

ELGIN TROPHY TO OZIE MACHINE; NATIONAL SECOND

Mulford Travels 305 Miles in
4:52:29—Track Fast and
Always Dangerous—Acci-
dents to Machines.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Elgin, Ill., Aug. 27.—Before 100,000 spectators, Mulford, in a Leasler car, won the Elgin \$45,000 trophy, driving his machine 305 miles in 4 hours, 52 minutes and 29 seconds.

Livingstone, in a National, sensational winner of the Illinois trophy race yesterday, finished second.

Greiner came in third and Robertson fourth. Livingstone's time was five hours, four minutes and 10 seconds; Greiner's was five hours, 13 minutes and 32 seconds.

Mulford averaged 62½ miles an hour and finished eight miles ahead of his nearest competitor. Livingstone averaged 60 2-10 miles an hour.

The race could well be called the Vanderbilt cup of the west. Thirteen racing automobiles circling the zigzag ½ mile course were run at express train speed over one of the fastest and most dangerous tracks in the country.

At almost every lap after the race was half over a car fell out because of accidents, but none of the daring drivers was injured.

List of Starters:
Thirteen automobiles started away at 10 o'clock. The weather was ideal and the track, which had been oiled, was faster even than yesterday, when several world's records were broken.

Greiner drove the National car in which Tom Kincaid met death at Indianapolis July 5, and in which he himself narrowly escaped death in a practice spin here recently.

The first three laps were covered in as fast time as that made yesterday, probably because the cars were bunched. There were several sharp brushes at the turns. Barney Oldfield took the curves at full speed.

Incidents of the Race.
The Alco, Grant driving, twisted a clutch on "Hair Pin curve," and was withdrawn. Livingstone, in his National, covered the fourth lap in 7:58.

Robertson's time for 50 miles was 66 minutes and 51 seconds. At the tenth lap Robertson threw a tire and ran three miles to the stand on the rim of one of the wheels. He lost the lead while replacing the tire. Practically every car at this stage was compelled to stop for oil.

Oldfield was 18 miles behind at the 50 mile post.

On the twelfth lap the Matheson car broke a rear wheel and was withdrawn. The Kisselcar broke a radiator and dropped out. Mulford led at this stage, with Livingstone second.

Harroun's Marmon car broke a piston at the 60-mile post and was withdrawn. At the end of the 100th mile Mulford led, with Livingstone second, Dawson third, Greiner fourth and Robertson fifth.

At the fourteenth lap the Jackson car hit a telegraph pole and was withdrawn. The driver and mechanic were uninjured.

At the twentieth lap Livingstone slipped for water and Greiner took second place.

New Record in 22d Lap.
Mulford completed the twenty-second lap in 7:54, a new record. Mulford's first stop came after he had traveled 263 miles. At that point Livingstone regained second place and Greiner fell back to third.

At the twenty-third lap the Black Crow car fell out on account of a broken wheel.

At the 28th lap, after going 228 miles, Dawson's machine broke a frame connecting rod and was withdrawn.

At that time Mulford was reeling off the distances in less than a mile a minute and appeared a sure winner. He averaged eight minutes on four successive laps.

Oldfield withdrew at the end of the twenty-ninth lap. He was eight miles behind Livingstone at that time.

POLICE INVESTIGATE
DEATH OF NATHAN

Suspecting that the story told by Mrs. James W. Nathan concerning the shooting of her husband at 68 West Park street yesterday is not entirely truthful, Detectives Endicott and Sloan have been seeking to unearth a witness to the trouble, but thus far have not succeeded. Leola Williams and Ada Wilson, also colored, who were in the house when the officers arrived, deny they entered until after they heard the shots, but they are being held as witnesses, the police believing they know more than they are telling. The Wilson woman has frequently been in the custody of the police.

The inquest into the death of Nathan will be held this afternoon. Mrs. Nathan was arraigned in municipal court today and her case continued until Monday.

MILITIA MEN GET SHALL MARKS FOR FIRE FIGHTING

Lieutenant of Battery A, O. N. G., Says Farmer Overcharges Him for Vegetables After Saving His Home.

