

MERCHANTS POINT OUT ADVANTAGES OF PUBLIC DOCKS

In Publicity Campaign Commercial Bodies Argue Portland Cannot Become Greater Without Better Waterfront.

Why Portland to become Greater Portland must possess public docks has become subject for a widespread publicity campaign undertaken by the Chamber of Commerce, Taxpayers' league and the Central Labor council. The campaign will be carried vigorously on until the day of the special public docks election, November 5.

Every voter will be furnished succinct arguments in printed form demonstrating the commercial advantages accruing to any city by municipal control of the waterfront. Public meetings will be held in various parts of the city. An effort will be made to show how opposition to docks, owned by the city always has source in corporations and private interests that seek monopolistic control of transportation rates.

"We believe when we have done all those things that every honest and intelligent voter in Portland will approve the plan to invest \$2,500,000 in public docks," said Frederick W. Mulkey, chairman of the joint committee from the Chamber of Commerce and Taxpayers' league, yesterday.

"It is tremendously important to the present and future commercial interests of Portland that we do not delay any longer to establish our dockage system on a uniform and business-like basis, opening our port not to a few favored transportation and navigation interests, but to all. The employers who want to make money, the laboring men who want work, all desire public docks, because they know that when a system of fireproof municipally owned docks has been built that the great increase of ocean traffic to this port will bring us more money and more work and more permanent prosperity and more people and a higher business standard so that we shall truly have the Greater Portland."

The city council on Monday approved the plan to submit to popular vote a charter amendment providing for the issuance of \$2,500,000 public docks building bonds, and for the appointment of a public docks commission by the mayor, the business of the commission being to administer business affairs arising in connection with the operation and maintenance of the docks when built. The council had before passed an ordinance authorizing the issuance of \$500,000 public docks building bonds, an act which the voters had approved in the election of 1907. This ordinance Mayor Simon vetoed, declaring as he did so his belief that \$500,000 would not be enough money to build a system of public docks such as a city of Portland's size and prestige should have. Many dock owners, capitalists, employers, business men, laboring men, together with the commercial bodies and labor organizations have approved the plan for public docks.

FOUR CANDIDATES FILE DECLARATIONS

Salem, Or., Aug. 31.—Justices Frank A. Moore and Thomas A. McBride yesterday filed their petitions for re-election in the primaries. The petitions were the largest yet presented at the secretary of state's office. They contained more than 2100 names each from 31 counties.

The declaration of Benjamin F. Jones' intention to be a candidate for circuit judge in the second judicial district, comprising Coos, Curry, Douglas, Lane, Benton and Lincoln counties, was placed on file in the office of the secretary of state yesterday. Mr. Jones was joint representative from Folk and Lincoln counties in the legislature last winter and has served six successive terms as a member of the Oregon house of representatives. At present he is register of the land office at Roseburg.

The declaration of the candidacy of Dr. Emmet Drake, whom the assembly of Portland have put forward to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of L. G. Clarke, recommended for state senator from Multnomah and Clackamas counties by the assembly, was filed yesterday.

OT BEGIN DREDGING COOS RIVER IN WEEK

This work is provided for by the appropriation made by congress.

FRUIT BUILDING FOR HOOD RIVER FAIR

Hood River, Or., Aug. 31.—At a largely attended meeting of the stockholders of the Hood River Fair association held in the Commercial club rooms yesterday afternoon it was decided to purchase the Davidson property opposite the Oregon hotel as a site for the fruit fair building that will be erected at once. The Henderson property near the center of the city was made the second choice in case the deal could not be closed for the first choice. A set of bylaws was adopted at the meeting, and the following stockholders were elected: C. D. Thompson, P. S. Davidson, Miles Carter, C. K. Marshall. It is planned to hold the annual apple fair during the latter part of November.

Burglars Work at Woodland.

Woodland, Wash., Aug. 31.—Burglars entered the confectionery store of C. E. Dunham and the barbershop of Mr. Teasly at this place Monday night. The miscreants took a small amount of merchandise from the confectionery and 16 razors and a pair of shears from the barbershop. They carried the cash register out in the lot back of the building before opening it, but did not get any cash for their pains. Entrance was gained through a back window. It is thought that the deed was committed by local parties, for had it been done by professionals more plunder would have been taken.

URGE TEACHING OF IRISH HISTORY

Hibernians Insist It Should Be Made Part of Curriculum of Oregon Schools.

Irish history will be taught in all the schools of the state if the efforts of the Ancient Order of Hibernians are successful. At the state convention of the order, which was held in Portland last Sunday, a resolution was unanimously adopted, recommending that the history of Ireland be made part of the curriculum of Oregon's schools.

The convention also adopted a resolution favoring an alliance between Irish and German-Americans for the purpose of resisting any attempt of England to form an alliance with the United States. Plans for the furthering of cordial relations between the Irish and the Germans were discussed before the convention. A system of insurance was recommended, the order at present not having any insurance department. The acts of the national convention, recently held in Portland, were endorsed by the state convention. Before the conclusion of the session Edward Ryan was elected president of the order in Oregon. Other officers for the coming year will be elected next Sunday.

DIPHTHERIA CASES REPORTED AT SEASIDE

Dr. Calvin S. White, state health officer, left for Seaside this morning to investigate reports that an epidemic of diphtheria is raging there without proper quarantine. "I understand there are a number of cases," said Dr. White before leaving. "If I find this true I shall insist upon the most rigorous quarantine being established. Some of the cases have been of a mild nature, but they seem to be none the less contagious."

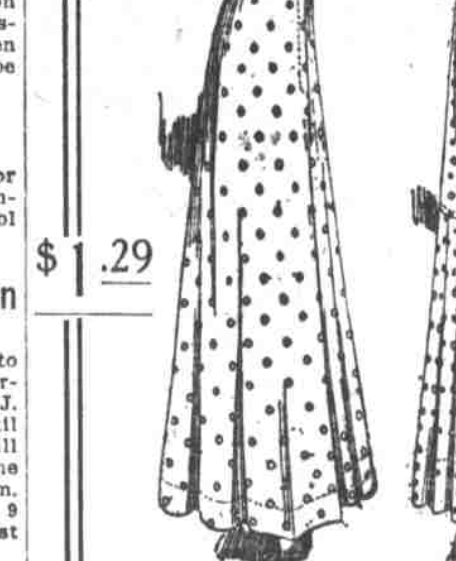
