to be held in the state of Oregon on the 24th day of September, A. D. 1910, I will accept the nomination and I will not withdraw, and if I am elected I will qualify as such officer.

"If I am nominated and elected, I will, during my term of office keep free from corruption, influence, and strive to secure the power of the office as to give true expression to the rights of the people of the state over common carriers, under the laws of the state. "Print on nominating ballot after my name: 'Would apply my time, energy and conscience to impartial administration of office.'"

PEOPLE MAY VOTE ON AMENDMENT

Council Wants Voters to Decide on Proposed Change in Water System.

The proposed amendment to the charter for changing the system of installing water mains was taken up this afternoon by the council at an adjourned session. The council voted that the amendment should be placed on the November ballot for the people to say whether or not it shall be inserted in the charter.

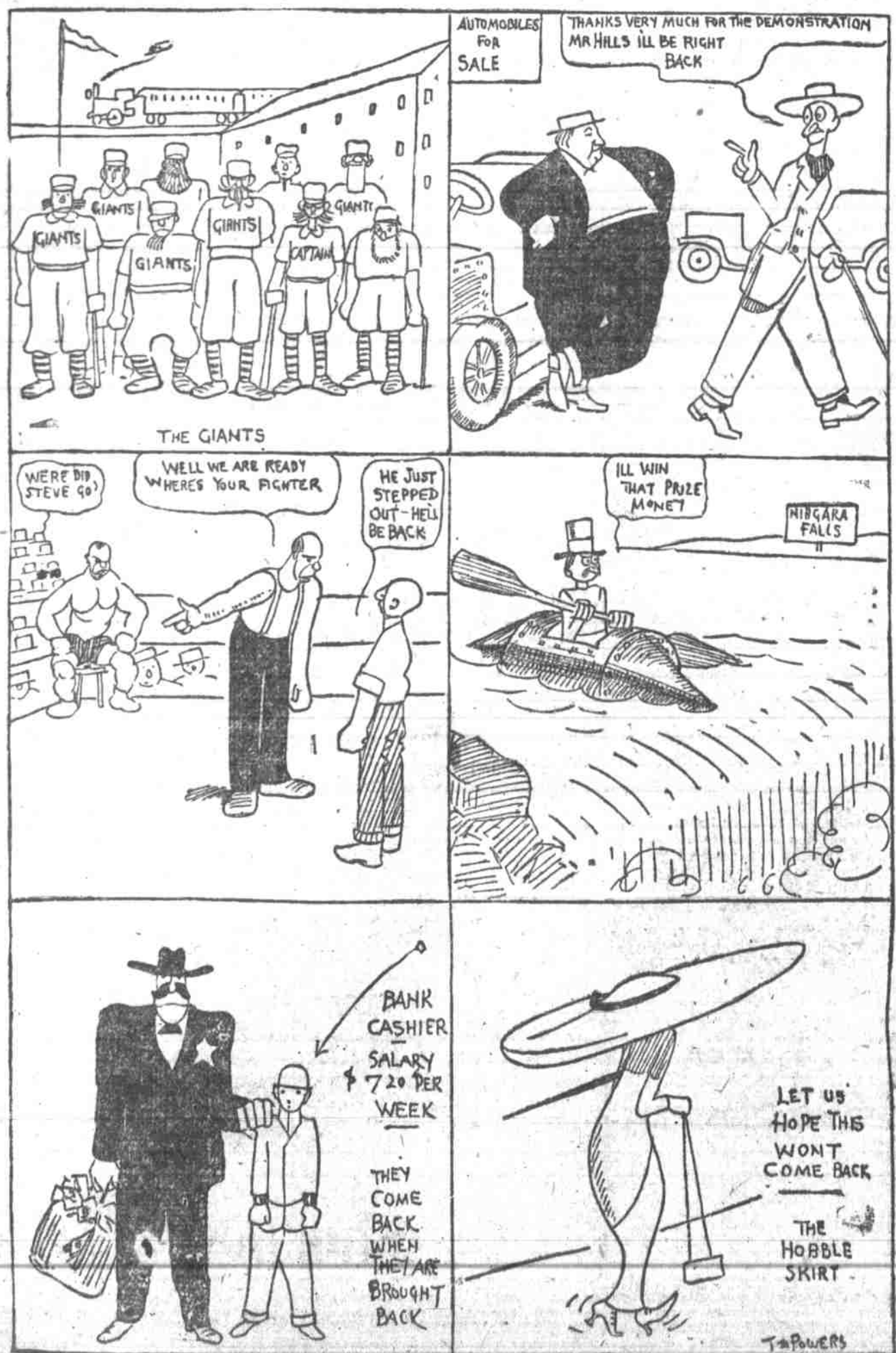
This amendment places the power in the hands of the water board. It also gives the water board power to issue bonds to within 7 per cent of the bonded indebtedness of all taxable property. Provision is also made for the refund on all money paid during the past two years for sewers where the income was not more than 6 per cent on the investment, the water department in installing the water.

If this amendment passes, it will place the water department on a self-supporting basis. All interest on the bond issue is to be paid out of a general taxation fund, and the principal is to be paid by a sinking fund.