Some idea of the ungratefulness shown toward militia men on fire-fighting duty by small farmers and ranchers south of Hogan, whose houses and barns were saved, is given by Leo M. Clark, first lieutenant of battery A, Oregon National Guard, which returned with other troops from Hogan, a few miles east of Gresham.

"When the fire was sweeping down upon the house and barn of one rancher," said Lieutenant Clark, "we started at work and saved the buildings. Then, after fighting the fire for him for 12 or 14 hours, we prepared to eat. He sold us vegetables and fruit at outrageous prices—more than we would have been compelled to pay in the city. He objected when our cook dug a fire hole in his field, and made things as unpleasant as possible. Of course, this was after all danger was past.

"Other people we found were intent upon saving only their own property, and did not care what happened to the others. A half dozen times we were told by ranchers on whose property we were working that there were no neighbors within a radius of four or five miles. But several times, when we sent out to find other farm houses and barn buildings clustered within a quarter or half a mile of where we were working, all in imminent danger. We were misled a dozen times by selfish ranchers who, so far as their property was saved, did not care what happened to the property of others.

"But, on the other hand, some ranchers treated us in the best possible manner. One was August Nel-meyer. After working for four hours I reached his ranch with a detachment of 15 men. His place was not in the slightest danger. But when we asked if we could buy fruit he told us to help ourselves and that he wouldn't think of charging us anything. When he and his wife found we had not eaten for hours they set about preparing meals. They gave us all the milk we could carry, and all the fruit we could eat and carry away with us and did everything they could. They insisted that we go into their orchard and take all we wanted, guided us through the woods and did everything. And their place was not in any danger whatsoever.

"One of the Rodion brothers, who own a mill some distance south of Hogan, was one of those who treated us splendidly. When I reached his mill it was in no danger. But when he found we had not eaten he had his cooks prepare for us the best meal we could get. He gave us guides, and when later his mill plant was threatened, sent teams to camp for our blankets, dispatched men to town for delicacies for us and did a thousand and one things to make us comfortable. He even went so far as to call the commanding officer on the telephone and compliment our men upon the valuable work they did. We saved his mill, it is true, but long before it was threatened he was busy helping himself to our comfort and food. He saved his aid to give the property of others.

"The militia did invaluable service everywhere. We worked night and day without sleep and without food fit for an animal. Not one of the men complained. All worked with a will. The militia men certainly did do themselves proud. They saved Oregon millions of dollars."

BODY OF MISSING MAN
DUG UP IN A GARAGE

Point Bluff, Aug. 27.—The body of Frank Ringle, who disappeared August 16, was found today buried under the floor of the garage of W. L. Harvey, a wealthy resident of Marion. Ringle's head and neck were crushed by a blow and the police are certain he was murdered.

Harvey yesterday noticed bloodstains in the garage. Today, noticing that the earthen floor had been displaced, he brushed away the dirt and discovered a human body. He called the police and Ringle's body was discovered. A hundred dollars, which Ringle had, was not found in his pockets and it is believed robbery was the motive of the murder.

The police are seeking an employee of Harvey who resigned Thursday.

GOOD SAMARITAN
LOSES TO STRANGER

Glen Thompson, 146½ Third street, decided to play the traditional role of the Good Samaritan when he met Douglas H. Dewey, in a fight, yesterday. He told him he was "broken." He took Dewey to his room after buying him a meal. When he awakened about midnight Dewey was missing. So was every cent which Thompson had in his clothes, which Thompson told his tale to the police, and Sergeant Joseph Keinen later found Dewey in a Washington street saloon, where he was spending Thompson's money in prodigal fashion. Thompson faces a larceny charge now, and will have a hearing in municipal court Monday.

ATTEMPT TO LYNCH
CRIPPEN REPORTED

London, Aug. 27.—An attempt to lynch Dr. H. H. Crippen, suspected of having murdered his wife, Belle Elmore Crippen, was made this afternoon when Crippen and his companion, Miss Ethel Leaver, arrived in London. A great crowd at the railroad station broke through the police guard at the depot and rushed for the accused man. Crippen covered beside Inspector Dew and Sergeant Mitchell, appealing to them to protect him. By a desperate effort the police succeeded in driving back the mob before their prisoners had been roughly handled.

