

## PRIMARIES GIVE INSURGENTS BIG VICTORY IN IDAHO

Burton L. French Sweeps State  
Brady Leads for Governor;  
Clagstone Shows Surprising  
Strength.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
Boise, Idaho, Aug. 31.—Returns from yesterday's primary election indicate an overwhelming defeat for Congressman Thomas Hamer for the Republican nomination. Ex-Congressman Burton L. French, running on the insurgent platform, has apparently swept the state. E. M. Bowen is the Democratic nominee for congress.

Governor James H. Brady is leading in the contest for the Republican nomination for governor. Surprising strength is shown by Paul Clagstone, and if the count for second choice votes is necessary he will have a chance to win. B. F. O'Neil is eliminated from the contest. James H. Hawley has in all probability been nominated for governor by the Democrats.

## O'NEIL LEADS IN NORTH IDAHO, BUT BRADY HAS MAJORITY OVER STATE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
Spokane, Wash., Aug. 31.—B. J. O'Neil of Wallace secured as first choice for governor in northern Idaho counties. He received only about 300 more than Brady in Kootenai county, however. This same lead prevails for him through Shoshone county and what few returns yet received by 11 o'clock today looks strong for O'Neil in Bonner, Latah, Nez Perce and Idaho counties.

Clagstone and Fletcher are close rivals for second choice over a large part of this same territory, but insufficient returns are yet available to determine which is the stronger. Clagstone is claimed to have fallen below Fletcher in Kootenai county and Fletcher appears to be leading him by considerable margins in Shoshone county as second choice.

Fight among the nominees for governor threatens to become very heated, following the primaries and before the final election. It is declared that even now Brady is keeping close watch of O'Neil's campaign expenses and Clagstone is keeping watch of them both with a view to filing charges on a disqualification should all expenses fail to be included in the statement of campaign expenses which must be filed within 10 days after the primaries.

## BROADWAY BRIDGE BONDS ARE SOLD; MONEY AVAILABLE

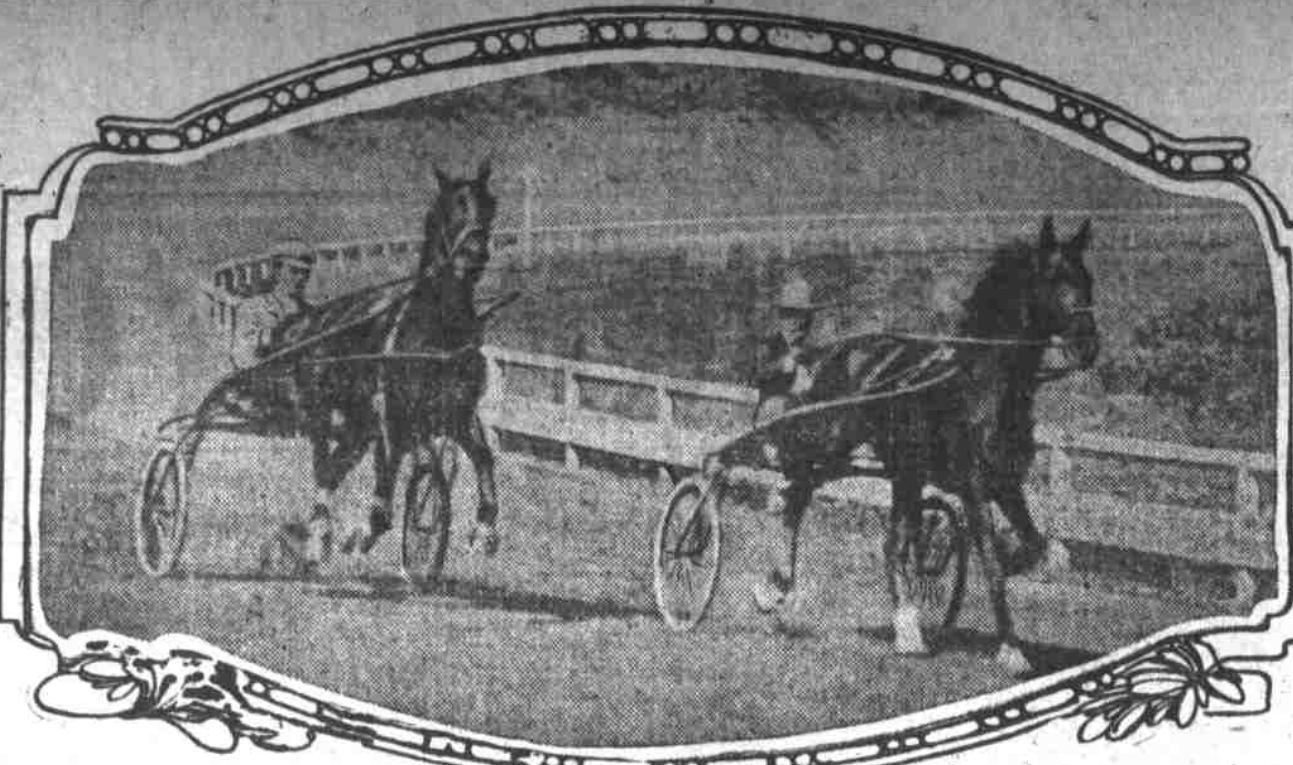

The city officers with fear as they proceeded to dispose of the bridge building securities. This was to file with City Attorney Frank S. Grant, just before the council session began, notice of appeal from the decree handed down by Judge Burnett June 14. The filing of this appeal could have been deferred until January and still have been within the legal six months' limit required in carrying a case from the state circuit court to the state supreme court. The city attorney was of the opinion that the appeal was filed just at this time because the Klernan-Dunway obstructionists hoped that it would have its effect upon the sale of the bonds today.