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STATEMENT FALSE SAYS FRANK SINNOTT

J. Frank Sinnott and others desire to brand as false a statement published in the Oregonian this morning that Postmaster Merrick held a meeting of "Bourne leaders" at his home in Rose City Park last week at which a number of candidates for the legislature were present.

There were several well known men present at Mr. Merrick's home one evening last week, but the perusal of the list will convince any one, even the Oregonian perhaps, that it was not a gathering of "Bourne leaders." Those who were present were: Frank Loner-gan, an attorney in the office of Franklin T. Griffith, the place where the corporation representatives framed the Mulholland county assembly's legislative slate; Charles Hughes, of Hartman & Thompson; Walter M. Daly, of the Title Trust company; James Cooke, of Overbeck, Cooke company; Dan Kella-her, J. J. Flynn and J. Frank Sinnott. Further comment Mr. Sinnott considers unnecessary to prove the absolute falsehood of the story printed intimating that a political meeting was held that night.

COUNCIL TO TAKE UP
BOND ISSUE MONDAY

The plan to let the people vote upon a bond issue of \$250,000 to be used in building public docks will be passed upon by the city council at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon. A quorum for the special session of the council called for today would not be obtained. Council members Menefee, Devlin, Wallace and Dunning were absent. A joint committee from the Chamber of Commerce and the Taxpayers' league, consisting of F. W. Mulkey, R. W. Montague, M. Moessnigh, Herman Wittenberg, Drake O'Reilly, Paul Westinghouse, H. M. Haller, G. F. Johnson, George Lankford, Henry Hahn and George T. Trowbridge, appeared before the council with a resolution asking that the measure be placed on the ballot. Senator Mulkey as spokesman, and R. W. Montague, attorney for the committee, spoke briefly on the merits of the plan and the necessity for instituting an adequate system of municipality owned docks.

EAGLES EXPEL MEMBER
ACCUSED OF GRAFTING

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 27.—John S. Dodsworth, K. of C., was today expelled from the Fraternal Order of Eagles in connection with charges that certain officers of the organization crafted on purchases of receipt purchasing machines.

Dodsworth was convicted of defrauding the order out of \$1900. The printed report of the trial gives the first intimation that he was the fifth defendant in the graft investigation. Gray, Hayes, Krause and Monaghan also were expelled. All were charged with influencing the grand jury officers in awarding contracts for a perforating device and letting the contract for printing the ritual and purchasing supplies.

The report says Dodsworth's expulsion was recommended after consideration of his own sworn testimony. The result of the election was tabulated and announced today. John S. Parry of San Francisco was elected vice president.

A constitutional amendment was adopted increasing the monthly dues to \$1.00.

San Francisco has been selected as the next meeting place.

FIRE SUFFERER WILL
GET INSURANCE MONEY

Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 27.—When John W. Hendrickson, of Shanghai, was told yesterday by a local insurance man that he would receive \$70 on a policy he had recently taken out and on which he had not yet paid the premium, he shed tears of joy and said it was a godsend to him and his family. Hendrickson owns a small farm at Shanghai and was possessed of a comfortable home. The forest fires swept everything and he barely escaped with his wife and two children. The only clothing he had in the world he wore yesterday when he called at the insurance office and this was barely turned into two. He said he had a like experience seven years ago, when a forest fire swept over Clark county. He then lost his all and he and his wife carried their two children to safety. This time the children were able to take care of themselves.

INJURED AND MAY DIE

Havre, France, Aug. 27.—Aviator Le Gagneux, while flying this afternoon in the aviation field here, struck the grand stand and was thrown to the ground. He dropped 60 feet and sustained probably fatal injuries.

INUNCTION HALTS WORK OF OPENING BELMONT STREET

Street Railway Company Obtains Order of Court Against Improvement in East Portland.

United States Judge R. S. Bean, sitting in the United States circuit court, granted a temporary injunction on the application of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, this morning, restraining the city government from extending Belmont street from the east line of section 6 to the west line of East Sixty-ninth street. Judge Bean set August 29 as the day on which the defendants should appear in court and show cause why the temporary injunction should not be made permanent.

The injunction suit is the outgrowth of a contention of long standing between the railway company and the city regarding the extension of Belmont street. An ordinance was passed more than a year ago declaring that the street should be extended. All of the necessary steps were taken and at each move the railway company protested against the contemplated action and the actual work was delayed.

The council adopted a resolution declaring the street to be open in consideration of all preliminary steps having been taken as required by the charter and ordinances governing street extensions. Today this company put a temporary stop to further work by the city by securing the injunction.

Street Never Opened.
The suit has a most imposing title, being directed against the city of Portland, Mayor Simon, City Auditor Barbur, City Engineer Morris and all the members of the executive board.

The street in question has never been opened, and lies along each side of the streetcar track running from the present end of Belmont street to Mount Taber Heights. Much of the right of way of the company was granted before the district was within the city limits and in some places is 30 feet wide, approximately 15 feet on each side of the track.

The company contends that the right of way over which its line runs is its private property, owned in fee simple, and that the city has no right to condemn it for public use without just compensation. It contends also that the city charter, section 348, provides that the city shall have the right of private property on the proposed extension must be removed within 60 days or be forfeited to the city. It would be impossible to remove the tracks as required, the company contends, without great damage.

Opposed to Improvement.
It is charged that the city intends to grade and pave the street unless restrained. It is also contended that any attempted operation of cars over the right of way after the street was opened would be a trespass upon the property of the city and would subject the company to fine and its officials to imprisonment. It is charged that the action of the city violates section 1 of article 14 of the federal constitution.

It is also charged that the city, by its action, is in violation of the provisions of the constitution which provide that private property cannot be taken for public use without just compensation.

NEW KIGGINS OPERA
HOUSE OPEN AUG. 29

Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 27.—The new Kiggins opera house will be formally opened to the public on Monday evening, Aug. 29. The house has been leased to the Pantages company and on the opening night "Going Home," a play that has made a hit in the east, will be presented. There will be a performance every night, with a change three times a week.

The house will seat 1000 people and is a model of beauty. The interior decorations are elegant. Mr. Kiggins is congratulated on all sides, on the perfection of his building and his undoubted faith in the future of Vancouver.

MODEL HUSBAND WHEN HE IS SOBER

Robert Smith Will Go to Rock Pile Because He Drinks Too Much.

Robert Smith gave his wife 35 cents Aug. 11. Two days later, returning from a business trip to The Dalles, he left for San Francisco without notifying her. He arrived in Portland again last Monday, having worked his way on a boat, and yesterday County Judge Cleaton gave him six months on the county rock pile.

Mrs. Smith, a woman of refined appearance told her story to Judge Cleaton in a manner that convinced him of her truth. She said her husband knew her rent was unpaid when he left, and knew she had been refused credit by the grocery man because she owed a bill of 40 cents. She was compelled to apply to the county for assistance for herself and her two children.

Smith, a young stationery salesman who has lately been employed by the Sunset magazine, hung his head during his wife's recital and broke down when she recounted his treatment. She said he was a good husband when he leaves drink alone, and has no other bad habits. While down in luck, however, he takes to drink. This lost him his position with the magazine when he went to San Francisco.

Smith pleaded with the court for another chance. He said he was looking for a job when arrested and believed he could secure employment in 24 hours, as he had received encouragement. Judge Cleaton told the young man he would suspend sentence until Monday to give him a chance to file \$500 bond, in default of which he must go to the rock pile.

"But I want to work, and my wife needs my support," pleaded Smith. "I am not in a position to give bond, but I can get work and do better."

Judge Cleaton told him the county would take care of his wife and he would have to suffer the penalty of the law. Deputy District Attorney Garland conducted the prosecution and L. E. Crouch the defense.

C. R. Young, another non-support offender, who pleaded guilty several weeks ago and was behind in his payments, was also before the court. He had been ordered to pay \$5 per week and his mother was to provide a room for her daughter-in-law. This arrangement did not work well, as Mrs. Young and her mother-in-law could not live in harmony. Young recently went with the soldiers to American Lake, but failed to pay up for his wife's support before he left, as he had promised Deputy District Attorney Garland.

Young's mother, who has been on his bond for \$500, came forward with \$25 of the back payments for her son and promised to pay the other \$10 today. Young was ordered to begin paying \$5 per week to his wife on Sept. 10, thus allowing him time to secure a job.