**City to Push Case.**  
There is possibility now that the case may be decided in the supreme court within the next three months.  
"I shall ask for an advancement of the case," declared the city attorney. "I do not suppose there is any chance that Dunway will ask for an advancement of the case. He has a short period in which to file his bond. Then 20 days in which to file his abstract, then another 20 days in which to file his brief. After that the city is allowed 20 days in which to file its brief. I do not think, however, that it will be necessary to take 20 days for our part of the work. I shall instruct Deputy City Attorney Benbow to begin work on the city's side of the case at once."  
"I shall give personal attention to the matter. I am determined that this case shall be hastened consistent with the need that work on the Broadway bridge shall no longer be handicapped. I do not anticipate, however, that the Klernan-Dunway case will end in the state supreme court. I believe it will be carried to the United States supreme court."

**Rushlight Votes "No."**  
As soon as the council session began this morning the proposition of selling the bridge bonds to Ladd & Tilton was brought up. Councilman Baker asked: "Did you see those letters that we all got?"  
City Attorney Grant had risen to his feet to express his opinion that the contention of Dunway was "boah" when Councilman Menefee voted that the Ladd & Tilton bid be accepted. Councilman Rushlight then asked if there were not higher bids. Mayor Simon replied that a total of \$17,500 for the bonds had been higher than the Ladd & Tilton bid, but that no protest had been made against selling the bonds to a block. Councilman Rushlight replied that as long as there were higher bidders he considered it the council's obligation to sell them the bonds to the amount desired.

Councilman Rushlight's was consequently the only roll call which followed, and which showed Councilmen Annand, Baker, Dunning, Ellis, Lombard, Menefee, Wallace and Watkins in favor of disposing of the bonds to Ladd & Tilton.  
While these things were transpiring Attorney Dunway waited without the doors of the council chamber.

## Illuminated Parade to Close Unique Boosting Campaign

A parade of fantastic features lighted by a burst of red fire will on Friday night claim the curious attention of Portland people while at the same time closing the Live Wires unique boosting campaign for the Portland fair. The Rotary and Automobile clubs will cooperate to make the pageant notable in its successful directing of popular interest to the big Portland fair which begins Monday on the Country club grounds and lasts during the week. H. C. Campbell has been appointed grand marshal. C. C. Craig, E. L. Fraley, Henry Wempe and M. C. Dickinson are his assistants.

Many business men will also help in completing arrangements. Final plans were made at a large meeting held yesterday in the Commercial club.

**Pony and Cart to Lead.**  
The pony and cart that is to be given to some fortunate child will lead the procession. It will be appropriately decorated and driven by a little girl. The police band and a detachment of mounted police will come next, followed by the Hunt and Jockey clubs in full riding regalia. A second band will play between the riders and street sweepers transformed into Roman chariots, drawn by spirited mules and driven by regularly attired Roman sports.

A sign 400 feet long bearing the legend, "All the Live Ones Will Be Seen Next Week at the Fair," will be carried somewhere in the procession. Last but not least will come the devil leading to execution the local aggregation of knackers, Seattleites and mossbacks. The devil to be used for the occasion is a red devil of large proportions. Newsboys will be imp. The convicted ones will be guarded in large and properly emblazoned cages. At Nineteenth and Washington streets the victims will be swung from a tower, hung in effigy until dead, then consumed in red fire. Many other stunts will be pulled off.

Forty race horses resplend the grounds yesterday and were assigned stables, beginning their training stunts this morning. The most prominent stables in the new arrivals were those of A. C. Spencer of California, who brought more than a dozen racers, and H. G. Cox of McMinnville, Or., one of the prominent breeders of this state. With this big addition to the race herd yesterday, and the arrivals scheduled for today and tomorrow, the long list of competitors for the most thrilling speed events of the northwest will be finished.

The transportation committee of 15, of which Julius Meier was chairman, had a conference with the O. R. & N. officials yesterday morning, and practically effected an arrangement whereby steam line aid will be given the street railway company. This committee asked that one train of 20 cars be run each of the four first days of the fair, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and

Thursday, which is expected to cover the great rush period.

**Will Carry 1200.**  
A definite arrangement has not been consummated by General Passenger Agent McMurray gave assurance that it would be. Permission will be granted by the city authorities to have this long train back up Fourth street for loading, to the intersection of Stark, where it will be able to take aboard 1200 persons, and convey them directly to the fair grounds. The train will be kept at the grounds for the return trip, so as to relieve the congestion at the hour of departure.

Duncan's goat circus is expected tomorrow or the day following. Steiner's acrobats will be here about the same time. Many applications are being made for concessions, and there is assurance that this line of amusement will also be strong.
